The Venerable Chief O'Neill

His Legacy Lives On at University College Cork

Francis O'Neill, born in Co. Cork in 1846, emigrated to America at a youngageandrosethroughtheranks of the police force to become Chief of Police in Chicago in 1901. He is perhaps best remembered today for the role he played in documenting and publishing traditional Irish music.

Chief O'Neill took a somewhat innovative approach in his collection of Irish music—he recorded emigrant musicians playing traditional Irish music on the streets of Chicago, capturing their performances on a series of wax cylinders. Wax, or phonograph, cylinders (invented by Thomas Edison) were one of the earliest devices used to record and reproduce sound. O'Neill's recordings feature some of Chicago's best known musicians, among them the pipers Patsy Touhey and James Early and the fiddle player James McFadden

Chief O'Neill sent a number of these treasured recordings to his great friend, the Reverend Richard Henebry, Professor of Irish at University College Cork in Ireland. Henebry was equally passionate about traditional Irish music and safeguarded O'Neill's gift; the O'Neill Wax Cylinder Collection continues to reside

In November, Dr. Mel Mercier, Head of the School of Music at UCC, travelled to Chicago to showcase the recordings of Chief O'Neill in his hometown. Together with two of his most accomplished students, Catilín Nic Gabhann and Tara Breen, Dr Mercier performed a selection of music, inspired by O'Neill's recordings, for attendees of both the American Ireland Fund Dinner at the Four Seasons Hotel and the Annual University College Cork Alumni Reception in Chief O'Neill's Pub & Restaurant in Chicago.

University College Cork, as

custodian of the O'Neill Cylinders, plans to conserve, re-format and digitize these early recordings so that they may be studied and enjoyed by all. The Cylinders are symbolic of the heritage shared by Irish-Americans in the Mid-West and the people of Munster. They also representatangiblelinkbetweenthe cities of Chicago and Cork. Eugene Mc Eldowney is the Real Faloorie Man

The man linterviewed impressed me with his energy, inquisitiveness and heartiness. I was immediately taken with him. And, when I read several of his novels. I realized that they too are filled with this energy and enthusiasm for life.

Hi is Eugene Mc Eldowney and his is the author of ten novels, including The Faloorie Man and the Cecil Megarry Mysteries.

For many years he was a journalist and news editor for the Irish Times. Recently he retired from that work, but continues to write prolifically.

In appearance, McEldowney is of average height, wiry, and has short steel-gray hair. In age hi is about 60.

He was born into a large family in Belfast. His father was a welder. He studied English literature at Queen's University, and later taught at St.. Malachy's College in Belfast.

He worked hard to become a reporter.


He has written many novels, several film scripts, and is a regular book reviewer for the prestigious Irish Times in Ireland. He lives with his wife in Howth, near Dublin and in rural Spain.

When I interviewed him we discussed several topics, one of which was why Irish immigrants in the 1800's succeeded so well at American politics. How did they get other ethnic groups to vote for them?

The usual explanations: The Irish $spoke\,English, and\,they\,were\,familiar$ with electoral politics. But, for long after the interview I was intrigued by the question. There had to be other reasons, and some of them persist to this day. Irish people make up only a tiny part of the urban populations, yet there are so many Irish American

elected officials.

It became obvious that McEldowney displayed the human qualities that explained the quick rise of our ancestors to political and business



At iBAM! (the Irish Book, Art, and Music Celebration held at the Heritage Center over the last Celtic New Year) I observed that he treated everyone equally - whether they had written a best seller, or were newly published.

He was hearty, friendly, and respectful of everyone. This attitude

of treating everybody equally and respectfully would have been refreshing to newly arrived people in WASP dominated America.

McEldowney's friendly war-hearted and gracious attitude made me look forward to reading the three books he so generously brought for me from Ireland. (I will review the two mystery books in the next

The Faloorie Man

Set in Ardoyne, near Belfast in Northern Ireland, the time is the period after World War II>

The title comes from a street song sung by children in Belfast: "I am the wee Faloorie Man, a rattling, roaring Irishman."

Eugene impressed me as a real life Faloorie Man.

The book is a coming of age story, the Irish Times calls The Faloorie Man "An affectionate chronicle, gently told."

We can all relate to its scenes of childhood. It is both happy and poignant. Often it is bittersweet, but it is always filled with personal feelings - often intimate ones.

The story is magnetic and suspenseful. Yes, suspenseful. A powerful author can create the magic of suspense.



We have all been children, and one part of growing up is experiencing the first to the opposite sex. This probably first happened on the school playground.

For boys: Will she talk to me? Will she like me? For girls: Am I attractive to him?

If you think that's the most important thing it should be right up there in the first paragraph. Exclude everything that isn't relevant."

Chicago's South Side Irish Parade Book Available

Although many Irish eyes were crying at news that the South Side Irish Parade would be no longer, a local author has come to their rescue with a new book about the parade.

Part of Arcadia Publishing's Images of America series, Chicago's South Side Irish Parade by Bridget Houlihan Kennedy perfectly captures the images and stories of the parade's 31-year history.

In Chicago's South Side Irish Parade, Kennedytakes a look back at howtheparadebegan, as well as its gradual rise in preeminenceand crowds. The book highlights the parade's various grand marshals and special honorees, marriage proposals and politicians that made the parade the must see event in Chicago each March.

Considered to be one of the largest neighborhood-based St. Patrick's Day parades outside Dublin, Chicago's South

Side Irish Parade began quite modestly, with 17 children under the age of 10 marching twice around the block. Dubbing themselves the "Wee Ones of Washtenaw and Talman," the founders of this great parade marched with homemade signs, costumes, and a baby buggy while neighbors and family members cheered them on. Over the next 31 years, the parade grewinto an annual event, attracting hundreds of thousands who came to celebrate Irish heritage with family and friends. In 2009, President Barack Obama encouraged Taoiseach Brian Cowen of Ireland to visit the parade, calling it "one of the great events in America."

Bridget Houlihan Kennedy is a Chicago resident who was born on the South Side, but raised on the North Side. One of six children, her family moved from Beverly to Wilmette, where she graduated from New Trier High School. Growing up, Kennedy attended countless South Side Irish Parades with her mother, grandmother and siblings. Many of her relatives still live in the Beverly neighbor-

hood today.

Kennedy graduated from John Carroll University in University Heights, Ohio, in 2000 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communications and a minor in English. She went on to earn her Masters in Journalism – Public Affairs from Chicago's Columbia College in 2005. Since then, Kennedy has written for several major publications, including Chicago Magazine, the Chicago Sun-Times and the Pioneer Press, covering politics, education and

local, late-breaking news. She is a member of the Society of Professional Journalists, the Chicago Headline Club and the Association for Women Journalists in Chicago.


Kennedy is thrilled to share the stories and photos of one of the greatest neighborhood St. Patrick's Day parades in the country.

A Long Time in Politics

British Prime Minister Harold Wilson once remarked that a week is a long time in politics. Indeed. And three months can be an eternity. On December 1st last Brian Cowen's government seemed on the ropes. The recession was biting savagely, negotiations on cost cutting with the public sector unions had ended in flasco and a savage, benefit and wages lashing budget had become inevitable. Fianna Fail was in the doldrums in the opinion polls, trailing its chief rival, Fine Gael, by a wide margin.

Three months later, the scene looks different. The budget was successfully navigated. There may be disruption ahead in the public sector, still smarting over the pay cuts, but the issue does not appear to have caught fire. There has been only muted reaction from those affected by the welfare cuts. Overall the public mood has been one of relief that the draconian budget proved less so than feared. There are some signs of economic recovery, though the signals are mixed. International opinion, deeply sceptical beforehand that the government would take the necessary measures, has been fulsome in its praise. The cost of borrowing (for it has not stopped—but continues at \$400 million per week) to keep the country afloat has even reduced slightly.

Ireland is now something of a darling of the international economic press. There are no more analogies with Iceland. The new EU bad boy is Greece, where a new government discovered its predecessor had been economical with the truth where the public finances were concerned. Suddenly there are fears for the stability of the Euro, with the participating countries (which do notinclude Britain) now divided into two—those who practice economic and financial prudence and those who do not, but run huge fiscal deficits. Ireland currently occupies a grey area in the middle; having fallen from grace we appear to be bouncing backup, thanks to the government's firm actions. Some commentators have even begun to replace Ireland with Italy in the "PIGS" group alongside Portugal, Greece and Spain ("PIGS" was the unflattering acronym used

in Brussels to identify the four "poorer" countries receiving special subsidies from the EU before the—much poorer—Central

Europeans were admitted. It stuck in the Euro era to identify the fiscally weaker members).

These are still early days. The immediate concern when the Greek crisis broke was to cobble together a short term solution to head off any possible domino effect were Greece to default on an early maturing \$30 billion debt, threatening next up Portugal and Spain. Any lasting solution to the Eurozone's problems will probably feature the major paymaster, Germany—which will have to do most of any necessary bailing out-exerting some control over other Eurozone members' budgets. Watch this space.

Domestically, also, things may be looking up politically for the government. Last year's byelection and local election losses and the depths to which Fianna Fail slumped in the polls (trailing Labour at one point) represented the nadir. Since then there has been some recovery but the party has continued to languish far behind Fine Gael in popular support. However, even allowing for an expected upturn in support after mid-term disaffection, and even possible brownie points for acting tough, the odds have been squarely on a change of government at the next election (which must take place by June 2012). The electorate continues to place the political blame for the economic collapse firmly on the government and on Fianna Fail in particular. The coalition partner, the Greens, which was decimated in the local elections, has stuck with Fianna Fail on the Benjamin Franklin maxim that if they don't hang together, they'll hang separately.

The scenery changed in the second week in February with the departure from active politics of the high profile Fine Gael TD, George Lee. Lee, the former economic correspondent for the national broadcaster RTE, was elected to the Dail in a by-election only last June, gaining a whopping 53% of the vote. His declared aim was to dosomething about Ireland's dreadful economic situation. His resignation, from both his seat and his membership of Fine Gael, after just 8 months has been accompanied by ill feeling and recrimination. Lee declared he was quitting through frustration at his inability to achieve anything and at his treatment at the hands of Fine Gael, which had ignored or sidelined his talents and expertise.

Fine Gael's reaction has been a circling of the wagons and closing of the ranks behind leader Enda Kenny. They, and many neutral observers from the media, have focussed on the shortness of the period allowed by Lee to make an impact, and the opportunities on offer to him, which were his to develop. Some have asked what, in any event, he could have hoped to achieve in the short term by joining the opposition.

It's a debate in which there can be no winners but at least one loser. Enda Kenny was already under fire for two recent less than impressive media appearances (in one of which he stumbled over his attitude to forming, hypothetically, a government involving Sinn Fein). Having brought Fine Gael back from near electoral oblivion in 2002 to a credible alternative party of government in 2007 (how many remember how close he came to government then?) And having since built up an impressive lead in the polls, there was a high level of agreement among pundits that, barring something major, Enda Kenny was set fair to become Ireland's next Taoiseach. The Lee affair, and the fallout from it, together with the media performances, have now raised doubts. Could he not have handled, and harnessed, Lee better? For the moment criticism is muted but if the next few months see Fianna Fail gain an electoral "bounce", for whatever reason, then the mutterings against Enda are likely to increase and the Lee affair is likely to surface again. Whatever happens, Fine Gael have been damaged; it remains to be seen by how much.

In retrospect the Lee episode was a distraction. His election came at the high watermark of public disillusionment and dissatisfaction with the political and economic situation. Much of the population were in denial and were seeking scapegoats or an instant solution. Lee was seen as someone untainted and determined to do something to put it right. His throwing in of the towel so soon has come as a shock. Yet the period since June last has seen some progress towards finding a way out of the economic morass, not least in the growing public recognition of the seriousness of the situation and what needs to be done. It would be unfortunate were Lee's departure to affect this. Our troubles are the outcome of a reckless property bubble in tandem with an international economic recession. Like other economic bubbles ours will have to work itself out, with considerable temporary pain. There's no way to avoid this. And, as we now know, Ireland is not the worst. Greece, equally recklessly, hid the truth until it was almost too late. Let us hope it can be rescued. Timeo Danaos...?







Chicago-Irish will sponsor its big St. Patrick's Day parade along beautiful Lake Michigan on Columbus Drive on Saturday, March 13th, starting at Balbo at noon. More than 30 gaily decorate floats, 20 marching bands and more than 30 marching units will pay tribute to the great Saint who, with others, promoted the Catholic faith in Ireland.

Unfortunately, we have no St. Patrick's Day parade on the "great southside of Chicago" this year due to circumstances beyond the control of a great committee. Hopefully, this will be remedied for next year, and we shall again honor St. Patrick with two great parades.

Historians tell us that St. Patrick was born in Brittany, France, and whilst playing by the sea shore one day, was captured by Irish sailors and brought to Ireland. He was, we are told, sold to farmers in Ireland, and was employed minding sheep on the hills of Wicklow. During his time there, he was loved by the Irish people, who finally managed to help him escape and return to his parents.

He later journeyed to Rome and became a priest, and received the blessing of the Pope to return to Ireland and help the missionaries. This St. Patrick did with great enthusiasm, and one day, while trying to convert some Druids, he was having trouble explaining the Trinity, three persons in one God. The good Saint knelt on the ground, picked a three leaf shamrock, three leaves with one stem. Ever since, Irishmen and women wear the shamrock on his feast day, whenever it is available.

Margaret Mary Corrigan went from St. Xavier College. Later to heaven in February. She was 92.

The daughter of Canadian immigrants Edward and Mar- the Year. St. Xavier named her garet Loftus, Mrs. Corrigan was born April 10, 1917 on the South Side.

She arew up at 68th and Wentworth in a house that would later be torn down to make way for the Dan Ryan Expressway. Mrs. Corrigan became a life long Cubs fan at age 14 despite her South Side roots after a family friend took her to her first game.

Mrs. Corrigan attended Loretto High School in Englewood. In 1940, she earned a bachelor's degree in education



in life both schools honored her. In 1960, she was named Loretto Foundation Woman of Alumni of the Year in 1990.

Mrs. Corrigan met her future husband at a 1937 summer party in Lakeside, Michigan. The late Charlie Corrigan was a friend of her brother and nine years her senior. At the party, Charlie Corrigan tossed Margaret into the lake and thought it was funny.

"Mom said right then she knew they would start dating." Her daughter Maureen Toomey

They married in 1941 and lived near 78th and Wood in Little Flower Parish. They had nine children. Four of their sons, including the late Marty Corrigan, suffered from hemophilia-a blood disease that keeps blood from clotting.

Helping other families affected by hemophilia became a passion for Mrs. Corrigan, who along with her husband founded the Midwest Chapter of the Hemophilia Foundation. They organized annual blood drives for 40 years.

She stayed loyal to her Catholic upbringing, volunteering at nursing homes and supporting pro-life causes, her family said.

She was remembered as someone who met church sermons for morality and personal responsibility head-on with action, volunteering her time and her home for causes

she believed in. Already car- Mrs. Corrigan also volunteered "She was the most cheerful, ing for three hemophiliac sons at homeless shelters, nursing upbeat Irish lady that I've ever

in a family of eight children, Mrs. Corrigan and her husband, Charles, adopted 11-month-old Roger — also a hemophiliac — in the late 1960s from a Peoria orphanage.

"It was something that she was put on this earth to do," said her son Michael, the only son born without hemophilia. "That was just a part of her person,"

Even after her sons became adults and didn't require her supervision, Mrs. Corrigan turned her attention toward care for both young and old. An active member of Catholic Chari-

she cared for newborn babies waiting to be put up for adoption as an alternative to abortion. She wasn't afraid to pick up a sign and picket outside a clinic that performed abortions, her family said.



ties and the pro-life movement, homes and the Meals on Mrs. Corrigan is survived by her Wheels program. In her later years, her family said she remained active, cooking for the priests at St. Linus parish in south suburban Oak Lawn, where she lived for three decades.

It was another great year for album releases covering the entire gamut of Irish, Scottish and Celtic music. At one end of the spectrum there were Grammy nominations for John Doyle, Liz Carroll, and Maura O'Connell and we applaud and congratulate them for their brilliance. At the other end there are hundreds of independently produced albums, some good, some truly awful, but sometimes you can find a gem among them. That's what I do. I look for the "gems" and then I share them on Blarney On The Air every Monday night on 90.9 fm in Chicago or on the web at wdcb.org.

So here are my gems from last year's offerings—The IAN/Blarney On The Air Awards.

Irish Album Of The Year Traditional Irish Music – Girsa

I told you back in the September issue of IAN how great this album was and that it was a serious contender for my Album Of The Year, and I have heard nothing to change my mind since. Girsa are brilliant and with this debut album they have captured the hearts of Irish America.

The album Traditional Irish Music delivers on its promise with sixteen awesome tracks, eight gorgeous girls with talent and voices to match. Whether it's a soulful ballad or a lively jig, the girls are all over it, delivering a sound that is truly traditional in all it's senses. There is not a bad note on this entire album and every cut is a winner.

Maeve, Deirdre, Kristen, Margaret, Bernadette, Blaithin, Pamela and Emily are from Pearl River, NY, and have been playing together since they were children. Some of their parents are Irish music teachers and Girsa are a credit to them.

The album is brilliantly produced by Gabriel O'Donohue who has also been a great mentor to the girls. Check out their "Emigrant Eyes" video on YouTube and as expected, Girsa will be at some of the major Irish Festivals this summer, including Irish Fest Milwaukee and The Dublin Irish Festival, Ohio. I look forward to seeing them play live.

Scottish Album Of The Year

The Baltic Tae Byzantium - Brian McNeill

Another easy pick as Brian McNeill, Scotland's folk trou-

badour presents us with his brilliantly conceived album The Baltic Tae Byzantium.

Many thanks to Craig Scotland and Jack Baker for turning me in Brian's direction, as he never disappoints and I have gathered some of his amazing albums.

The Baltic Tae Byzantium explores in song the links between Scotland and Europe. Songs and stories of Mary, Queen Of Scots, John Knox and Bonnie Prince Charlie.

It's rich in it's history and almost visual in it's telling. Brian is a writer, multi instrumentalist, singer, songwriter and founder member of The Battlefield Band.

In Scotland he is considered a national treasure and rightly so. Celtic Rock Album Of The Year

The Irish Collection - Barleyjuice

Barleyjuice are on top of the Celtic Rock genre with their lively hand clapping, toe tapping, beer drinking yet incredibly talented approach to Celtic Rock.

Kyf, Swanny, Billy, Eric, Jimmy and Gregor take no prisoners as they take us on a merry jaunt on this double album of bawdy

ballads and truly memorable originals. The Irish Collection is divided into two parts—'A Night At The Pub" and "The Morning After."

If it's craic you're after then it's all here and loads of it. There are thirty-two songs on this album and with the exception of a few instrumentals they are all about Whiskey, Rum, Tequila, Stout and The Juice Of The Barley. "Whiskey To The Sea" is one ofthebestsongseverwritten, nothing short of brilliant.

Kyf Brewer is a wordsmith and one of the best contemporary balladeers out there today.

Usually is. Munnelly has not had the sextet here in a while. They're out supporting their new, Award-winning album, Tight Squeeze. Rare. Fabulous. Not to be missed. Enough said. And, Altan is coming to the Abbey, as well! Get up to 3429 W. Grace on Saturday, March 27th. Munnelly and Altan in the same month. Two all-time great bands coming to the best Irish music city in America. No question. No doubt. Do what you have to do. See you there.

Well, we have received about 70 albums in the mail in the last couple months. So, here are the best of 'em. There will be 9. This will be fast. Brace yourself, Bridgid:

1. Speaking of Altan. They are JUST out with their 25th anniversary album on Compass. This is cool. They went back into their own catalogue and picked out their favorites and rerecorded them with the RTE Orchestra! It is great. Totally trad? Nope. But, no band has stayed so true to the tradition over the years. So, this is something different, and it is lovely. Top, top stuff.

2. John Doyle and Karan Casey have teamed up and have Exile's Return out, also on Compass. There are 12 songs. John Doyle's masterful guitar and both of their wonderful voices are fully employed here. A stunner of an album from two of the best in the business at the top of their games. Geez, we have

3. We have loved Hanneke Cassel's fiddle playing since we first heard her years ago with Cathie Ryan. Here she is with her latest, For Reasons Unseen. Her fiddle playing just gets better and better. There IS some great Irish work here, all right. We only wish she would have put more of it down on the album. There are other styles here, which show her total musicianship, but leave the Irish trad aficionados wanting more. It is a wonderful album, so we shouldn't whine. But, like the recent String Sisters, it will not appeal to listeners seeking a full Irish album. She is great, and you should have this, in any case. We remember her as a young girl in the music. Now—all grown up, and a woman of musical substance.

4. Outside Track is a new band out with a self-titled album, recorded in the Scottish borders region. We want to name them, this is so good. Norah Rendell, from Vancouver—vocals, flute, whistle, Ailie Robertson—a Top TIR Award winning musician from this paper, and a Livies winner on harp from the world's largest Celtic music site, Livelreland.com. One of the best new harpists in the world. Mairi Rankin, singing, playing fiddle and step dancing—out of Nova Scotia and, yes, part of THAT Rankin Family, Fiona Black out of the Scottish Highlands on piano accordion, fiddle and flute. Wow! Cillian O'Dalaigh from Germany on guitar and flute. Wow again! This is the best new group we have heard in guite a while. Stunning. This album is just the beginning. Wow! (Did we already say that?)

5. Fidl has their latest out, Fidil 3. All three fiddlers prove that when you have this much talent, you can offer albums that continuously amaze in their virtuosity and different sounds, all brought to the party by three fiddles! If you dare

played this a lot to think you know what three fiddles sound like, you are wrong. These are young masters at work, and we love them to bits. Damien McGeehan, Aidan O'Donnell and Ciaran O'Maonaigh are all from Ireland and all known to us from their many other projects. But, it is together that they reach this crescendo, A brilliant format for brilliant musicians. Find it.

> 6. Conversation at the Crosses is from two master Irish musicians, and it is an early contender for Instrumental Album of the Year. The conversation takes place between Pat O'Connor on fiddle and Eoghan O'Sullivan on button box and flute. This is for the real, true trad fan. Masterful. Wonderful. There are 12 cuts, loaded with magic. This is the pure drop. If YOU'RE the pure drop, find it. Recorded in Miltown Malbay in Clare. Irish music. Real Irish at its core, down to the bottom and up to the top.

> 7. The RTE Masters Series is on board with Willie Clancy The Gold Ring. An awful lot of people would tell you Willie was the best uilleann pipes player of all time. Hard to argue. Surely an immortal. Two CD's here with a staggering 65 cuts. Definitive. Important. He passed in 1973, but his musical legacy is so vital to the tradition and Miltown Malbay, his home town, we can't go into it here, and might not try it is any format. The all-time master? Well, if not he, who? If you love real, true genius piping, here it is. Alpha and Omega.

> 8. Nightingale, from Boston, has a new one. Jolie. This trio is unexcelled in their arrangements and amazing musicians. We were hipped to them by two of their biggest fans, the fab Matt and Shannon Heaton. Piano accordion, fiddle, bouzouki, guitar, vocals, all the tasty stuff. Becky Tracy, Jeremiah McLane and Keith Murphy have come up trumps. We love this album, and so will you.

9. Le Cheile has Out of the West. This group is a London-based quintet sent to us by Alan O'Leary at Copperplate Distribution and Promotions. Copperplate is the best and only handles the best. Le Cheile is wonderful. These guys make you feel that they are right there with you in an incredible session. They have a ball, and just play it ahead. Lay it out, and "Bob's 'yer uncle." This is the stuff we all love. The vocals are not to be believed. Every now and then we hear an album and smile through the whole thing. This is one of those. Terrific, wonderful music.

Iknow I have raved in the past about of the stage? Well, here you go. As far the Valley Forge Midwinter Music Festival held Valentine's Day weekend in Pennsylvania, but I've just got to say a few words about this year's show for two reasons. One reason is because it was simply a great show again this year, and the other reason is that I'm so cheesed that we do not have a similar show in the Chicago area. Granted we have ample entertainments during the winter months at all the pubs, Gaelic Park and the Irish American Heritage Center, but no really big show... and we should.

There were four acts at Midwinter that really deserve mention. Neil Emberg and Hadrian's Wall were terrific, as usual. Neil's voice just gets mellower every time I see him, and his stage presence is impressive. Got a supply of his new CD while I was there, but more on that later.

Finally got to see the Tartan Terrors and was mightily impressed. Excellent piping, singing, dancing and a large dose of humor made for a very enjoyable show. I had heard conflicting reports about them, but from my observations, the Tartan Terrors is definitely worth watching.

Andy Cooney did a set on Sunday at Midwinter and I was very impressed with him. He's been playing and recording for a long time and really knows how to reach his audience. Although nearly every band performed "Galway Girl," Andy Cooney's version was best.

The most popular band this year had to be the Screaming Orphans. The four sisters from Donegal performed with fire and passion, bringing the crowd to its feet time after time. They were in fine form. I hear that they will be playing at Gaelic Park on Memorial Day week ends o come out and see one of thehottest bands in Irish music today.

New Releases

I mentioned that Neil Emberg and Hadrian's Wall had a new CD and it is a beauty—recorded live last year in the beer tent at the Glengarry Highland Games in Maxville Ontario in front of one of the wildest crowds you can imagine. Feeding off the energy of this mob of wild Canadians, Hadrian's Wall put in one fine performance which was well-recorded with ambient noise filtered out nicely so that you get the energy and feeling while hearing the music perfectly. Back in January we attended the Quad Cities Burns Night, a tradition with us for the last 23 years. Always have a great time there. This year the entertainment was provided by Switchback who performed a beautiful set of Burn's songs. We picked up their new CD there and it has proved to be great fun. Ghosts of the River Folk has ten original songs written by Brian Fitzgerald and Marty McCormack, the two members of Switchback. The songs celebrate the band's professed love of the Mississippi river and the people who live their lives on and around it. For my money, few duos can coax as much sound from their instruments as Marty & Brian, kind of like a modern day Corries. On this CD the two are joined by some very talented players; Jim Hines on percussion; Ellis Clark on keyboards; Lloyd Maines on tenor guitar; John Williams on button box and Paul Russell on fiddle. Songs that tell stories, lovingly crafted by two of the finest string players in the Midwest. That say enough? I like this CD more every time I play it, now I just hope the boys will put out a collection of their Scottish tunes.

In my last column I mentioned that a new Solas recording was on its way and it arrived the day after I submitted by column. The Turning Tide features Seamus Egan playing everything but the kitchen sink, Winifred Horan and her incomparable fiddle, Mick McAuley on box, Eamon McElholm on guitar and Mairead Phelan vocals, an impressive lineup. I've been playing this a lot in the store and I gotta say that I like it. While it's a little more laid back, in places, than I usually go for, it catches and holds my attention.

Another fine recording from Compass Records. There are cuts from several of Altan's recordings over the years though, sadly, none from my favorite Altan recording, "Red Crow," but I'll forgive them for that since the stuff chosen for inclusion on this recording is truly spectacular. Altan has had a very prolific career and a host of fine CDs and this new collection showcases the development of the "Altan sound." Nicely done.

For quite some time now I've been crabbing to anyone who'll listen about the shortage of Pipe Band Dances so you can imagine my elation when I heard that a new dance is in the works and one that you will not want to miss. On Saturday, April 10th, from 7:30pmmidnight in the newly remodeled Erin Ballroom of the Irish American Heritage Center (a great place to have a band dance), Chicago Celtic Pipe Band and the City of Chicago Pipes and Drums will have a band dance. I can't tell you how cranked I am about this. First off, these are two very good bands, which means we'll be hearing some fine piping in a room which handles the sound of a pipe band well. Secondly, this is a facility which is well suited for a party, lots of room, lots of parking, and lots of fun. There will be a DJ for musicbetween the band performances. Tickets will be \$15 at the door. I'll be there and I hope you will too.





Madonna House

The mission of Catholic Charities has always been to nurture life—in whatever way is needed at any given moment in history. According to Father Roger Coughlin, our resident historian and a pioneer of many programs at Catholic Charities over the last 50 years: "It depends on the needs of people and Catholic Charities' ability to help."

So, a year ago, when Catholic Charities' St. Sylvester Shelter on Chicago's Northwest side for up to 12 homeless families had to close and move to make room for a needed parish project, we—like so many of the families we serve—had to search for a new home.

Madonna House, in Chicago's Lakeview



neighborhood, was a vacant building that had suffered fire damage. Madonna House offers a home-like environment where families can regain their dignity and focus on their goals like finding employment, affordable childcare, and generating personal savings.

And this wonderful transitional home for homeless families has inspired tremendous acts of kindness and commitment. We are grateful beyond measure to our partners in charity who have made this beautiful place a reality. Key contributors to the project include the James

N. Perry family, St. Clement Parish in Lincoln Park, the City of Chicago Department of Family and Support Services, Discovery Clothing, and Designs for Dignity, an organization that provides pro-bono professional design services and in-kind donations to non-profits. The Korean American community in Chicago donated warm blankets for the families. For years to come, their extraordinary generosity will be a blessing to families seeking their way out of homelessness into stable housing, jobs and a new life.

In these difficult times, Catholic Charities remains committed to helping the most vulnerable families throughout Cook and Lake counties through a wide range of emergency services such as food, clothing, and shelter, and professional social services. Other services for homeless families include the St. Francis de Paula Shelter in Chicago and the New Hope Apartments Program, which places homeless families in 124 scattered-site apartments throughout the city and suburbs with temporaryrental support while providing intensive case management services. Another, in Co. Louth, was brought to my attention yesterday by long-time friend Malachy Towey. Like so many other Holocaust (famine) mass graves, it is outside the wall of a consecratedcemetery- Slarmore. It's a few fields west of the Collon road some miles the Ardee workhouse haulier required a four-corpse minimum to make the cemetery trip, and made a few trips some days. Thank you, Malachy! It is to your credit that the murders of the innocents buried there will not be permanently concealed.

HOLOCAUST MASS GRAVES. Co. Donegal, thanks to George Mc-Fadden.

TIME RUNS SHORT. My book nears completion. Of the hundreds of Holocaust mass graves in Ireland. only two, so far, have markers that bear honest witness. Most lack markers of any kind, others have a worn from Ardee. Malachy informs me that "famine graveyard" sign; so we must register the remaining known mass graves before they are lost forever. This might be the last chance for the mass grave near your birthplace to be publicly acknowledged and put on the map along with the others. It's your choice as to attribution. If you prefer ANOTHER, IN DUNFANAGHY, anonymity, that's fine; just be sure to

THE "IRISH" GOV'T, a main Irish Holocaust denier, opposes installation of mass grave memorials. Meanwhile, it promotes a different memorial, to Irish purveyors of British violence. Pat Muldowney sends the following (shortened here) from Ireland:

GALLIPOLI "PILGRIMAGE." In an official visit to Turkev in March Irish President Mary McAleese is scheduled to unveil a memorial to the Irish soldiers killed at Gallipoli in World War 1. Ireland's elected representatives are being invited to participate in a "Pilgrimage" to Gallipoli as part of the ceremonials.

Should this invitation be accepted? In 1915 Irish, Australian and other invaders descended on Turkey armed totheteethwiththedeadliestweapons and technology of destruction available at that time. Why were they there? Did they in cite the Turks to do the sameto the Armenians a few years later? The Gallipoli attack was the beginning of a campaignbywhichtheWesternpowers secured control of most of the Middle East and its valuable oilfields. They continued to wage warthroughout the twentie th century to keep control of theregion. Since Gallipoli, Western armies have plagued the Middle East, so that it is now one of the most dangerous and tormented areas on earth.

It is unlikely that most of the individual Irish soldiers buried in Gallipoli went there to capture oil and territory, or to start a century of western military aggression, colonisation and domination in that region. So why were they there trying to kill Turks? What were their reasons and motivations? Some of them were poor men who thought they could better themselves if they signed up for killing other people. In other words they did it for the money. Others were persuaded by patriotic propaganda that it was a good idea to invade another country and kill people

there. In other words, they were duped. Some people signed up in order to get a gun and have adventures. In other words they wanted to kill for pleasure.

Which of the Gallipoli dead should be admired, honoured and commemorated? Those Turkish soldiers who heroically sacrificed their lives defending their homeland from foreign invasion? Or the invaders who engaged in aggressive warfare for money, for pleasure, or to help their governments to steal the territory and natural resources of other people? How would we feel if a foreign head of state came to our country to honour and commemorate jihadist soldiers who died while trying to conquer us, change our way of life, and seize our land and resources, using religious words like "Pilgrimage"? It may be that the Irish President thinks that the population of Ireland can be brought together by focusing on some military event in which both sides participated, while mindlessly closing our eyes to the meaning, purpose and consequences of that event. The reality is that we are just emerging from a period of armed conflict in Ireland. Such violence creates division, not harmony. The militarism and slaughter of the Great War generated anger, disillusion, bitterness, destruction and chaos. The Middle East in particular is still suffering grievously from the consequences of Gallipoli.

The Irish dead in Gallipoli should be allowed to rest in peace. If anything, some official amends should be made for the horrific crime they helped to perpetrate on the people of the Middle East. There are many peaceful and honourable projects in which people of good will can join together in common cause. So why should we now dwell on some violent project which I rish people participated, for opposing and mutually contradictory reasons, in order to inflict death and destruction on people in a faraway country who had never harmedus?Whyshouldwenowexpect to be inspired and elevated by the un-

inspiring fact that armed unionists and nationalists were prepared to defend each other from a third party against whom they had joined together in a savage and unprovoked attack?

The real meaning of Gallipoli is carefully concealed from us. Why? Could it be that we are being softened up to make us amenable to presentday Gallipoli-style savagery in other faraway countries? If Gallipoli is so commendable as to be worthy of State Visits and "Pilgrimages", surely we should be eager to involve ourselves in similar military activities today? In fact, Gallipoli was one of the most shameful, divisive and brutal episodes in our history, and that is what we should remember about it.

IN DUBLIN on its January 30 anniversary, people commemorated Bloody Sunday of 1972 in which British soldiers shot thirty peaceful Derry human rights marchers, mostly in the back, killing fourteen of them.

While the murderers have proven to be above the law, "Irish" police including Dets. Kevin Doherty and Joe Higgins photographed the Dublin commemorators and threateningly demanded IDs. Thus, in official Ireland, mass murder by the Brits is something to abet while treating commemorators as terrorists.

MY MARY asks me to include this: "It wasn't only millions of jobs that were lost," said the Los Angeles Times' Marc Cooper. "We have lost our guiding principles as a nation." After the twin towers fell, "we were stampeded" into an unnecessary war "by an administration that cynically manipulated our deepest but unfounded fears." Executive power was expanded in a manner that would make "Dick Nixon blush and Thomas Jefferson roll over in his grave" and our global standing was "drowned in the CIA's torture pits and in the horror dungeons of Abu Ghraib." And let's not forget how it all began—with the "charade" of an unelected, blatantly partisan Supreme Court picking our president.

Poison Pen Power

Here's something you may not know. Some of the most violent exhibitions of religious bigotry known in the United States were directed against Old St. Patrick's Church. Several attempts were made to burn it down, and in 1844, a monster torchlight parade formed in City Hall Park, marched through Chatham Street and the Bowery...

Yes. I'm talking about St. Pat-

no; not the church you see televised eachyearduringtheparadeuptrendy Fifth Avenue.

Old St. Patrick's Cathedral, 200 ears old last year, stands down on Mulberry Street in the heart of Little Italy. Before he built St. Patrick's on 5th Avenue, Old St Pat's was the parish of New York's first archbishop, "dagger" John Hughes. The press, more overtly anti-Catholic than today1, hung the "dagger" label on Hughes rick's Cathedral in New York... but, because he tagged his signature with

a cross. But the nickname suited the aggressive Tyrone-born Hughes.

He was born in Annaloghan in 1797, growing up under Britain's Penal Laws- a pariah in his own country. When Hughes was 15, his younger sister Mary died. The parish priest, barred by English law from entering the cemetery, could only scoop up a handful of dirt, bless it, and hand it to Hughes to sprinkle on his dead sister's grave.

James Harper headed Harper Brothers (later Harper & Row). His Harper's Weekly was noted for its anti-Catholic Thomas Nast Cartoons. His first big coup was the 1836 gothic horror novel, Maria Monk's Awful Disclosures, about a Canadian woman claiming to have been sexually exploited in a convent.² Harper published the book following the success of Six Months in a Convent, another fiction bio posing as reality that sold 200,000 copies in a month. That book, along with a sermon from the rabidly anti-Catholic Lyman Beecher (father of Harriet) inspired a Protestant mob in 1834 to burn to the ground the Ursuline convent school in Charlestown, Massachusetts.3

In 1835 one attempt had been made to destroy St. Pat's. Hughes took over as bishop in 1842. A mob that years mashed the windows of the Cathedral and the Bishop's house.

Harper was elected Mayor of New York in 1844 on an anti-Catholic, anti-immigration platform. That year Nativist mobs in Philadelphia looted and burned several churches, a seminary, and most of the Catholic neighborhood of Kensington.

At a meeting with the Mayor who, despite his name, was no friend of "Harps," bishop Hughes was asked if he was worried about his churches. Hughes replied: "No, Mayor, it is you who should be worried about yours." Hughes sent the Mayor a note saying, "Should one Catholic come to harm, or should one Catholic business be molested, we shall turn this city into a second Moscow" (in 1812 Russians torched their city as Napoleon marched in).

Now in 1844 with the torchwielders gathering in City Hall Park, the bishop packed the Cathedral and its graveyard on Mott St. with armed men. Hughes wrote later that every one of his churches had been "protected with an average force of one to two thousand men-cool, collected, armed to the teeth..."

Themobarrivedandbegantostone St. Pat's stained glass windows. But welcomed by a church full of riflemen, they quickly opted to take their enlightened, reformed, All-American God-fearing fervor and... dangle.

Unfortunately, very little of that

spirit now infuses 70 million nominal US Catholics. Confronted, they are more apt to join the Harpers and Nasts parroting, "pedophile priest," "pedophile priest" like mad macaws.

During the 20th century, attacks on Catholicism and the Church became more subtle but no less effective: "Let us have no martyrs among the Catholic priests, it is more practical to show they are criminals."

(A. Hitler) It's an era we plan to examine another month.

Now St. Patrick's Old Cathedral School, New York's first Catholic parochial school in the system founded by John Hughes 188 years ago is set to close at the end of this school year. St. Pat's has just 129 students, down 2/3 from a decade ago. Marty Scorcese, who grew up a block away, is an alumnus.4

Last month we wrote about misdi-<u>rection</u>, one technique used by news organizations to control opinion. When a story is "out" but harmful to your agenda, you cover it, once, framed in the best possible light, then hide it from the public radar with "chaff"—a flurry of stories designed to focus public attention back where vou want it.5

Containment is another effective control tool. You saw it used all during the recent Anglo-Irish conflict as American media displayed an almost slavish devotion to the most conservative official British line.6

Imagine then that "pedophilia" were uncovered at an upscale school for children of the elite, including American Presidents. Would that story attract national and international attention? You bet.

Last month Robert "Pete" Peterson was fired from his school after an outstanding 30 year teaching career. Police charged him with "sexual abuse of a minor," a student.

"Pete" was a social studies teacher at Sidwell Friends School. Heard of it? It's a high-class (tuition @ \$30,000/yr) Quaker school in Washington, DC, catering to the offspring of our political and media nobility. Peterson was also director of Camp Corsica, Sidwell's prestigious summer camp on the Maryland shore. Executives and correspondents at Time, the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, and, of course, the Washington Post, send their children to Sidwell. Tricia and Julie Nixon are alumni, as are Chelsea Clinton and Nancy Reagan. Joe Biden has a grandchild there. Oh, and don't forget: the Obama daughters.

Really? So why are you hearing about this in the little ol' Irish American News? Did you miss the fat

headlines in the Trib and Sun-Times? Were you tuned out when the flash interrupted your favorite TV news show? Fuhgeddaboudit! It didn't fit the frame or the agenda.7

Your press treated this story as it does other inconvenient events like the 2007 Knoxville rape-torture murders, and those two major reports on sexual abuse in public schools (2004 and 2007)—it was contained—quarantined-anotheritemforthememory hole8. The few papers and TV shows that carried the Sidwell revelations are D.C. based, like the Washington Post. America's newspaper of record, the New York Times, did not see fit to inform its readers. One notable exception: the N.Y. Post did run a barebones(threesentence)itemtitled "Perv' teach at O kids' school."

Consider the recent flap over Tareq and Michaele Salahi, he a rich guy, she a former Miss USA. They "crashed" a state dinner last November. The crashing involved nothing more violent than having their pictures snapped saying hello to Obama and few of his guests. Although Tareq is Palestinian, and a board member of the American Task Force on Palestine (a fact scrubbed from that press coverage) there was no danger to the Obamas, Guests were thoroughly scanned for weapons by the Secret Service. And the Obamas knew the Salahis, having met them before. But the story received breathless international coverage for a week. So, when an actual sexual predator teacher is uncovered at the Obama girls'school, why is the press... suppressed? If ol' Pete were a Catholic priest—how do you think that story would have been played?

This may help you decide: Did you read, hear or see news of D.C. Public Schools Chancellor Michelle Rhee's recent explanation for firing more than 200 schoolteachers last October? The official reason given was "budget cuts."

But in a January interview Rhee blurted: "I got rid of teachers who had hit children, who had had sex with children, who had missed 78 days of school..."

"Sex with children"? As of writing, the story is huge... but in D.C.'s local press, nowhere else. The New York Times hasn't touched either the Sidwell or Rhee revelations. And except for an item sent to one of its online blogs, Newsweek, owned by the Washington Post, also stands silent.

Are you getting the picture yet... the one not in the frame?

President's Message

The High Holy Days are upon us! Happy St. Patrick's Day!

As a kid growing up in Chicago, St. Patrick's Day was always one of the highlights of the year. For this proud Irish-American boy, it meant a month of parties and, most importantly, it meant an extra day off from school! Even better, this wasn't an average day off from school, this was special. Not every kid in school got the day off - only the Irish ones! This was our holiday, and we got to lord it over the other kids. In my neighborhood, we didn't know of any other nationality that took their own day off of school. In the mind of a 10-year old, it was another reason (and maybe the best one) to be proud to be Irish!

My mother taught step dancing back in those days and the whole family, as well as almost every Irish kid from the neighborhood, was a part of her school. The month of March meant we were out every Friday and Saturday performing at the comed beef dinners held at every local parish on the Northwest Side. The 70's were a simpler time and it was still quite a few years away before Riverdance would change the game for Irish dancers, but, nonetheless, we thought we were pretty hot stuff in our polyester dance costumes. That is until one of my friends saw me. The abuse heaped on a

young boy for taking dance lessons could be pretty intense. My saving grace was our school wore black pants not kilts. Could you imagine if I was a dancer and in a dress?!! It wasn't too bad, though, because most of the Irish boys in the neighborhood took step dance lessons too at some point. There's strength in numbers. It's funny. for all the years I spent dancing and the countless times I performed a 4-hand reel,

a hornpipe, or some other dance, the only thing I could pull off if my life depended on it is the basic jig. The rest is lost (sorry, Mom!)

Yet none of the parties could hold a candle to the big day itself - St. Patrick's Day. In those days, the parade was held on the day itself. With the step dancing school and my dad being part of the Shan-

non Rovers, it was a day unlike any other (plus did I mention we were off of school). The day started with the old Ray Rayner show on WGN. The McNamara Dancers performed on Ray Rayner every St. Patrick's Day morning. This was big time. You had to wait your turn and be one of the better dancers to get chosen for the TV show. Whether it was watching my sisters on TV or the year I finally got my own chance, it was how we started the day. Then it was

downtown for the parade, watching the river turn green and going to the Shannon Rovers pre-parade activities. I don't think I fully understood until many years later why all the adults were in such a good mood early in the day, but it still was pretty cool. Then came the parade itself and marching down State St. (or Dearborn depending on the year). Thousands of people cheering and maybe another chance to be

on TV! Or maybe more than on... The McNamara Dancers always marched, but the Shannon Rovers were at the front of the parade. If the numbers worked out, you could march behind the band and then run back down the side street and re-march with the dancers. And if you were really good, maybe you could march with the Shamrock

American Club, too! As typical boys, my cousins and friends and myself would always try to march as many times as possible. The rest of the day often became a blur of parties, step dancing, bagpipers, and general sensory overload for a weary kid. They are marvelous memories and part of the story of Chicago's Irish.

As an adult not too much has changed! As president of the Center and a member of an Irish band, March is an incredibly busy month. I look forward to building these same type of fond memories for my own family and sharing St. Patrick's Day with them and our wonderful Irish community in Chicago. It seems as if there is some sort of celebration every day in March leading up to the big day on the 17th. (Some of us even started celebrating in February!)

Nowhere is that more true than at our Center. March is the busiest month of the year for us - our phone rings more, our website gets millions of hits, and all aspects of our organization are busy presenting various forms of programs and events to celebrate our Irish heritage. It's a bit overwhelming at times, yet that doesn't mean we are shying away from it! In fact, our 2010 St. Patrick's Day programming is by far our most ambitious in years. This issue will provide you with all the details and we hope to see you around the Center at as many of these events as you can fit in. I know I will be around the Center and all over this month! There is still a lot of that kid in me! Besides, we can all sleep in April!

Celtic Women Honor Two Brave Women

Celtic Women International's Chicago Branch and the IAHC's Cultural Committee present the 3rd Annual Revolutionary Women Series Program, Designing Women: Kathleen Clarke and Margaret Skinnider. The program will recognize and honor the sacrifices and achievements of Irish women in the struggle for Irish independence.

Before she was on the road to rebellion, Kathleen Clarke was a dressmaker who also designed the tri-color ribbon badges to counteract against the Union Jacks used by the British as they recruited young men to fight in World War I. Following the 1916 Easter Rebellion and the executions of her husband and her brother, she put aside personal grief to craft a complete support system to care for the dependents of the prisoners and slain.

Born in Scotland of Irish parents, Margaret Skinnider was a mathematician, teacher, marksman, and

devoted member of the Glasgow branch of Cumann na mBan. She used her skills to draw up detailed maps and diagrams, including her most famous map of Beggars Bush Barracks, Dublin indicating the probable location of the munitions storage area.

Although women played their part as politicians, snipers, spies, nurses, dispatch carriers and educators in the Revolutionary years, they were written out of history, banished to obscurity after the Irish Civil War. In keeping with CWI's mission to recognize, honor and celebrate achievements of Celtic women, they will offer this annual program series commemorating these women.

The program, which features a lecture, sllide show presentation, music and poetry, is Sunday, March 28 at 2pm. The cost is \$12 for IAHC or CWI members or \$15 the general public and tickets can be purchased at the door.

If your name is O'Neill, or you have O'Neills in your family, and you've been looking for a good excuse to visit Paris, this might be the perfect one.

Next June 2010, from the 24th to 27th, an international gathering of O'Neill clans will take place in Paris,

France. Today, however, a revival of the spirit of the Clans is taking place, and the meeting in June will see O'Neills from all over the world heading to Paris

page, let me restate what the other six columns covered:

- · How one keeps his/her current job, while preparing for the possibility of termination. (September,
- The lessons that job coaches have learned about the process. (October)
- The importance of preparing and rehearsing for interviews. (November and December)
- · A job search pep talk. (Janu-
- The seven obstacles that job seekers bump into all the time. (February, 2010)

There are some "golden rules" in the job search process: (1) Get in front of as many potential employers as possible with a prepared script about what a terrific job candidate you are. (2) Tell everyone four things—what work have you been doing; what sort of work you want to do now; where do you want to work: and give some idea of your compensation expectations. (3) It is absolutely critical for you to understand that most people want to help you; my estimate would be 95%, but they need to know those four things about you to do so. (4) Learn from rejection and then shake it off. (5) Keepatthe process-persistence pays off. (6) Learn how to use the social media channels (Linkedin: Facebook: Twitter, for example). This is a great opportunity to allow the younger generation to help you in your job search; they probably know how those channels work far better than most of us adults over 40.

Recently a client of mine, Don, was kind enough to forward me some information that he had received from an organization that assists job seekers. Their release said that the average job seeker who takes far longer than normal to find a job did NOT consider networking a critical part of the process NOR did s/he actively market themselves. Whereas job seekers who "worked" their network and who actively marketed themselves found their jobs significantly sooner. Think about it; isn't a sale normally preceded by a sales call. Consider every person a potential helper for you in your job search.

Often job seekers feel prepared because they developed their verbal interview presentation shortly after they were terminated. They practiced it a few times. But interviews can be few and far between, so one needs to continually hone that presentation. One of the values of accountability groups (frequently a sub set of a job support group) is having someone available to you so

you can practice your responses to obvious interview questions.

BEFORE you get actively involved in contacting potential employers, decide on what you want to do. Spend some quality time thinkingaboutitandthendevelopan (ideal) job description for yourself. The more clarity you demonstrate to your contacts the more likely they are to walk away with a better idea of what type of job you are seeking.

What does the typical week look like for a job seeker? Actually any week should start on the preceding Friday (an hour or two on Saturday or Sunday also works).

FRIDAY: (A) Review the week's activities. Complete any open correspondence and/or return every significant phone call. (B) Organize your activities for the next week (C) Divide your calendar between face to face contacts and contacts to be madethroughothermedia. Setaside one or two mornings/afternoons every week; find someone to talk to face to face. (D) Remember many job seekers simply shuffle papers all week long. You must make personal contacts.

MONDAY: (A) Respond to all emails, text messages, and social media messages that you have received over the weekend. (B) Make contact with everyone on your day's contact list. Be persistent. Have a goal for the number of contacts you will reach and for the number of appointments you will set. (C) Don't allow yourself to be interviewed over the phone; almost everyone communicates better in person. (D) State your willingness to meet early, late, and/or for a specific amount of time. Your availability for a meeting or a call on Saturday or Sunday could be well received. Resist being put off.

TUESDAY: (A) Review your activities of Monday; resolve any open items. Remember, when in doubt, make the contact. (B) Use a specific part of the day to meet with potential employers, former colleagues, and personal contacts. Meet for coffee; breakfast or lunch can be too expensive and take too much time. (C) Recalibrate your calendar for the rest of the week based on your "results" from Monday and Tuesday. (D) Reschedule anything and everything to get time on someone's calendar.

WEDNESDAY: (A) Again, be sure that you have handled every contact you have received earlier in the week. (B) Make contact with everyone on your day's contact list (as modified and updated). Focus on meeting your goals for the day. (C) Give yourself a little "treat" when you have a successful day.

THURSDAY: (A) If you are using Tuesday and Thursday as your face to face contact days, do it. Don't allow some minor inconvenience to keep you tied to your computer. (B) For that matter, Conor Cunneen's new book with the unique title (SHEIFGAB the World-8 Building Blocks to Successful Transition) emphasizes the need to be out of your home regularly. It's simply too easy to find things around the house that can distract you.

FRIDAY: (A) Do an honest examination of your week's activitiesconsider the number of face to face meetings; the number of actual phone calls completed with the intended party; and the number of new contacts added to your Personal Contact list. (B) Plan your schedule for the next week and develop your goals for the week.

This "typical" week shown above does not include attendance at various Job Support groups. But I would certainly advocate regular attendance at one or more job support groups; often you can obtain leads and/or pertinent information about potential employers from other attendees. Perhaps you could set up an accountability group, of five or six other job seekers, from such organizations.

There are a great number of job support groups; many of them are listed on the www.WORK MINIS-TRY.com web site. In addition to those, a number of involved organizations have sub sets or "functional job support groups" i.e., oriented to financial, production, marketing and/or human resources professionals. Ask around when you go to the regular Job Support groups. Check them out on the Internet. There is one caveat about job support groups—don't allow attendance at their meetings to compromise your availability to meet with potential employers. In other words, don't allow job support groups to become your hideaway.

Obviously every job seeker develops his/her own way of organizing their day or week. The key to a successful job search is having an organizedapproachhoweverunique it might be; if it works for you, that's great.

Hope this column is helpful to job seekers wondering how to get started in their job search. Carpe







Brian Dennehy and Jennifer Tarver: We Have Had a Conversation

Goodman Theatre is presenting the extraordinarily rich plays Hughie by Eugene O'Neill, and Krapp's Last Tape by Samuel Beckett. They are both powerful one act masterpieces.

Brian Dennehy, who stars in both plays, and director Jennifer Tarver (Canada's Stratford Shakespeare Festival), discussed those plays at Goodman's Artists Talk. The discussion was moderated by Richard Christiansen, former Chicago Tribune theatre critic.

Jennifer: "Beckett writes thru time and space."

JT: Krapp's Last Tape is an ex-

traordinary piece. We constantly find new meaning and ideas in it.

BD: "Beckett's plays are like an exploration of a new country. The great cosmic joke for Beckett is existence itself. He uses the banana peel on the floor to remind us to live for the happiness and pleasure of the moment."

BD: "We 'see' ourselves a certain way. The ancient Romans called this persona. We put on a view of ourselves every morning, like a suit. Krapp is part of us, part of humanity."

From On Stage: "It is ultimately not the actors or the director or even the playwright that matters most, but what transpires between the play and its audience." Or, as Dennehy said during the discussion: "The most wonderful sound in theater, after a play is silence."





Celtic Kitchen -Pure and Simple

The Proper Cuppa Tea

During a recent conversation with local Irishman John Ferguson, he reminded me that every once in a while the tried and true must be revisited, refreshed and sometimes relearned. Those lessons can be applied to pouring the perfect pint, baking the perfect soda bread and at Fergie's suggestion, making the perfect cup of Irish tea.

So many are rushed in the morning, trying to get ahead of the clock. They may gulp down a demi tasse of perfectly timed coffee from the perfectly programmed coffee maker. Or, they may drink tea and simply toss a bag of their favorite blend into a travel thermos and chase it with hot water from a recently whistling kettle. Drop a teaspoon or two of sugar in the mug and it's done.

Fast forward eight hours and it's time for dinner. The American trend has been to try to get dinner on the table as fast as possible due to hunger, evening activities, everyday rituals. With all of the activities and rushing around, taking a little time for a tradi-

tional Irish necessity may encourage a sense of peacefulness, or maybe even a little weight loss after the holidays and Mardi Gras.

Tea time was established in the British Isles in the mid 1600's, from Portugal, and created a time for a light meal set between 3 pm and 5 pm. While the royal court found the meal to be civilizing and calming during the day's activities, the working class found that having tea and a biscuit also helped them break the day and soothe hunger until the end of their work. It was and is a daily ritual that calms the nerves and the appetite with a warming and milky tea. In doing so, dinner could be made in smaller portions, thereby saving the food costs and, inevitably controlling weight.

Teatime does not have to be a grand production with finest china, your great grandmother's table linen or expensive shopping at the high-end spe- if preferred. cialty grocery store. Just a few items and a light snack to ward off hunger.

To start this time honored necessity, into tea pot or cup to warm. guidance in making THE proper cup of tea is essential, so says Fergie.

1) In preparation, one must have 8-10 oz cups. (Anything more, and it's agrande/tall/ventewhateversupersize. Too much of a good thing is too much.) ~ A favorite black tea, preferably without string staple. (Herbal won't work). ~ Lots of fresh water. ~ Tea pot OR saucer to 'lid' the tea cup, to keep in heat. Milk and/or sugar/honey

3) Boil more fresh water. When water is at a mad boil, pour out warming water, drop in tea bags and quickly pour in still boiling water.

4) COVER with either tea pot lid or saucer. Heat is paramount for releasing all of the flavor from the tea. At this point, a 'tea cozy' can be put over the pot. It looks like a very large oven mitt. This again, is to keep in heat.

5) Let the tea steep for five minutes.

The suggestions below (which are included in the picture) are quick, easy and can be adapted for a semi rushed afternoon or an afternoon tea on Mother's Day. The options are limitless. Bon appetit!

Illinois Supreme Court Declares Medical Malpractice Caps Unconstitutional

For the third time, the Illinois Supreme Court has declared arbitrary caps on non-economic damage awards in medical malpractice cases unconstitutional. The most recent case, Lebron v. Gottlieb Memorial Hospital, relates to a 2005 law passed by the Illinois General Assembly which capped an injured plaintiff's

recovery of non-economic damages (disability, pain and suffering, disfigurement and loss of society) in medical malpractice cases to \$500,000 in cases against a physician and \$1,000,000 in cases against a hospital. This cap would be imposed on every medical malpractice case, regardless of the severity of the injury or the age of the injured plaintiff.

Under the law, the jury would not be informed of the cap. As such, a jury could return a verdict against a doctor for \$2,000,000 and after the trial the trial court would be required to reduce the verdict to \$500,000.

In the Supreme Court, the caps were opposed not just by the injured plaintiff, but by the American, Illinois State, Cook County, and Chicago Bar Associations, all of which comprise of attorneys who work on behalf of injured persons and also those who work on behalf of doctors, hospitals and insurance companies. Additionally, the caps were opposed by the Woman's Bar Association, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), and the Illinois Alliance for Retired Americans. These groups opposed the caps inpartbecause capson non-economic damages disproportionately affect women, racial minorities and older individuals.

Finally, the AFL-CIO and the Chicago Federation of Labor filed briefs in opposition to the caps, as well as a group of almost 25 law and social sciences professors who provided statistical evidence undermining the alleged "health care crisis" and "doctor flight" from Illinois. Conversely, the only groups who supported the caps were associations of doctors and hospitals. Not a single independent or bi-partisan group filed supporting briefs in the Supreme Court supporting the caps.

At the time the Act was passed but before it was signed by then-Governor

Blagojevich, this column featured an article arguing that the Governor should not sign the bill into law because it was unconstitutional, and because it would not solve the problem of increasing insurance premiums on the medical profession. This article will discuss the LeBron case and future articles will discuss the validity of criticisms of the decision.

Abigaile LeBron

Shortly after the medical malpractice caps were passed by the General Assembly and signed into law, Abigail Lebron was born. As a result of alleged medical errors during her delivery, Abigail suffers from a severe brain injury, cerebral palsy, abnormal neurological function and needs to be fed through a tube in her stomach. Abigail's mother filed suit against the doctor and hospital involved with Abigail's care, and filed a motion requesting that the trial court find the cap on non-economic damages unconstitutional.

After extensive briefing a Circuit Court judge found that the caps violated the separation of powers clause of the Illinois Constitution because it acts as a legislative remittitur. A remittitur is the right of a judge to reduce a jury verdict if they feel it is unreasonably high. The judge will either reduce the verdict to an amounthe feels is appropriate or order that a new trial as to the amount of damages be conducted with a new jury. The only limitation on the judge is that they order a remittitur based on the facts and circumstances of the particular case before him.

Caps on non-economic damages operate as a legislative remittitur. In other words, rather than having a judge who has viewed the evidence and heard testimony from witnesses decide whether a verdict in a particular case is too high, the legislature has arbitrarily capped damages at a certain amount. Because a remittitur is a function given to the judicial branch (the courts), having the legislature impose a remittitur is a violation of separation of powers. Therefore, the judge ruled that the Act was unconstitutional and could not be applied.

The Supreme

Court's Decision

Under Illinois law, if a judge finds a state law unconstitutional, the parties are allowed an automatic and immediate appeal to the Supreme Court of Illinois. As described above, prior to issuing its decision, the Supreme Court received briefs not just by the parties to the LeBron case, but from over 20 entities who submitted "friend of the court" briefs, as well as a brief from the Illinois Attorney

General, who is allowed to intervene in cases where a state law is found unconstitutional.

After extensive briefing and oral argument, the Supreme Court affirmed the trial court's finding that the statute was unconstitutional. The Court noted that in 1997 it held in the Best case that a \$500,000 cap on non-economic damages was unconstitutional because it violated the separation of powers clause of the Illinois Constitution and violated the Illinois' Constitutions prohibition on "special legislation." The special legislation clause prohibits arbitrary legislative classifications that discriminate in favor of a select group without a sound, reasonable basis. The Court found the cap on noneconomic damages penalized the most severely injured individuals, and thus was special legislation.

Likewise, in 1976, the Supreme Court invalidated a similar medical malpractice cap in another case. Thus, the LeBron decision is the third time the Supreme Court has found that non-economic damage caps in medical malpractice cases was unconstitutional.

In LeBron, the Supreme Court reiterated that legislatively imposed caps on non-economic damages violates the separation of powers clause. It is first and foremost the role of a jury to assess the nature and extent of an individual's injuries. It is then the role of the trial judge, who has had an opportunity to see the particulars of a case to decide whether the jury's verdict is excessive. It is not the legislature's role to impose an arbitrary one size fits all cap on damages.


The Court also addressed the fact that several other states do have medical malpractice caps that have withstood constitutional scrutiny in those states. However, the Court rejected "everybody is doing it" as the test for determining the constitutionality of an Illinois state law.

Since the Supreme Court's decision, the same rhetoric that fueled the caps imposition has again resurfaced as criticism of the decision. Next month we will discuss whether doctors are really leaving the state, whetherthefilingsorverdictamounts of medical malpractice cases are rising, and whether malpractice claims

have a significant effect on the cost of health care.

An Immigrant's Musings

Is Immigration Reform Dead For 2010?

I have been asked this question numerous times since President Obama's first State of theUnion last month. Politicians never cease to surprise me. Political promises rarely impress me. Words are cheap and plentiful on the campaign trail; actions are what matter. As someone famously said: "when all is said and done, there is more said than done."

President Obama promised to pursue Immigration Reform in his first year in office. Well so much for that promise, here we are two months into his second year and still no action. What the President had to say with his afterthought reference to immigration leaves one wondering if the administration is really serious about a push for a comprehensive immigration reform plan in Congress this year.

"And we should continue the work of fixing our broken immigration system, to secure our borders, and enforce our laws, and ensure that everyone who plays by the rules can contribute to our economy and enrich our nation." What concerns most advocates is the fact that this statement of President Obama's was delivered with no conviction and no plan or call to Congress for action. In fact the statement did not even mention the word comprehensive.

To those who say now is not the time to approach immigration reform and who point to an unemployment rate of 10%, I ask, when is the right time? I think history has a lesson for us here. President Regan undertook the last major overhaul of our immigration law in 1986 at a time when unemployment was running about 7.5%. In fact a new study points to



nomic potential of the estimated 12 million out of statusimmigrants already living here.Researchers at UCLA found

that comprehensive immigration reform could add as much as \$1.5 trillion to the U.S. G.D.P. over 10 years. The study sponsored by the Immigration Policy Center and the Center for American Progress, was based on surveys after federal legislation in 1986 that legalized about three million undocumented workers. Based on the experiences of the 1986 legislation, the study concluded that immigrant workers who gain legal status go on to make contributions at higher levels in the economy and to the society as a whole. They move on to better jobs, they become more educated, they consume more, so they spend more, and pay more taxes. It has also been pointed out by other economists that legalizing the undocumented population would also help the housing sector to recover as these folks would be in the market for new homes

The study from UCLA also considered a hypothetical outcome for U.S. immigration reform. What if it were possible to deport all illegal immigrants workers? (A proposal, which the anti-immigration lobby strongly support) What would happen then? The study found that mass deportation would reduce the national GDP by \$2.6 trillion over 10 years. Even during a recession, American workers could not fill the gap the immigrants would

President Obama did make another reference to immigrants in his speech: "In the end, it's our ideals, our values that built America, values that allowed us to forge a nation made up of immigrants from every corner of the globe, values that drive our citizens still. "For America to work at its best and to endure, all of its people have to share the same values

theuntappedeco- and ideals. That can't happen when millions of residents are excluded from participating in all the country has to offer. Mr. President and members of Congress... this great nation can truly be a place of prosperity for all its citizens and for "the strangers who live among us". 


