There is more. To a great extent the Labour tail seems to have wagged the Fine Gael dog. All Fine Gael could point to was holding the line on income tax rates and tax bands together with a flat rate property tax of €00 per household. This last has been greeted with howls of protest from the opposition and the government is running scared enough to have flagged its intention to introduce a graduated property tax (those in better homes paying more) earlier than intended. Clearly there is a fear that some Labour horses – and even some Fine Gael ones - may bolt.

Moreover, failure to grasp the big nettles of benefit cuts and public sector pay and pensions entailed many minor, politically embarrassing and damaging cuts throughout the rest of the budget to achieve the necessary overall targets. Notable here was a proposed savage cut in payments to handicapped 16 and 17 year olds, yielding peanuts financially, and less than twice the cost of the salaries of Ministerial special advisers. The government at least had the cop-on to drop this proposal forthwith. Almost equally damaging were cuts in small grant assisted local and community projects, which, as well as being targeted at the socially disadvantaged, took people off the dole.

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



Toyota and Sudden **Acceleration Cases**

For over two years, Toyota Motor Company has been featured prominently in news reports concerning accidents, injuries and even deaths caused by sudden and unexplained acceleration occurring in certain model Toyotas. Now, some of those claims are coming to trial in courts throughout the country.

After initially admitting that problems with the gas pedals caused some cars to accelerate when drivers did not intend, issuing three recalls, and actually settling one case, Toyota has now begun to defend vigorously these claims. It appears that the defense strategy is to simply blame the driver.

Toyota Sudden Acceleration Recalls

The recalls began in 2009 when Toyota received reports of unintended acceleration. The first recall, in November 2009, was to correct a problem with an out-of-place front driver's side floor mat in the foot pedal well. Toyota claimed that the floor mats were causing the accelerator pedal to become entrapped, which, in turn, resulted in unexpected acceleration.

However, the same problems continued after the floor mats were recalled. Toyota continued to receive reports of unintended acceleration by Toyota drivers. After several of these crashes were found not to have been caused by the floor mat, Toyota issued a second recall in January 2010. This time, the defect was identified as a possible mechanical sticking of the accelerator pedal causing unintended acceleration. The next month, in February 2010, Toyota issued a third recall for its hybrid anti-lock braking software.

According to Toyota, by the end of January 2010, the recalls affected over 9 million vehicles worldwide, including some related Lexus models. As of that time, 37 deaths were alleged to have resulted from the sudden acceleration problem. That number has increased in the last two years.

Toyota litigation hitting full stride

called an additional 2 million vehicles for gas pedals that became trapped on floor hardware. Today, Toyota is facing

over 300 lawsuits for injuries and deaths allegedly caused by unintended acceleration in 2009 and 2010.

Some of these cases are now moving closer and closer to trial. As they do, the plaintiffs' theories of liability and Toyota's theories of defense have become clearer. The plaintiffs in these cases allege that certain Toyota vehicles were defective, and that Toyota had the technology to implement a brake override system as a safety solution for the sudden acceleration problems, but chose not to do so. In a departure from its earlier willingness to settle these types of claims, Toyota now argues that the actions of the driver error were the reasons for sudden acceleration in many cases.

One such case, filed in the U.S. District Court in California, was brought by the family of a Utah man who crashed into a stone wall after exiting interstate 80. The man and his soon-to-be daughter-in-law died as a result of the crash. The man's wife and son reported to police that the man had tried to apply his brakes but could not. Police identified skid marks leading up to the scene of the crash. This evidence would indicate that the plaintiff was attempting to brake while the car was accelerating, but was unable to do so.

Toyota denies that the lack of a brake override system was a cause of the accident, and claims that any injuries to the plaintiffs in that case "were caused in whole or in part" by the driver's actions. In that case, Toyota intends to rely on evidence from the car's black box recorders that the driver never hit the brakes. However, the information in the black box recorder is limited to only a few seconds before a crash. The case is set to be tried in February 2013.

Toyota changed its stance on sudden acceleration

Toyota's most recent position on this matter stands in contrast to the position Toyota took when the scope of the recall appeared more limited. In September 2010, Toyota paid \$10 million to settle the case of one California family. In that case, an off-duty police officer crashed into a ravine near San Diego, killing the officer, his wife, 13 year-old daughter, and brother. Attempts to keep the amount of the settlement confidential were rejected by a California Superior Court judge. Toyota claims that the California settlement was not an admission of liability to be used against it in future cases. Instead, Toyota now intends to defend many of these claims on theories revolving around driver error.

Product Liability Claims



Hoping That It Will Just Go Away

I didn't think that I would be writing about Vita Cortex, the Cork manufacturing plant. I really didn't. I had thought that by now even a Government as uncaring by choice and ruthless, self-serving, brutal and wicked by nature would have felt that even they were obliged to find a way out this mess by now. Maurice McNally (M): Yes, my construction experience does help me evaluate the pros and cons of previous construction. Therefore,



I believe it is essential to involve a contractor as early as possible. I have been included in a number of site searches where I helped evaluate office spaces and restaurant establishments to estimate build out timing and costs before any lease or purchase document was signed. Avondale is more than happy to work directly with a commercial real estate broker and tenant to tour perspective spaces.

O: So you can work directly with our firm and a tenant to evaluate approximate timing on build outs?

M: Yes. Many tenants may not understand the time needed to build out a commercial space. Build out doesn't just involved the contractor. We team up with an architect to design the space, then bring those plans to the proper city for permitting, and finally start construction. The permit process and applications can be quite cumbersome and lengthy, taking up to about 30 days in certain cities. Meaning we can't even start construction for a month.

O: We advise people all the time to start their search for space anywhere from 6-12 months out for most commercial needs, longer if they require a larger space or more built out. Would you say that is true?

M: Definitely. In my experience, it takes

most companies or restaurants 1-2 months to find the space they need. Add another month at minimum for negotiations and attorney review. That is three months before the space is even ready for construction. When we work hand in hand with brokers, we are able to bring in architects and necessary construction professionals during negotiation so that we can be ready for construction as soon as proper documents are signed. But many times, we aren't brought in till the 11th hour, meaning we have to play catch up on the project.

Clear communication. Mutual understanding of the symptoms and

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Try Your Luck at Twenty-Five

Introduction and Compilation by Michael Boyle

If you've ever been looking for a game steeped in Irish origins, you may just be in luck with the game of 25, a fast-paced card game from the rural pubs of Ireland. The ranking order of cards is a little different than most games, but after a few hands, you won't even think about it. You and your opponents play with a hand of five cards each and are tasked with taking tricks. Each trick is worth five points, and the first person to 25 points wins the game.

Twenty-five games are played every Friday evening in the Fifth Province lounge at the Irish American Heritage Center 4626 N Knox in Chicago at 7:30pm. Beginners and advanced players are all welcome. Instruction is available.

Introduction

Twenty-Five could be considered the national card game of Ireland: it is played widely in rural pubs and at home. The game moves quite quickly - it does not take long to play a hand. Though there is luck involved, there is also some scope for skill. It is normally played by about five people but can be played by as few as two or as many as ten. The ranking order of the cards may seem a little arcane at first, but with a little practice it becomes second nature.

As well as the basic game, there are more complicated bidding versions called 55, 110 or 220 depending on the final score to be attained.

Players

The game is normally played by from 3 to 9 people; two-player and ten-player games are possible, but the two-player game is not very interesting and ten players might prefer to split into two five-player games. Any number can play as individuals; 4, 6 or 8 (or 10) can play in pairs, partners sitting opposite each other; the nine-player game can be played between three teams of three, each player sitting between members of the two other teams. The most common number of players in a game is 6. In large tournaments, the most common format is 9 players.

United States took place in December 2011 and votes are currently being tabulated. The 2012 inductees will be announced on March 1.

The IAHOF's goal is to preserve and promote the stories of the Irish in America and the ongoing links between Ireland and the United States. The Hall of Fame was founded by members of the Chicago-based Irish American Heritage Center (IAHC). While the Hall of Fame is an organization born of and operated under the auspices of the IAHC, it will be overseen by a separate governing committee and have a national focus. The IAHOF's initial emphasis will be on electronic and online information and inductees are commemorated with a display at the IAHC. The vision is for a bricks-and-mortar museum to be founded as the hall of fame grows. The Awards Gala recognizing the 2012 inductees will be held on April 28, 2012 at the Irish American Heritage Center.

Object of the Game

The object of the game is to be the first player or team to twenty five points, scoring five points per trick. This will usually take two or more deals. For an evening of fun, players or teams will play the first to 5 games and offer a prize for the winning team.

Play

One card is played by each player, in turn, starting with the player to the left of the dealer and continuing clockwise, to player's left, around the table. The winner of the trick is determined by who played the highest card in that round. The winner gets five points (on his way to 25). Points are added up based on tricks won. If a player or team reached 25 points (including points earned in previous rounds), that player/team wins. If more than one player/team reaches 25 points in the same round, the player/team who reached 25 points first is the winner.

trumps, Jack of trumps, or Ace of hearts. These cards can be reneged unless a better card has been led. This means that the 5 of trumps can always be reneged. A player might wish to save a powerful card if he believes that another player is saving another strong card, or if the player is trying to prevent a different team from winning a game. The action of holding a card in this fashion is known as "reneging."

Points are added from round to round until a player or team reaches 25 and wins.

Once a player has revealed his card to players, that card is deemed to be played.

A common question among players who are not paying attention is to ask "what was led". They want to know the name of the suit of the card that was played first in that round. A common answer to this question is something like "heart led, spades up" or "hearts led, spades trump".

Ranking Order of Cards

Twenty-Five is played with a standard 52- player on the right to cut if he or she wishes to. card pack with jokers removed. In each deal, Then, dealing to his left, the dealer deals five



If no player or team reaches 25 points, the deal is given to the player to the left of the last dealer and a new round begins.

Players must always follow the suit of the first player to play in a trick, if possible. If a non-trump is played, that suit must be followed but a trump can always be played. If a non-trump is led and a subsequent player does not have a card of that suit, that player can play any card of any suit and is not required to play a trump. If a trump is led, if possible a card of the trump suit must be played with the exceptions be the 5 and Jack of trumps, and the Ace of hearts. (See below for rules.) If a trump is led and a subsequent player does not have a trump, that player can play any card.

The card that is lead can only be bettered with a better card in the same suit or with a trump. The player who wins a trick, plays the first card for the next trick.

Any trump suit card beats every non-trump suit card, (except the Ace of Hearts, which will be explained below).

The only time in which a player may choose not to follow trump suit is when the player has one of the best 3 cards in the deck - the 5 of

one suit will be chosen as trumps. The rank of cards is different depending on the color of the suit and whether it is trumps. From high to low, the cards rank as follows:

Trump suit: The rank is:

Hearts: 5,J,A,K,Q,10,9,8,7,6,4,3,2

Diamonds: 5,J,A(Hearts),A(Diamonds),K, Q,10,9,8,7,6,4,3,2

Clubs: 5,J,A(Hearts),A(Clubs),K,Q,2,3,4,5 .6,7,8,9,10

Spades: 5,J,A(Hearts),A(Spades),K,Q,2,3,

4,5,6,7,8,9,10

Non-trump suit:

Hearts: K,Q,J,10,9,8,7,6,5,4,3,2 (Note: Ace of Hearts is always considered a trump.)

Diamonds: K,Q,J,10,9,8,7,6,5,4,3,2,A Clubs: K,Q,J,A,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10 Spades: K,Q,J,A,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10 To summarize:

The highest trump is always the five of the trump suit.

The second highest trump is always the jack of the trump suit.

The third highest trump is always the ace of hearts, no matter what the trump suit is.

If the trump suit is not hearts, the fourth highest trump is the ace of trumps.

After the ace of trumps follow the King, Queen and numeral cards.

In a non-trump suit, the highest card is the King, followed by the Queen, Jack and numeral cards.

Among the numeral cards, the highest cards are best in the red suits, but the lowest cards are best in the black suits: players remember this as "highest in red, lowest in black".

The ace of hearts is always a trump. The other aces, when their suit is not trumps, count as ordinary ones. Therefore the ace of diamonds is the lowest card of its suit when diamonds are not trumps. The black aces, when not trumps, rank between the jack and the two.

Dealing the Cards and "Robbing"

The dealer shuffles and offers the cards to the player on the right to cut if he or she wishes to. Then, dealing to his left, the dealer deals five cards to each person in two circuits of the table. Traditionally, first three cards are dealt to everyone, then followed by two cards to each player. The turn to deal passes to the dealer's left after each hand.

After dealing, the dealer stacks the undealt cards face down in the center of the table. The dealer then announces how many tricks each player/team has won. After announcing, the dealer turns the top card of this card stack face up. The suit of this turned card is trumps for the hand. If you hold the ace of trumps you may "rob" the trump turned up by the dealer. To rob the trump, on your first turn, you must "pay" for the ace by placing any unwanted card from your hand face down in front of you and either take the turned up trump into your hand or leave it on top of the deck. In either case, it is your card to play as you see fit. If the dealer turns up the ace, the dealer robs. In this case, the dealer must "pay" for the ace before anyone plays a card. If the ace of trumps is not dealt, no one can rob the turned trump. If you are entitled to rob the deck trump, it must be done before you play a card in the first trick; else you lose the right to rob.

In the extremely rare case of a player not wanting to rob, he must turn down the deck trump and announce to the table that he holds the ace of trumps and does not wish to rob. If he fails to announce or forgets to rob, he loses his right to play his ace of trumps as the ace, even if it is the ace of hearts. In that case, the ace becomes the lowest ranked trump.

If a deck card is robbed, any player may inquire in the first hand of play what trump suit was turned up, but not thereafter as it disrupts the game.

Misdeals

A misdeal may be called after the cards for a hand are dealt and before the first trick is finished. A misdeal is called if the deck is found to be imperfect, or any but the face card is found face up. In that case the same dealer deals again. However, if any cards are exposed, failure to have cards cut, counting cards in remainder of deck or if too many or too few cards are in a hand, this is also a

misdeal but the dealer loses his deal and the player to his left gets the

Before the dealer turns the trump card, he asks if everyone has five lead was a low trump - the 7) so you cards, then announces the beginning of play, this exempts him from a misdeal. The game must now continue without exception.

Play

The player to dealer's left leads to the first trick. The highest card of the suit led wins unless a trump is played, in which case the highest trump wins. the team or player that wins it. As The winner of each trick plays the first card for the next trick.

When a card of a non-trump suit is led, players who have cards of this suit must either play a card of the suit that was led or play a trump. You are always allowed to play a trump even if you could have followed suit. If you don't wish to play a trump, you must follow suit if you can. However, if you are unable to follow suit you do not have to trump - in this case you may play any card - either a trump or a card of another non-trump suit.

When a trump is led, the other players must play trumps if possible, with the exception of the top three trumps (the 5, J and A), which have the privilege of reneging. You can never be forced to play any of these three top trumps unless another player leads a better trump than the one you hold. A player who holds no trumps (except possibly one or more of the top three when a lower trump was led) may play

Note that for the purposes of following suit, the ace of hearts counts as a trump, not as a heart. However, if the ace of hearts is led and you do not have a trump, you must play a heart if you have one.

Examples:

Spades are trumps. You hold the 5 of spades, Ace of hearts and no other trumps. The 7 of spades is led. Your trumps are both from the top three cards and better than the lead, so you do not have to play either of them you may play any card.

Spades are trumps. You hold 5 of spades, Ace of spades and no other trumps. The 7 of spades is led. The Ace of spades does not have the privilege of reneging, so you must play either this or your other trump, the 5 of spades. You cannot throw a card of another suit on this trick.

Spades are trumps. You hold Ace of hearts and no other trumps. The Jack of spades is led. Since the trump that was led is better than yours, you are forced to play your Ace of hearts.

Spades are trumps. You hold Ace of hearts and no other trumps. The 7 of spades is led and the next player plays the 5 of spades. You are the third

player. Although the trick contains a and usually wins the trick. card that is higher than yours, that high trump was not led, i.e. was not the first card played to the trick (the need not play your Ace of hearts. You are free to play any card to this trick.

Spades are trumps. You hold the King of hearts and no trumps. The Ace of hearts is led. You must play your King of hearts.

Scoring

Each trick is worth five points to soon as a player or team reaches 25 points (i.e. has won five tricks), the player or team announces the win and the game is over. If no one has reached 25 at the end of the hand, the next dealer shuffles, the cards are cut, and a new hand is dealt and played.

Note that the game very often ends in the middle before all the cards are played. As soon as a player or team wins its fifth trick, reaching 25 points, play stops and the winners are paid. If another game is to be played the cards are shuffled and there is a new

Usually the game is played for a small stake, for example 20 pence. Some people pay for each game, but when the game is played between two teams, some play the best of five games, in which case the first team to win three games wins the stake.

It is often agreed that if one player or team wins in one hand by winning all five tricks (for 25 points), that entitles them to a double stake (40 pence if the basic stake per game was 20 pence). The five tricks do not necessarily have to be won in the first hand, but in order to claim the double stake, the player or team must have no previous score in that game.

Example of Play of a Hand

Three players are A, B, and C. A is the dealer and deals three cards to each player, and then two cards to each player. He then turns up the two of spades - thus spades are trumps.

The three hands

A: 9 of spades, 4 of spades, 10 of clubs, J of hearts, J of diamonds.

B: Q of hearts, Q of spades, Ace of spades, 6 of clubs, 2 of diamonds (used to pay for "the rob")

C: K of hearts, 5 of clubs, 8 of diamonds, 5 of spades, 10 of hearts.

Plav

Trick 1: B places his 2 of diamonds face down on the table indicating that he is robbing the two of spades and leads the Q of hearts, C plays the K of hearts and A plays the 9 of spades, happy to have won a trick with his little trump. A wins the first trick. This first trick is traditionally called the "dealing trick" because the dealer has the last play

Trick 2: A leads the 4 of spades (a trump). B plays his Q of spades (trump) and C wanting to keep his 5 of spades (the highest trump) reneges his 5 of spades (his privilege) and instead plays his 5 of clubs. B wins the second trick.

Trick 3: B now leads the ace of spades (ace of trumps). To this C reneges his 5 of spades (his privilege) and plays the 8 of diamonds (now the worst card in his hand) instead. A plays a lowly 10 of clubs. B wins the third trick.

Trick 4: B then leads his other trump (from the top of the deck) the 2 of spades. C (with a smile) plays the five, and A plays the J of hearts. C wins the fourth trick.

Trick 5: C then leads the 10 of hearts, winning against A's Jack of Diamonds and B's 6 of clubs.

Score:

A: 1 trick therefore 5 points

B: 2 tricks therefore 10 points

C: 2 tricks therefore 10 points.

The cards are combined, shuffled and the next player to the left deals the next hand.

Playing a Game with Partners

Before playing a game of partners, all players sit at a table. Any player, traditionally the host, picks up the cards and shuffles. That player (the host) then announces the "partner" cards. For example, the host says "Jacks and red Aces for partners." The next step is what is called "throwing for partners." The host deals the cards face up one at a time to all players at the table. Once a player receives a "partner card", that player's cards are turned face down and is said to be "looking for a partner." The first two players to receive a "partner card" become partners. The next two to receive a "partner card" become partners and so on until all the partners are matched.

The first player who received a "partner card" does not move from his position at the table and also becomes the first dealer. The players are re-aligned around the table so that partners are opposite each other. For example: six players would make a game for three teams we'll call teams A, B, and C. The players would be aligned ABCABC around the table. For nine players, the alignment is ABCABCABC.

Glossary

Boarded – The suit of the first card played in a hand is said to be the suit that was "boarded."

Booking Your Hand - When a player does not feel his hand is any good, he throws down his hand and refuses to play that hand. This action disrupts the game and is prohibited.

Co-card – Any non-trump card in

your hand is called a co-card.

Count – The count is the score of the game up to that point. For example, the count could be expressed as "two tens and a five" or "fifteen ten" or a similar description.

Fall of Play – The dealer always has the "fall of play" for the first trick. This means that the dealer is the last to play in the first trick, an advantage for the dealer on that trick. When a trick is taken, the player to the immediate right of the player who won is said to have the "fall of play."

High man – The player or team with the most tricks is said to be "high man." The other players or teams will generally cooperate to stop the "high man" from getting more tricks.

Jink – When a player or team wins all the tricks in one hand, he scores all 25 points and wins the game with a "jink." Some provide a double payout for a jink if playing for money. This should be agreed to before the players begin play.

Playing in His Place - In a game of six players, the player two out from the dealer is expected to "stick" the dealer in the first trick. This involves playing a good card to make it harder for the dealer to take the first trick. This is also done for all subsequent tricks to prevent the last player from getting an easy trick. A player who "sticks" the dealer, is said to be "playing in his place" or "going in his

place."

Reneging – Failure to play card of the same suit as the card that was led for a trick. This is usually for a trump suit but not necessarily. When discovered, the player at fault must turn his hand face down. He forfeits his interest in the remainder of that hand. Any tricks taken legally he retains. Tricks deemed no legal he loses. If the reneging is discovered after the hand is played, the player and team forfeit any tricks affected by the illegal play. The penalty should be agreed to by the majority of the players at the table.

Saver – A small trump card that can be used to save your best trump in case a stronger trump is led. If the stronger trump is played, the small trump card can be played.

Speech Play – Any player found giving signals by hand, eye, voice, or any other means must, upon discovery, turn his hand face down and that player and team forfeits any trick taken in that hand. Any tricks taken before the incident he keeps. Speaking about the game, including asking the count, is allowed up until the trump card is turned up on the deck at the start of a hand.

Trick – The best card played in a round of play wins a "trick." Each "trick" is 5 points, and thus it takes five "tricks" to win a game of Twenty

On January 22, eight "shoot and kill are obviously different essary lethal force days before Bloody Sunday, hundreds marched with NICRA to Magilligan, the worst of the internment camps, northeast of Derry. They were met by some 300 British Army Green Jackets and Parachute Regiment troops who beat protesters so severely they had to be physically restrained by their own officers. News reports showed people being savagely kicked as they lay on the ground and rubber bullets and CS gas canisters being fired at them from close range.

Saville counsel Christopher Clarke, QC said some witnesses had a sense of foreboding about the coming Derry march because paratroops at Magilligan warned them "with some belligerence" that they would: "see them next week".

arlier that January Major-General Robert Ford, the Army's second in command in Northern Ireland, met with Derry merchants concerned lest rioting occur in the city center and damage shops there. Sir Robert penned a secret memo to his superior, Sir Harry Tuzo, General Officer Commanding, stating that soldiers were taking hails of missiles like "Aunt Sallies". Ford's recommendation: "I am coming to the conclusion that the minimum force necessary to achieve a restoration of law and order is to shoot selected ringleaders..."

Questioned at the Saville Inquiry, Sir Robert testified he was not recommending soldiers kill citizens, noting: words".

Six days before Bloody Sunday, Ford overruled objections by Derry commander Brigadier Pat MacLellan and local police chief Frank Lagan to his proposed use of the paras. Senior Derry-based officers expressed similar alarm. One officer even phoned a military contact in London to try to get Chief of General Staff Sir Michael Carver to intervene.

On Thursday, January 27, the Democratic Unionist Association in Derry, the youth wing of Ian Paisley's Democratic Unionist Party defiantly announced their intention to hold a public "religious rally" Sunday at Guildhall Square, the announced end point of the NICRA march. Their Vice-President, Free Presbyterian Church minister James McClelland declared: "The authorities will have to keep their word and stop the civil rights march and give us protection."

Friday, January 28, a British cabinet committee met at 10 Downing Street, London, and approved security plans for the march. Lord Gifford QC, representing the family of one of the victims, told the inquiry facts suggested there was a plan to shoot unarmed civilians and this was known by Prime Ministers Sir Edward Heath and Brian Faulkner. However the 2011 Saville Report issued its carefully worded conclusion: "Neither the UK nor Northern Ireland governments planned or foresaw the use of unnec-

On Saturday the British Army and police issued a joint statement warning that any violence the next day would be blamed on NICRA. Rioting that day in William Street ended with two teenagers wounded by army gunfire. Soldier 027 testified that groups of paratroopers that evening boasted about getting "kills" when they arrived in Derry.

Sunday January 30, 1972: The Paratroop Regiment arrives in Derry. Morning papers announce the Protestant rally is called off at the last minute. Rev. McClelland says ominously: "We were approached by the Government and given assurances that the Civil Rights march would be halted - by force if necessary. We believe wholesale riot and bloodshed could be the result of the Civil Rights activities tomorrow and we would be held responsible if our rally takes place. We have appealed to all loyalists to stay out of the city centre tomorrow."

CS gas, water cannon, rubber bullets, internment and martial law had failed to stop Catholic protest. The stage was now set for a showdown between the British government and its Irish Catholic citizens.

10,000 began to march, their numbers doubling along the 3-mile walk to the Bogside. They are stopped by a British army barricade, and as they turn to move to Free Derry Corner, the paratroops unleash a barrage of gas, water cannon and rubber baton rounds.

General Ford, though he had no operational role that day, travelled to Derry and stood at the edge of the Bogside behind Barrier 14 shouting 'Go on the paras!" as they charged through a barricade towards what became the Rossville Street killing ground. As Commander of Land Forces, Northern Ireland, Ford was the most senior officer on the ground on Bloody Sunday. The next year Queen Elizabeth awarded Ford the CB, Companion of The Most Honorable Order of the Bath.

Then a hail of bullets. 17 year old Jackie Duddy, a young club boxer and uncle of now retired middleweight boxing champion John Duddy, is the first murdered. He was running alongside Father (later Bishop) Daly when he was shot from behind by Private R.

Commenters have suggested that this image has its origin in Hebrew apocalyticism and even earlier in pagan sources.

For a long time there has been a connection between the resurrection of Jesus on the day after the Sabbath-the seventh day-making it the eighth day. Does that mean that the Artist/ Scribes were steeped in the esoteric levels of numerology? Not necessarily,

but the legacy of the Resurrection contained the Christian sacred ideas of renewal and rebirth.



Every section of f33r is unique. Although each irregular banded section behind the double-armed cross contains an interlace design, each is a different pattern. Also, the interlacing is primarily made of peacocks and snakes. These animals are both symbols of Christ's resurrection and renewal. Other sections appear to be interlaced dogs and \bar{in} one section there are men entwined with the animals.

The eight circles of the cross are filled with over 400 yellow-gold colored spirals and discs. They are the kind of amazing artistic skills



When the police had to enter in 1947, because of the smell of a dead body, they had to spend hours in the tunnels the brothers had made in the stocks of newspapers and other clutter. The house was so packed that the play's subtitle is: The True Story of the Collyer Brothers Who Never Threw Anything Out.

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
Real Ireland

Irish Seaweed Kitchen

When I was thirteen years old I spent a week at Knockadoon Summer Camp in Ballymacoda, located about thirty miles from Cork City. Conditions were primitive at best, sharing what seemed like army



barracks quarters with friends.

It was a mere stones throw from the beach and this Dominican run facility provided a lifetime of memories and a fascination with seaweed for me, for it was here that I began to learn about the infinite source of vitamins and minerals that these sea vegetables provides us.

We gathered samples, brought them back to the classroom, identified their class and even sketched them. We ambled over the rocks and pottered around daily in rain or shine studying the zones, namely Upper, Middle and Lower. That was the extent of my experience with seaweed but not with my fascination.

Earlier last year I was reading various articles on the internet and quite by chance stumbled upon a website www. Prannie.com.

Prannie Rhatigan has been harvesting and cooking with seaweed since she was a child.

Born and raised on the west coast of Ireland and thanks to her father, she was taught how to harvest seaweed and how not to get trapped by the ever changing tides

In 1990 she received her medical degree from the National University of Ireland, Cork and became a qualified General Practitioner (internal medicine) since 1994.

Once you enter this web site, you will discover how this medical doctor has managed to marry her knowledge of western medicine with the ancient nutritional value of seaweed. The gallery os photographs is a veritable treat for the eyes. After reading

this, I knew I needed to read her book. It is called 'Irish Seaweed Kitchen' and is a comprehensive guide to healthy everyday cooking with seaweeds. The book is quite simply a wonderful treat. Filled with 150 easy to follow recipes and 100 color photographs. Even if you do not plan on cooking with seaweed (which I urge you to try) there is a glossary accompanied by a list of health benefits and uses.

Most people will have memories of 'Carrageen Moss' known as Chondrus crispus or commonly called Irish Moss. We used to spend summer vacations in Ardmore, Co Waterford and this seaweed was sold dried in the local store. It was popular for sore throats and healing properties. In this book Myrtle Allen from the famous 'Ballymaloe House' shares her memories and recipe for 'Carrageen Moss Pudding'

Recently I had the pleasure of speaking to Prannie. She explained that there was a very exciting research project being conducted at the University of Ulster. Eighty volunteers are being given seaweed on a daily basis over a period of approximately four weeks. Some are being given a placebo.

The anti inflammatory properties are so high in seaweed so this ground breaking research will be something we can all look forward to.

Prannie suggests introducing small amounts of a wide variety of seaweed on a daily basis for your health and well being.

Last weekend I made this banana bread recipe for my family. Taken from Prannie's book, it is made using 3/4 oz of dried Alaria.

Banana and Alaria Loaf

3/4 oz dried alaria

(1/4 " pieces)

2 eggs

4 oz golden raisins

2 Tblsp honey

1 Tblsp rum (optional)

3 oz melted butter

2 Tblsp sugar

8 oz all purpose flour

2 tsp baking powder

3 bananas

To Prepare the Alaria

Soak the Alaria in a saucepan with 1/2 pint of water for 20 minutes. Place on a low heat and simmer, covered, for 40 minutes or until the mid stern is soft. Allow to cool slightly.

Preheat Oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease and flour a 2lb loaf pan or two 1lb loaf pans.

Beat the eggs in a small bowl. Soak

medicine with the golden raisins in the eggs and allow the ancient nuto plump. Add honey and rum if using to tritional value the seaweed and cooking liquid.

Melt the butter in a saucepan, stir in the sugar and allow to cool slightly. Add the honeyed seaweed and the soaked golden raisins in egg mixture.

Mix the flour and baking powder in a large bowl. Add a large tablespoon of this to the wet mixture and mix well. Gently fold in the remaining flour mixture.

Stir in mashed bananas. Spoon the mixture, which should be of a soft dropping consistency, into the prepared tin. Bake on the middle shelf for 90 minutes. Remove and cool.

How Do You Attract A Career Mentor?

larly tell me about costly and avoidable mistakes they have made in their careers. Just this week, a mature and well educated client told me that he prided himself on only calling his boss when he had a serious problem. WRONG. You need to walk the line between being a whiner and an individual who keeps the boss in the loop. If you have the benefit of a mentor, you probably would have learned to keep in touch with your boss. Bosses may outwardly agree with the statement "call me only when the ship is floundering." However, most bosses like to know what's happening with their subordinates, if only because their boss might ask them about the status of an issue.

Throughout our lives, many of us have received guidance from mentors of one type or another. Parents, teachers, coaches or even just more talented pals served as role models or guides. Unfortunately, after taking our first significant job, many of us allow our advisors to slip away. Maybe we do this to prove to ourselves that we have made the passage into adulthood. Or maybe it because we are Intent on proving ourselves to our superior. Whatever the underlying reason, we make silly and costly mistakes that could have been avoided by enlisting the advice and insights of others who have more experience. People who realize the importance of attracting and keeping mentors greatly improve their odds of career success. One does not have to make every mistake personally to learn from the mistakes of others. Isn't that why so many of us read books? Hopefully, just by reading of the authors' experiences, we are more likely to avoid the mis-steps that they took.

Mentors can help you understand industry trends and intra-company debates while providing constructive criticism regarding your decision-making process. They can help you understand the agenda of others, even your internal competitors. They can provide guidance about avoiding some issues and interaction with fellow employees who could be toxic.

Developing a relationship with a mentor is not a new concept. Throughout history, men and women have recorded in their private papers the help provided to them by mentors, including Margaret Thatcher, George Marshall, Winston Churchill and Abraham Lincoln.

Ideally the mentor should be older and more experienced than you and

As an executive coach, clients regumore knowledgeable about your corporate environment. Someone with a broader vision, who can see the entire company or division and put your role into perspective. Strive to enlist the help of someone with a strong reputation and who appears to be "on the move". Choosing a mentor of your same gender may appear to be a wise move, but that isn't always the case. Talent, maturity and the competence of the potential mentor are more important than gender. If you can genuinely convince the potential mentor of your substantial respect, there is a good chance the mentor will accept the responsibility of mentorship.

> One mentor is great, two or three are better. With multiple mentors you get differing opinions from different perspectives. Take these steps to find a mentor:

•Prepare a list of likely candidates; list everyone who might be even remotely helpful, but only people whose judgment and maturity you respect and value.

•Sort through your list carefully. Reduce it to three or four candidates. This analysis will help you understand your needs better. Eliminate anyone who made your list strictly for sentimental reasons.

•Meet with your nominees separately: ideally in the order of your highest interest. Tell each that you would appreciate seeing them from time to time for lunch, a game of tennis or just a chat at the office—specifically to get their insights about your approach to your career. Get them to accept the role before discussing any specific issues.

•No matter how well you get along with your new mentor, never take them for granted. Once you demonstrate that you don't value the advice you are receiving, the effectiveness of this relationship has probably been seriously damaged, if not destroyed.

•Establish a clear understanding as to the frequency of contact and stick to it even if you don't have any pressing issues to discuss. Keep them posted on the progress of your career, even when all is well.

SPENDING LEVEL: Portfolio withdrawals are typically described in terms of a specified dollar amount or a percent of annual portfolio value. Neither method is perfect, however—and for different reasons. Withdrawing a fixed amount each year and adjusting it for inflation can provide a stable income stream and preserve your living standard over time. But the portfolio may survive only if future withdrawals represent a small proportion of the portfolio's value. Withdrawing a fixed percentage of assets based on annual asset value makes it unlikely that you will deplete retirement assets because a sudden drop in market value would be accompanied by a proportional decline in spending. But this method can produce wide swings in your living standard when investment returns are volatile.

Retirees who need consistent cash flow may want to combine these two methods. One way is to withdraw cash flow according to a rule that combines past spending with a payout rate applied to current portfolio value. You can weight these factors to favor your preference for either more stable cash flow or a greater chance of portfolio survival. In effect, you are customizing your withdrawals to smooth out spending while responding to actual investment performance.

INVESTMENT TIME FRAME: Investment time horizon may be the hardest to estimate, especially if it is the same as your lifespan. In this case, you can only guess how long your portfolio must support spending. If you plan to hand down assets to beneficiaries, your investment time frame may extend beyond your lifetime. Hundreds of these "good news" stories are periodically submitted by our case workers. I hope our readers, benefactors and volunteers will share our pride in these few stories of hope and courage.

Addiction Counseling Education Services (ACES):

He said that, when he bought the figurine at the second hand store, it was broken and chipped in many by providing compassionate, complaces. When I saw it, it was beautiful and looked new. His explanation was this: "When I first came here, I was broken and chipped in many places. You put me together and helped me find the right path and now I am on a journey. I have what I need and can now go places knowing that my feet are steady and the path of recovery is before me."

Housing Case Management:

John, a 63-year old Hispanic gentleman, came to Catholic Charities for mortgage delinquency and default resolution counseling. A Catholic Charities housing counselor met with John to address his specific needs in order to avoid foreclosure of his "dream home," where he and his family had resided for over 14 years. They deeply desired to remain in the home. When John requested our services, he was three months A client completed his outpatient behind on his mortgage payments

the family had exhausted their retirement and savings, and they did not know where else to turn. He had received a summons to appear in court and was losing hope. Our housing counselor referred John to a respected Legal Services firm for legal representation and assisted him in completing a home loan modification application with his lender, delaying the foreclosure process until John was ultimately approved for the modification. During this time, John obtained full-time employment and successfully completed the trial period. When the modification was completed, the interest rate on the mortgage was reduced by half and John is now able to afford his monthly expenses. Catholic Charities' housing counselor is providing follow-up services to ensure that John can maintain his budget and continue to pay his monthly expenses. Had John not sought Housing Counseling services at Catholic Charities, it is probable that he and his family would have lost their home. Fortunately, our housing counselor was able to educate John regarding the foreclosure process, provide direction toward alternatives to avoid foreclosure, and stabilize his family's housing.

The LOSS Program Three months ago, Catholic

due to illness and unemployment, Charities' LOSS Program (Loving Outreach to Survivors of Suicide) started a group in our Cicero office for Spanish-speaking individuals who have lost loved ones to suicide. For decades, monthly meetings have been held at almost a dozen sites for groups of survivors grieving such a loss, but the LOSS program had only been able to offer individual counseling for Spanish-speaking survivors. While helpful for these individuals, they missed the healing benefits and comfort of sharing with other survivors who were going through the same traumatic tragedy. Although the LOSS program had been brainstorming the idea of a Spanish-speaking group for a few years, it was thought that cultural or legal factors such as -immigration status; the reluctance to speak in

public or to share family problems outside of the family, and the concept of suicide as a sin and shameful to the family would prohibit Mexican and Latino participation. Fortunately, courageous families and individuals were willing to seek the benefits of these professional, confidential services in a group led by one of our Spanish-speaking therapists. Today, this group has three Spanish-speaking women who have lost their husbands to suicide. They are able to mourn in the company of other widows in their native language without fear of being shamed or stigmatized.

In these and many more ways, Catholic Charities lives the Gospel of God's love every day of the year assisting our brothers and sisters who conquer insurmountable obstacles with courage and grace.

Irish Fest, I made my way to Dublin for the beginning of the 2011 Rose of Tralee International Competition. The Rose of Tralee is actually held in Tralee, Co. Kerry, however, they don't just let the Roses show up in Tralee, we go on tour throughout Ireland for a week in the official Rose bus until our grand entrance into Tralee. The night of our first briefing felt like a big reunion. All of us girls had kept in touch all summer long, so we couldn't wait to



see each other and catch up. We also met the other girls that would make up the total of thirty-two, which included girls that did not go to regionals from Australia, Kerry, Cork and Dublin. One of the first things we were told was, if you thought Port Laois was incredible, you have only gotten a taste of what things will be like for the next ten days.

We traveled all over Ireland visiting some of the most famous and beautiful landmarks the country has to offer. We were taken on private tours of the Houses of the Oireachtas by Senators and Ambassadors, given all access tours of the Guinness Brewery in Dublin, honorary guests at the Cliffs of Moher, and were considered special guests of Newbridge Silver and the Carlton Hotel Group wherever we went. > > felt like a complete blur. Your time up there goes by so quickly and you're trying to remember, was I funny, did anyone laugh, did I mention my parents, did I even tell them my name? When I walked into that room and looked around at the thirty one other incredible girls I had been in the company with for the last ten days, I quickly reminded that its not about being the best on t.v or even about being the best Rose, its about being a part of something so incredibly special. It's about being a part of a tradition of Ireland and about representing you, your family, your hometown, and your heritage.

> > This year, the winner was Tara Talbot of Queensland, Australia. Tara has been such an incredible representative of not only the Rose of Tralee, but also of the 2011 Roses. Although I was not the winner of the

Rose of Tralee, that did not mean that my Rose duties stopped. I have continued to represent the Chicago Irish community and will continue to do so until I crown the 2012 Chicago Rose in March. I am so looking forward to sharing the experience all over again.

I am proud to say that I have the Chicago Rose of Tralee to thank for all that this year has brought me. I also cannot fail to thank my wonderful sponsor, The Irish Boutique and Paddy's on the Square of Long Grove. Because of sponsors like The Irish Boutique, The Emerald Loop, Euro Shippers, and Halstead Harp, the Chicago Rose of Tralee is possible. 


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
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
