

### An Taoiseach, Enda Kenny, Visits Chicago

fantastic for Ireland. You've got the Titanic anniversary in Cobh, "The Gathering going on in 2013, you've got the Fleadh going to Derry for the first time, and Derry will be The City of Culture for the UK in 2013 you've got the Titanic display in Belfast, the Olympiad, and more! It looks like the next two years or more will be very exciting for tourists.

Enda: It's a real opportunity in so many ways. You have, Dublin, the City of Science, this year. So what you've mentioned between all the facilities, really, present a great opportunity. For instance, Young Rori McIlroy is the world's number one in golf. The Irish open is happening in Northern Ireland for the first time in a very many years, which will attract enormous attention. You're right, Fleadh will be opening for half a million people next year, and Derry, the City of Culture is doing the same thing. The Volvo race finishes in Galway as well. They expect 600,000 people to attend that. So that's all there and next year, 2013, we're looking to bring people home from all over the world, both the Irish diaspora and all others who want to visit Ireland. We invite them to come and involve themselves in the country and understand the personality of the people that we have, and enjoy our very excellent tourism facilities as well. With that, we expect our visitors to be given really good value and a quality experience they will never forget. And that's going to continue through 2013 and 2014. We're going to have, what we call the Davos in respect of the creative arts, the imaginative arts, theater, drama, music and all of that. As you're aware, the Davos Institute is where they bring all of the chief economists of the world together in Switzerland, every year, for a big discussion over a week about the economies

Cliff: 2012, 2013, looks, to me to be of the world. We want to give vent to the flare and creativity of 2014, of the Irish diaspora in literature, art, the creative arts, music, film and drama.

> That's all being planned up ahead now and we would say to people in the United States, 'Look, if you have Irish descent anywhere in you, and there are 45 million people who have, Come home and find the missing part of your own personality. which is very important. A sense of fulfillment that you can find out, you know, where your own people came from. If you've never been to Ireland before, get involved because Irish people are curious, inquisitive, gregarious, and people want to be associated with that. It's about life and living the challenge of life, which is great."

> Cliff- You are here for business and tourism, and you were in Boston recently.

> Enda- I was in Boston a month ago. I spoke at the Kennedy School of Government and at the Kennedy Library. I met with the Irish American's from Boston, of which they are a huge number. It was a great excitement. I've come here to do the St. Patrick's Day parade tomorrow, which, is the first time, I think, an Irish Taoiseach has walked in the parade in a very long time indeed. The Congress doesn't sit in Washington this week so my visit to the White House is on Tuesday. That allows me to visit a number of multinational companies who are based in Ireland from the Chicago area. I will meet with the Irish business organizations which looks after incentives for schools in Ireland and the education area. I'll also visit the Irish communities and explain what's happening at home and how we're involved in wanting to make the decisions to improve our country.

> So, we're here for the St. Patrick's Day celebrations, and to celebrate the unique

in Chicago which I think is the most American of American cities, but Chicago also has a really strong group of people from Ireland whom I know of myself. Hopefully my visit will give them a sense of contact of connection with our country.

Cliff: You've been in Chicago before. Enda: I have been here over the years. You remember, St. Patrick's Day is an Irish day, but it's an Irish day the world over. You only have Bastille Day for the French and Independence day for the United Sates, which are of similar nature. But they don't have the reach of Ireland which has 70 million diaspora all around the world.

Also the question of what's going on in regard to the E-3 visa's for people who may wish to come to America in the future.

Cliff: A lot of work is being done on that by Billy Lawless here in Chicago.

He's done a great job for Irish in Chicago. He's very helpful and cooperative in so many personal and sensitive cases.

Cliff: The mood seems good in Ireland. Enda: The mood is pragmatic. The country was in a very difficult position when they took of government last year. It meant that you had to make some really difficult decisions. We restored our competitiveness and put us in a position where we focus on job creation and cutting out where waste applied and making decision that would bring out country back. One of the things I'm really glad of, is here in America, our international reputation has been restored. American business and American investment now look at Ireland as being a very different place than it was before. They know that

bond between Ireland and America. We're there's no messing going on now in the sense of government not applying itself to it's job properly. From that point of view, we retain our 12 ½ % corporate tax rate, we value greatly the work that American investment provides in Ireland, and we're also very happy 80,000 people across 50 states are implied in Irish growing companies here.

> Enterprise Ireland, which is our agency, working from Ireland in the United States, will do a great job with any young company that wants to expand its business into America.

Anyone who wants to do business from America to Ireland, we will ask them to I've met people from Galway, Cork, Lim- involve themselves with the Industrial Development Authority. That's the agency that attracts investment to Ireland. The IDA. Here in the Chicago area, I'm going to visit Hollister which is a big plant in County Mayo, I'm going to visit Baxter, who has a plant in my home town in Castlebar employing more than 1200. I'm also going to talk to Abbot which make medical products in their (base in Sligo and Longford. I make it a point of going to talk to chief Enda: Billy's a very good friend of mine. executives and corporate personal when I am in the states and I am very happy with that. They provide good employment for the people of Ireland, and we want to encourage that.

> Cliff: Last words for the people of Chicago?

Enda: I'm thrilled to be here. It's a privilege as Taoiseach of Ireland to come to this historic city to meet so many Irish people. I wish them all a really happy St. Patrick's weekend. Let them not forgot that Mayo has not won the All Ireland yet, but I'm going to try and do that this year again! From my part, we will continuously work through government in building opportunities for people so that, they can come home if they want to. For those who are at home, they don't have to leave if they don't want to either.







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### Chicago Actors' John Judd and Patrick Andrews Journey Into O'Neill's "The Iceman Cometh"

By his account, veteran Chicago actor John Judd has played a lot of Irish characters.

Among them are roles in productions of shows penned by contemporary Irish playwrights including Brian Friel's "Dancing at Lughnasa," Martin McDonagh's "The Cripple of Inishmaan," and "The Lieutenant of Inishmore," and Conor McPherson's "Shining City."

"What I think these (Irish) characters have in common is a sense of being damned. They don't see themselves as victims but as being doomed. Sometimes, though, they do find a happy ending, Judd said.

Judd returns to the land of the damned and the doomed when he takes to the stage this April in Eugene O'Neill's masterwork, "The Iceman Cometh."

This production is being directed by Robert Falls, and the cast includes Brian



archist Larry Slade and Nathan Lane as Hickey, the salesman who arrives on a summer night in 1912, not to celebrate Greenwich Village bar owner Harry Hope's birthday, as anticipated, but to convince patrons to give up their pipe dreams.

Falls and Dennehy are longtime collaborators whose award-winning partnerships have included "Death of a Salesmen," and a host of O'Neill's epics including "Desire Under the Elms," "Hughie," a prior production of "Iceman" in which Dennehy played Hickey, and "Long Day's Journey Into Night."

Judd has never worked with Lane or Dennehy before, but was in a production of O'Neill's "Long Day's Journey Into Night," which made its way to Galway in 2000 for two weeks.


"That was my first and only time in Ireland, and I'd love to get back," Judd

says.
"O'Neill, of course, is Irish-American
in a lot of ways. and uniquely American in a lot of ways. But what I think all (O'Neill and the Irish playwrights mentioned above) have in common is a love of language. They provide wonderful, long speeches for actors,' Judd says.

In "Iceman," Judd plays Piet Wetjoen, which he says is "not a big part, but an important part." Wetjoen is a former Boer general who dreams of returning to South Africa despite having left being labeled a coward. His bar buddy and ex-war rival is Englishman Cecil Lewis, a former British army captain who left his homeland after

ing public money.

'They're running from something, and a bar is an excellent place to hide," Judd says. "They're both stuck in the past and



reliving imagined glory days. While they had been enemies in the war, they depend on each other and don't really hate each other."

Judd has been learning a dialect and has been researching historical detail.

"A great thing about working at The Goodman is they have people who help with this. A lot of the work is done for you." Judd says.

Judd has worked at The Goodman before, notably playing Scrooge in "A Christmas Carol" and most recently in the aforementioned "Shining City," which also was directed by Falls.

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

### **Book of Kells Scribes**

The script the Romans chiseled into their temples and monuments was the origin of what we call "uncial" script.

When it was written by hand with a quill, this script was characterized by broad, single strokes and simple round forms. Quills worked well on the smooth material such as

parchment (prepared animal skins) and vellum (prepared calf skin).

The letters were capital forms, but eventually lower case forms were added. Over

the centuries, the style was increasingly used by Irish and English monks and developed into a style that is called Insular half uncial or Insular majuscule. Insular Gospels written during the period of 600 to 850 CE used this script.

It will be no surprise to you, but the script use by the monks used in the Book of Kells is,

the knowledge of Latin grammar, vocabulary and syntax was basic. The ability to read and see clearly what other scribes wrote was very important. However, many errors in the Book resulted from an insufficient level of these skills. But that will be another column.

Over the years, scholars have tried to determine the number of scribes that worked on the Book of Kells. The fact that there is no definite, documented, information regarding the number of scribes results in scrutinizing every minor variation in the text.

The distinctions between styles in manuscripts where it is known that there were more than one scribe strongly suggests the same is true in the Book of Kells.

Leading modern scholars, such as Bernard Meehan, say that there were probably at least 4 scribes with distinct styles. To go further, we would have to day that there were many well-trained scribes who printed in very similar styles and could match different styles when needed.



Not only find your way around but to really meet some extraordinary people, support and lead them through different projects. The whole history of the Irish missionary movement who went out to India and all of that is still absolutely huge. The cultural reference point that I found in Calcutta through the Irish theater there and literature and music and language and all kinds of things was just really staggering. Yes, it made the world a smaller place.

Cliff: It's good for you in Derry that the Irish diaspora is as big as it is. You can reach out to any continent and ask people to come back for your big event in 2012 and 2013, can't you?

Shona: That is really what we wanted. For Derry, society at last, is brewing in confidence. It was not an easy place to grow up between 1968 and now the last 10 years has been an ongoing transformation on this part of the island. As we have merged and grown wide of what was probably a very inward looking attitude, you'll be very impressed by the confidence here. We're a society that wants to open up and blossom, welcome people in, encourage diversity and encourage new thinking, new conversations and move on from this sort of stagnant place that we had been for the past 30 years. So yeah, bring it on.

Cliff: Like Phil Coulter said, 'The New Derry'.

Shona: Exactly, exactly. I spent two years working for the British Council, which is the International Culture Relations Agency for Great Britain. That was a fascinating time as well. That took me to all kinds of countries and places, too. They have 110 offices all across the world where they do education in language and arts based programs. I met a number of musicians who were Indian decent or Pakistani decent or Iranian musicians. They have a huge repertoire of Irish music, but are not all from Irish or from Irish decent. There is a big diaspora out there also that have a connection of understanding of music theater and are not necessarily Irish.

Executive of Derry, The City of Culture 2013, how many agencies do you have to work with?

Shona: It's huge. We have this perception of being, to some people, a British study, to many people, an Irish study. I see as an opportunity to work with all of the cultural institutions across the island of Ireland. But then we also have the opportunity to work with cultural institutions and agencies and studies across the UK and we are receiving tons of support from the Arts Councils of England. For English cultural organizations we'll have, for example, the National Ballet in London come to Derry for the first time ever. We'll have the London Symphony Orchestra, we'll have the Boy Blues Street Band Company from Jaspers, that's supported by the Arts of England.

The potential of it, the ambition of it and the potential benefits of it, aren't just for Derry but are for all of Northern Ireland; to reach across the island of Ireland and just pass through other cities. We're going to be in Washington then Toronto, so we start to feel the international effort.

This is the time to encourage people to spend time in Belfast, then come over the Giants Causeway. Travel on down and take that fabulous journey that leads to Derry. The City of Derry is going to be electric throughout 2013 with music, art and creativity. People need to come back home and take the journey and rediscover this place.

The Fleadh Cheoil is the single biggest event on the island of Ireland, annually, and it will be here in August 2013. It brings together Irish music from all over the world and it has over 300,000 attending.

It's a big undertaking, but we've been working very closely with the businesses, hoteliers and entrepreneurs in the city. There's going to be increased hotel accommodations. The university campus will be used to accommodate visitors throughout the year. We expect it to have a huge benefit to the area around as well.

The Olympics are happening in 2012. So actually, the Olympics are nearly upon us and as part of the Olympian effort the London 2012 Festival has really linked with Northern Ireland too in a series of events. The actual opening concert of Cliff: In your latest role as the Chief the London 2012 Festival, which is the

Olympics, is going to happen right outside my window! Right here in Derry, London Derry, on the 21st of June 2012.

The next two years, really, is going to be a great time. In 2013, there's also what's been called "The Gathering", which is spearheaded by the Irish government. There is a call out now for Irish theater to come back to the island of Ireland in the year of 2013. So between 2012 and 2013 this is the time for any Irish American, Irish Canadian, or Irish across the world anywhere to come back home.

Cliff: Some American's might be concerned for their safety. Since you've been talking openly about the Troubles, maybe you'd like to make a statement to lessen their fears.

Shona: Absolutely. This is interesting, Cliff, because it isn't just American's who feel that way. Even people in the South of Ireland were concerned about safety issues. What we did was bring together a whole delegation for the city, including representatives at superintendents level from the police service of Northern Ireland. The reality is, and all of the statistics prove, that Derry is the safest city on the island. Any kind of repercussions of the conflict, of what happened here, are focused on particular agendas and not at any danger to any tourists or visitors to the city. Really to be honest, we've been seeing less and less of that kind of activity here as well. We were able to give all of the reassurance that this is one of the safest cities that you will ever visit. We are working very closely with all of the agencies in the city and very closely with the security forces as well. So many of the events that are coming here are major family events. We really have moved on.

Cliff: It's a wonderful city. I've been there two or three times now. I remember looking down on a road, it was a wide road. It looked almost wide enough for cars to go both directions, but I never saw a car. Later on in my visit, I was down on top of this road and realized it was your ringed Wall. It's very thick. It's very wide.

Shona: The city wall is one of the greatest assets in Derry. In fact, in 2013, it's going to the 400th anniversary of the building of the wall. It's going to be a really special year for that kind of heritage

cultural festival running along side the in the city. One of the big efforts through 2013, is to encourage the city and its citizens to take ownership of the wall as well. All of things that are on your doorstep you don't really experience or appreciate the same way as a visitor does. We did a huge poll with the city and had people come forward with their ideas about how they'd like to celebrate in 2013. We are going to have all kinds of animation on the city wall, from Irish dancing to music playing to big world performances. So any visitor that comes to Derry in 2013 is going to see the walls really come alive. There's going to be gardens on the walls, all kinds of things. Of course, from up there, you get every aspect of life in the city. You get the internal from the center itself within the walls and then the views right across every aspect of the city from on top of the walls. It's very lovely.

Cliff: Your Peace Bridge is fantastic.

Shona: I don't think, anybody would have really predicted the level of transformation that would happen in the city with the opening of the Peace Bridge. It has really doubled the size of Derry, not just the Peace Bridge itself, but the fact that it's the first and only walkway that takes you from one side to the other. I'm looking out the window here and I can see people jogging, people walking, people dressed as Amelia Earhart, because she flew across the Atlantic and landed in Derry. There's reenactments and all kinds of things going on outside of this window and it really has warmed the city. There has been over 400,000 over the bridge since it opened at the end of June in 2011.


Cliff: Can visitors go to Guildhall Press and peruse the books they publish?

Shona: It is small, but of course the Guildhall Press would be very welcoming. There's a wonderful collection of books on the heritage and stories of the city.

I guess whichever interests of life you're interested in, whether it's theater or music, you're going to be able to find all of this in Derry in 2013. We're using the actual city itself as a canvas. Visually, you won't be able to escape that this is a city that is connecting with art and culture. We're going to close our city of culture celebrations with a major celebration of life in December 2013. Come any month and enjoy our wonderful town of Derry!






Imelda: We met through my brother, Emmet. He moved back here to the states long before the rest of my family did. He met John in Celtic Crossings, I believe.


John: I said, 'To date you. I want to take you out to dinner.' That was the beginning and now we're planning our wedding in Dublin in April.

The Magic Hanky: This charming custom symbolizes fertility. The bride carries it on her wedding day, then uses it to make a christening bonnet for her first born child.




Brian: We had about 130 people from Ireland come. Fiona: We sort of turned it into a "wedding week" with different events and stuff.



When you're helping plan for someone, you have that emotional detachment where you can think more like a business person. Whereas, with your own wedding, you get more emotionally involved, which you should! I think that the most important thing when planning anything is that you need to know what your budget is and have an idea of what you want. They will sell you anything. So you need to know, do you want those napkins with your names on them? You have to have a clear idea in your mind of at least your budget and what your focus is on that day. John: We're pretty much on budget. We're pretty sensible on what we wanted.

Imelda: You really need to know what you both want. If you're unsure, people can really



O'Neill's Irish-American experience to ready for role

Learning about the spells, shattered myths and dreams of playwright O'Neill has been part of the preparation Patrick Andrews has been doing in advance of playing the pivotal role of Don Parritt, a young man who betrays his mother, resentful of her lifestyle and her involvement with radical politics.

Soaking up knowledge beforehand, Andrews has been reading O'Neill biographies, which has "been fascinating and insightful finding out how brave he was in baring what he did in such emotionally autobiographical works,"

Shaping those works, Andrews says, were O'Neill's relationships with his father James - an Irish transplant who came from abject poverty, reached heights in America as renowned touring actor, then fell into a money pit and fell back on playing the Count of Monte Cristo to make fast cash; with his mother, Ella, whose drug addiction shattered O'Neill's Irish Catholic faith; and a youth spent either on the road in hotel rooms, in boarding schools or at the family's modest summer home in Connecticut.

"There's a story that (as a teenager) after he learned of his mother's drug addiction, O'Neill defied his father and refused to go to church. He eventually found refuge in writers who were exploring personal freedom including Oscar Wilde, Nietzsche, and anarchist Emma Goldman,' Andrews says.

While O'Neill never visited Ireland. Andrews notes that in the 1930s O'Neill set out to write a sweeping series of plays about

experience, in America which grew too unwieldy. Failing that, O'Neill turned his attention to creating works that included "Long Day's Journey," "Hughie," and "Iceman."

"He certainly explores the we come from affects us," Andrews says of O'Neill's writing.

Andrews' role as Parritt in 'Iceman" is an 18-year-old pulled in two directions by salesman Hickey, who sees Parritt as a younger, kindred spirit, and jaded anarchist Larry Slade, who very well might be his father.

With Lane as Hickey and Dennehy as Slade, Andrews will be performing toe-to-toe with the formidable stars of the ensemble.

"What Chicago is teaching me is that people show up to work. They leave everything else outside and are willing to get their hands dirty," Andrews says.

Andrews, a Texas native, came to Chicago about six years ago with a national tour of Broadway's "Fosse" and wound up staying to hone his craft.

He also notes that the city's myriad companies are not afraid to tackle tough works and heady topics. As but one example Andrews is just back from Washington, D.C., where he performed in a Falls-directed, Goodman co-production of "Red," a 90-minute piece concerning abstract-expressionist painter Mark Rothko and an assistant helping him with a project commissioned to provide murals for the Four Seasons restaurant in New York's Seagram Building.

"I think when work is real, honest, and visceral it gets people's attention. I think audience's are up for it when given a challenge," Andrews says.

And that's not his pipe dream. "The Iceman Cometh'

# **DOUGLASS & O'CONNELL**

A friend of mine who is based in Washington D.C. Might satisfy his mind. is spearheading a new venture aimed at celebrating the extraordinary link between Fredrick Douglass and Daniel O'Connell.

"The Frederick Douglass - Daniel O'Connell Distinguished Lecture Series honors the contributions of these two men to the cause of human rights around the world. The project is a living legacy to Douglass and O'Connell on both sides of the Atlantic, and plans are under way to establish exchange relationships with several colleges and universities in Ireland, Northern Ireland, and the United States and a shared programming and hosting of the lecture series in future years.

The project's first phase will site a statue of Douglass and establish a lecture series which will be launched in Ireland. The statue of Douglass will be the first in Ireland honoring an African-American in Ireland, and the first known monument to Douglass outside of the United States.

In 1845, as Ireland was descending into the despair of the great famine, Frederick Douglass arrived for a four-month lecture tour of the island. Douglass had escaped slavery in Maryland seven years earlier, and had recently published his autobiography Narrative Is mighty plain," quoth he, of the Life of Frederick Douglass, An American Slave. "Tis clear enough the Elephant Douglass was greeted in Dublin, Belfast, and Cork by enthusiastic crowds and formed many friendships on his trip, most significantly with Daniel O'Connell, a figure still revered in Ireland today for his role in Catholic emancipation and his fierce opposition to slavery. O'Connell and Douglass shared the stage just once, in September 1845 at a rally in Dublin, but retained a mutual respect and affection until O'Connell's death less than two years later - and Douglass acknowledged O'Connell's influence on his philosophy and worldview for the rest of his life.

The Frederick Douglass - Daniel O'Connell Distinguished Lecture Series honors the transformative "I see," quoth he, "the Elephant role that the country and people of Ireland played in Douglass's life, helps teach future generations of Irish and American young adults about the lives and leadership of Douglass and O'Connell, and celebrates the special bond and affinity between Ireland and the United States. "

# Do You Know How To Start Your New Job?

the job search process. Obviously a lot of people start new jobs virtually every day of the year. This column focuses on what that new employee should do in order to succeed in the new environment.

Some time ago, a former colleague and accomplished outplacement consultant, Fred Gittinger, shared with me his thoughts on what a person should do when s/he starts a new job. Fred developed a list of ten things that he felt a new employee should do to facilitate and enhance their assimilation into a new corporate environment. As I reviewed Fred's recommendations, I am convinced that all of us could improve our current employment situation by reviewing these same 10 suggestions as though we were new employees.

- 1.) Meet with your new boss for purposes of defining what your role is in the organization and what goals are important to your boss. Too often, new hires want to please the boss without really knowing what s/he wants them to accomplish.
- 2.) After meeting with the boss, write a memo of your understanding of the focus points for your first three to six months. Provide a copy of the memo to your boss; ask for a three to six months review to seek any additional clarification that may be needed.
- 3.) Do a complete assessment of your strengths and weaknesses as you start your new job. It will help you understand what help you might need to fulfill the expectations of your boss.

Write down the reasons why you were hired; keep them in the front of your mind. Remember to focus on those reasons with your colleagues so you don't get trapped into fulfilling their agenda rather than your own.

- 4.) Develop a self improvement plan. As you take stock of your strengths and weaknesses, you will most likely decide that there are things whether skills, style or behaviors, that need to be modified or totally changed. Let your boss know that you are vitally interested in constructive criticism. Many bosses are uncomfortable criticizing people directly and honestly, so make it easy for them. Once you have completed this self improvement plan, determine if there are some people who could help you by mentoring you as you strive to implement this plan.
- 5.) Solicit feedback. How can you improve if no one tells you when you

Many of my past columns dealt with are doing something wrong? Make it clear not only to your boss but to others you respect, you would welcome their feedback on your performance. Many surveys say that the lack of feedback is one of the biggest complaints that people have.

6.) Meet as many people in the organization as possible in your first month. It will help you to feel more thoroughly connected than if you only met a person or two. Meeting more people, from different parts of the business, will also help to expand your understanding of the total company. It could open some doors for you in the future. Keep your mouth shut about the "great" company you just left; remember, you are trying to assess this culture, not educate them on your former culture.

7.) Keep track of your accomplishments. Start a CAREER file. Every time you succeed in a major project put a note in your file. Every time you receive a written compliment or endorsement of your latest achievement, drop a copy into your file. Believe me; we all forget our accomplishments as the years go by. After a while, some of your earlier achievements will lose their glow; but they can still be helpful when you are explaining your background to someone else in the organization. And, of course, even a genuine accomplishment can become lost in an organization. Why? Perhaps because the individuals that were involved have all moved on, been promoted or transferred, quit or been terminated.

8.) Be thoroughly prepared for your performance review. If need be, insist on a review. A lot of managers don't


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in detail. Perhaps they don't really feel that they have command of the details. Develop your own written agenda for the meeting. Be prepared to defend your records and/or refute items when you believe your superior's information

like to discuss a person's background is incorrect. But do it with style; do not get belligerent or unpleasant; this person will still be your boss tomorrow.

# Recent Books About Ireland





Safety Considerations For Handgun Ownership There has been much recent news about the use of deadly force and carrying concealed weapons. While this column will not attempt to address all the questions involved with these issues which have sometimes been emotional and polarizing, we will address some threshold issues involving the use of handguns and safety.

For certain security or protection purposes having a gun on person or immediately accessible is very important. Anything that is carried all the time is subject to damage and dropping. On at least three occasions, our office has represented police officers and users who were seriously injured by dropped or damaged handguns that discharged unexpectedly. Second-hand Guns

Handguns are meant to be durable. The infrequent use means that often, there is no appreciable wear on moving parts on guns that are decades old. For this and other reasons there is a vigorous second-hand market for handguns. However, the repair history is often not known. Parts substitution or inept repair may result in guns functioning normally to the casual inspector, but being subject to accidental discharge because a part is worn or slightly mismatched to the gun. Having a gun thoroughly evaluated by a competent gunsmith is crucial for safety. Proper Holster

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cessible gun, a proper holster is essential. However, design and manufacturing defects can make them unsafe in use. Our office has been involved in cases where defective holster design caused accidental discharge. In one case, a sheriff's deputy was injured when he holstered his service weapon. He

carried a Glock handgun which, rather than having a conventional safety lever, relies upon a secondary trigger mechanism. The holster was equipped with a retention strap that was narrow enough to enter the trigger guard on the gun, causing the gun to fire. The manufacturer was aware of the problem for approximately one year before the injury and had issued a recall of the holster. However, the manufacturer did not locate defective holsters in the field or contact owners. The case settled after the manufacturer's representative was deposed.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission has issued warnings and there have been voluntary recalls of several holsters that, because of the design of retention straps or release buttons, can cause the handgun to unintentionally discharge. These defects usually injure the wearer of the holster, but pose a major and unforeseen danger to anyone in the area. Drop-Fire

In another case, a police officer was involved in a case involving a "drop-fire" which occurs when a gun discharges when it is dropped. The officer stored his off-duty weapon, a Smith and Wesson .357, in a gym bag in his locker while he was on duty. When he took the bag out of his locker and put it on the floor, it discharged, striking him in the knee. Inspection of the gun that was bought used showed that the gun had been repaired and a part of the trigger mechanism was replaced with a slightly mismatched part. The shop that did the repair failed to test the gun to ensure that the substituted part did not pose a drop-fire risk. The case settled after expert depositions were taken. Safety Must Be

**Primary Focus** 

There is no substitute for formal training in the use, carrying, care and maintenance of handguns to ensure safety. There is no question that even with careful handling and training, mishaps and unintended outcomes occur.

In deciding whether to purchase a handgun, a review of statistics may be enlightening. National statistics indicate that in 2009, the US had 31,347 gun deaths. Gunshot wounds are the third leading cause

For those who need an immediately ac- of death behind motor vehicle crashes and accidents. Carriers of handguns were 4.5 times more likely to be shot than unarmed persons. Having a gun in the home increases the murder risk 2.7 times greater than not owning one. According to a study in the New England Journal of Medicine, only about 3.5 percent of homicides are committed by stranger home invaders. Conclusion

> When an individual chooses to own or carry a handgun, basic steps must be taken to ensure the safety of the owner and others. Proper training in the use, mainte-

nance, storage and carrying of the gun is the first place to start. Selection of the appropriate gun and holster for the intended use with safety in mind is crucial. Also, careful consideration of the benefits weighed against the personal costs of gun ownership and use, should be undertaken.



Murmurs of pleasure, lively talk and clinking glasses would mix with the street sounds outside. floating in through the lacy white curtains on the warm summer breeze. By this time we'd become used to the stockyards aroma, and hardly noticed it at all.

Late one Sunday evening,



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after most of the dinner company had departed, I wandered back into the darkened kitchen to get a drink of water. Suddenly I stopped in my tracks, startled by the unexpected sight of a large man in the shadows. He was at the window, elbows propped on the sill, sitting straddled across a kitchen chair. I must have jumped a little or gasped, because he heard me and turned his head, his classic Irish profile silhouetted in the rectangle of blue moonlight. In lieu of his suit and tie, he now wore only boxers and a sleeveless T-shirt.

"Meehall? How's it goin', kiddo?" Grampa chuckled. "Looking for something? A drink? Nah, don't use the sink, open the icebox...sure, you can have a drink of my Special Water, that's all right, go ahead." He waved toward the fridge. "But watch out, Obadiah might be sleepin' in there, so don't wake him up!"

Grampa kept his Special Water in an empty orange juice jar. He filled it nightly from

If we spotted Obadiah he'd surreptitiously snatch him away, chuckle to himself and keep the drama alive, year after year.
