

How To Fail and Do It Fast!

This approach called for a person to bend over and look through their legs at things from a backward and upside-down perspective. With that thought in mind, I decided to write this article about six ways that will insure failure. And from such failure perhaps an excellent way to succeed might emerge.

1.Be strong in prohibiting your subordinates to grow. View your subordinates as the great unwashed—they should be ignored as much as possible. Don't help them with the things that you had to learn on your own; you don't owe them anything. Definitely do not show them any appreciation for their suggestions—assure them they have all been addressed (and discarded) before. And for goodness sake, do not keep them apprised of the changes that you see in the future—let them stumble upon them as you did.

2.Keep all information to yourself. Do not feel that you have to share any information with your subordinates; rather keep every scrap of info for yourself and possibly your closest friends. Keep things under your desk mat so you can sneak a peek when someone asks you a pertinent question but be sure to demean the person for asking. Remember information is power, so why would you give it up to a newbie—we all had to learn the hard way. Misinformation can be distributed in order to create unrest and discomfiture.

3.Resist any attempt to celebrate team unity or teamwork. We can all agree that teamwork is over rated. You and a couple of your old and jaded fellow employees are the real contributors, not some of these new employees. Of course, new employees who don't feel appreciated are more likely to leave your employ and seek out companies who actually do care about their employees; and good riddance to them. Our past history shows that our long tenured, albeit inept, employees can continue the struggle to bring posterity

back to the company.

4.Whatever you do, don't make tough or unpopular decisions. Why do these newbies think they have all the answers when those of us who have been struggling with some of these issues for years haven't succeeded? If you make tough decisions or any other significant decisions you could be criticized –and no one wants that. Besides you may actually pick the wrong solution. Ignore those who say that no decision is really a decision itself. Let everyone wonder and worry about how that critical and unresolved problem will ultimately negatively affect their future.

5.Stick to the tried and true way of doing things. Always remember, the frame of mind that got us to the position we are currently in. We have our ways and we are going to continue to execute them until finally they work. The new age

people who don't like our solution must be the trouble makers. If only the world would come around to our way of thinking, but we can wait until then. Continuing the traditional way of handling this problem creates a sense of certitude; the other employees will get it, even if not right away.

6.Find ways to overshadow the efforts of any subordinates. Subordinates are properly subordinated to the ruling class—the way it was intended. When there is a rare glimmer of success, own it, cherish it, but do NOT share it. When failure looms, find the culprit because of course, you followed the traditional way, therefore, it must be someone else. Remind management that they are the ones who hired all these dummies, not you.

I am sure you can see the wisdom in this approach. If you don't, perhaps you could do just the OPPOSITE of what I proposed. What say you?

for your consideration.

- •Encourage all your subordinates regularly. Find ways to praise their achievements.
- •Share all the information that could be useful to your team members on a regular basis.
- •Find ways to develop comaraderie and fellowship amongst your team members.
- •Consider carefully all the available facts, solicit input from your subordinates, and then make a decision.
- •Be clear that you welcome new and different approaches.
- •Share the glory and fun of the successes achieved by your team members.


CARPE DIEM. Always remember that in the crazy world of business you may someday find yourself working for one of your former subordinates.

She has shared the stage with, and has become close friends with, most of the well-respected Irish artists performing on the world stage today. There is no doubt that people like Liz Carroll, John Whelan, John Doyle, Daithí Sproule, The Chieftains, Cherish the ladies, Sean Keane, Mick McGoldrick, Troy MacGillivray, and countless others too numerous to mention, would return the compliment, to their friend and peer, Pauline Conneely.

Known to have a wicked sense of humor, and a story always at the ready, Pauline is at her most comfortable when playing her beloved banjo, surrounded by people who share her love of all things Irish, whether as a member of her own band Chicago Reel, or a guest of the

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Celtic Thunders Across the USA

Original member, turned former member, turned returning member of Irish singing group and stage show Celtic Thunder, Damian McGinty, is back once again for the band's most recent tour, slated to begin this fall. Set to perform in over seventy cities between the U.S. and Canada, the production will be the largest that Celtic Thunder has



ever done, and will center around a show they filmed in Casino Rama in March of last year. The musical lineup will showcase both the classic songs that fans love, along with some much-anticipated numbers from their recently released album Legacy.

Hailing from Derry, Northern Ireland, Damian is an actor and singer, known not only for his years with Celtic Thunder, but also from the popular Fox reality show The Glee Project, followed by the show's grand prize, a stint on the Fox television series Glee!. Just fourteen years old when he joined Celtic Thunder in 2007, he developed his rich baritone as he grew, while still singing tenor, and managing to hit the high notes. During his four years with the group, they did four tours in the U.S. and Canada, six PBS TV specials, performed at the White House, and sold over a million recordings. After winning The Glee Project in 2011, he announced he was leaving Celtic Thunder for Glee!. He played foreign exchange student Rory Flanagan in the show's third season, and his initial seven episodes were extended to the end of the season. He returned for the fourth season's Christmas episode, and also performed on the show's Christmas album. In 2015, Damian returned to Celtic Thunder as the special guest in the "Very Best of Celtic Thunder Tour", and will now be performing with the group on the latest tour, "Legacy".

Excited to return to Celtic Thunder for this production, he explains, "As an original member, you feel responsible for the project and for the material that's out in the world. It was the first thing I ever did, so I'm very passionate about it. The opportunity came around before, about coming back,

but it wasn't the right time... But last year, with the Celtic Thunder Tour, it was a two or three month thing, and I said sure. It worked for the schedule, so I said let's give it a shot. We'll finish seventyseven cities this fall. It's a lot of cities, a lot of traveling, it's a big, big tour, but it's gonna be great."

Since the group's beginning almost ten years ago, there have been several members to come and go for various reasons. This year's tour will feature five performers, along with the group's band. Neil Byrne, Emmet Cahill, Ryan Kelly, Damian McGinty, and newcomer Michael O'Dwyer. Past members include Paul Byrom, George Donaldson, Daniel Furlong, Keith Harkin, Colm Keegan, and Emmett O'Hanlon.

The only non-surviving member is George Donaldson, who died in 2014 after suffering a heart attack. "George was a huge loss. We quite regularly get asked

how we replace a performer like that, and the answer is that you don't. You just try to move the show forward in a different way. George was incredible. He was a father figure to me. He was a genuine sweetheart, the big Scotsman of the group, and he's badly missed," Damian says of his bandmate's passing.

Different on this year's tour will be a number of new songs and performances. "Legacy" is an homage to the last nine years, and what the group would like their legacy to be. "We have a number of hits that we've written that we



can't go into a show without doing. We have a new guy this year (Michael O'Dwyer), which adds extra flavor. We're ready to show the world what he's got. He's a very, very talented guy. (This show) has more of a live concert vibe. It's pretty raw, (and) you're going to notice the difference. We've got some new material in there that we've never done and we're very, very excited about it."


Returning to Celtic Thunder with more experience in show business under his belt, Damian explains that things are a little different than when he started. "I understand the things that are needed to make a production, and I understand how difficult the process is. I get it now. I'm very honored to be a part of the group... With age comes the experience and a little more wisdom, and a little more knowledge, and that allows me to be more grateful for the opportunity."

Celtic Thunder's latest album Legacy was released earlier this year, and volume one went straight to number 1 on the Billboard World Music Charts and is still in the Top Ten 24 weeks later. The follow up album Legacy Volume 2 was released August 12th just in time for the tour. It was received very well, which thrilled the group and bodes well for the upcoming tour. "We're genuinely proud of this show. We're going to be seeing a lot of people, and we're very excited."

In his life as a solo artist, Damian has been working on his Christmas record, which will be released in October, and on his first original record, which will be coming out next year. "It's a good life," he muses.

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


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
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
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
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Tipperary and Kilkenny Set for **All-Ireland Battle**

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In my informed and slightly biased view the most magical sporting occasion in the world arrives annually on the first Sunday

in September when 83,000 supporters pack into the coliseum that is Croke Park to witness the All-Ireland hurling final.

Hurling is a game unique to Ireland, although it is played within some Irish expatriate communities around the world and for the uninitiated, it is the fastest field game in the world where skill, speed, physicality, intuition and teamwork is needed to operate at the highest echelons of the game.

For those lucky enough to be born or raised within a hurling family or community, it comes to mean more.

Prowess on the field can give a hurling supporter distractions from the tribulations of life, but it also has the ability to help a community cultivate its identity and maintain a pride of place of where they come from.

This is especially true of the two protagonists that will line out against each other in this year's final on September 4.

Kilkenny and Tipperary are neighbouring Irish counties for whom hurling has largely facilitated to define its people in the eyes of a nation. Especially along the border separating the pair, both entities lay claim to being the 'Home of Hurling' but despite such jovialities, they are, in 2016, by most estimations the two best hurling sides in the land.

Kilkenny

Kilkenny come into this final with the lure of winning their third All-Ireland in a row.

They are the county that has

dominated the hurling landscape for most of the last two decades and their manager, Brain Cody has overseen a record 11 All-Ireland victories since he came manager in 1999. This year in the championship they overcame Galway in the Leinster final after

a powerful second half display saw them emerge convincing winners.

Yet in their first semi-final against Waterford, Kilkenny were fortunate to come away with a draw against a youthful Decies team who played the better hurl- in 2010 by beating Kilkenny in ing for most of the encounter. Kilkenny were looking down the barrel of a championship exit, yet they managed a late goal from Walter Walsh to force a replay.

In the second contest, Cody introduced three new starters, with Liam Blanchfield particularly catching the eye, which helped Kilkenny win the replay. In that second game Waterford's fight and aggression was matched and bettered by the Kilkenny men who were deservingly two points ahead when the referee blew the full time whistle.

The worry in Kilkenny is the ligament injury sustained to midfield powerhouse Michael Fennally, who looks set to miss the final and it will be interest-

ing to see whether Cody fills the void with Conor Fogarty who was redeployed to centre back last time out or decides to bring in Lester Ryan.

Encouragingly for Brian Cody star forward TJ Reid was more involved in the second game against Waterford, while full forward Colin Fennally was razor sharp scoring two goals in his first possessions of the game.

Where Kilkenny look vulner able is in the fullback line, where Paul Murphy apart, questions

still linger over whether Joey Holden and Shane Prendergast can be exploited by the Tipper ary full forward line.

Tipperary

In the Munster champion ship, Tipperary were in impe rious form overcoming Cork in impressive fashion, before accounting of Limerick despite being a man down for most of the contest when John 'Bubbles O'Dwyer was sent off for strik ing an opponent with his hurl.

Then in the Munster final Tipperary destroyed Water ford scoring five goals against a sweeper system that was contrived to stop the opposition scoring goals. It was the contest which raised eyebrows across the country that Tipperary might be the team to topple Kilkenny's grip on the Liam McCarthy Cup.

Tipp last won the All Ireland an epic final but since then they have exited the champion at the hands of their biggest rivals in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014.

In 2014 the drawn final be tween Tipperary and Kilkenny is generally regarded as the greatest final ever played with Tipperary missing a last gasp free from 90 metres to become champions before losing the replay.

However, this year new man ager Michael Ryan has put his stamp on the side with the in troduction of Seamus Hennessy Michael Breen, Dan McCormack and John McGrath and the re deployment of Ronan Maher to centre back and Brendan Maher back to midfield. These chang es have made Tipperary both

Tipp were exposed in their semi-final victory over Galway, when twice they got punished for goals after turning over possession inside their own half. Also

If Jordan was playing in the garden and his head would appear over the wall, he'd ask her mother if she wanted any rhubarb. If Jordan's mother said yes, Niall would say, 'Okay, stand back.'

"Bushels of rhubarb would come flying over the wall and then it was rhubarb everything from then out, rhubarb tart, rhubarb jam; anything my mother could put rhubarb on she'd put

rhubarb on," said Jordan. Her humble and neighborly approach to life fit with her

staple that first opened in 1973. According to Jordan, Mr. Johnny owned the grill until the 1980s when he sold it to two Greek brothers. After one of the brothers passed away two years ago the grill stood empty while



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As this issue appears the World will be celebrating the 50 year anniversary of Star Trek, marking the television series debut of the sci-fi phenomenon which has continued through numerous series, nearly a dozen motion pictures and creating a society full of engineers, scientists and military officers boldly going the way of their 23rd century heroes.

For myself as with many, my hero from the start had been Captain James T. Kirk, as portrayed by William Shatner who originated the role.

I recall very clearly sitting in my Dad's lap that first night of the show...the grainy 13 inch black and white Magnavox taking us both into a colorful world of space travel on the Starship Enterprise via the signals of NBC's WOOD-TV Channel 8 beamed straight into the den of our home in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Captain Kirk was the dashing stellar successor to novelist C.S. Forester's Captain Horatio Hornblower, a British officer who, like Kirk, seemed to always be at the center of the action when lesser men would stay on the ship and delegate.

I've often said that of the many blessings of my own life filled with Trek-fueled adventure has been the opportunity to meet many heroes, including William Shatner himself.

In September of 1990 I was working as a public relations

executive in Chicago when one of my clients, a top business furniture manufacturer in Michigan, asked me to help their involvement in sponsoring a nationwide business seminar tour headlined by Shatner titled "A Day in the Future."

The management team of the seminar had put together a multimedia extravaganza with corporate backers including Motorola, another of my clients and expert commentators on video including the chairman of Fortune Magazine.

All of this and a chance to meet Captain Kirk, too. What's not to like? Before long I was putting together press release materials with my team, having taken on the business seminar as a client as well. The first step was to interview Shatner for background and quotes that would somehow weave business, future thinking and global competitiveness all into some line of thought that would attract news media to write about the seminars and their upcoming debut with a gala at the Beverly Hilton in Hollywood.

At the time, Shatner had completed directing Star Trek V, the Final Frontier, which included him riding a horse in a commando raid to rescue terrorist hostages on a barren planet.





By contrast I found myself interviewing Shatner over the phone in Kentucky, on a horse. He trains and breeds competitive quarter horses for shows on a ranch he lives at in the Bluegrass State.

I was able to glean a nugget or two about American competition and innovation from the Canadian actor, but got nowhere fast talking about any business lessons learned at the knee of his father, who was in the men's clothing manufacturing industry.

"What I learned at the knee of my father was that I didn't want to go into business!" Shatner wryly remarked aboard his steed. I wanted to make sure my two young account executives got to ask a question or two over the phone but it was soon clear it was time for us to get back to writing and him to get back to riding. "How we doing folks?" He asked as it became clear we had exhausted the subject if not him.

How we did was another matter. Pretty good I thought. Coordinating with my international firm's Los Angeles office, Edelman Public Relations Worldwide succeeding in placing Shatner and the Day in the Future seminars on the NBC Nightly News, a top radio show in Los Angeles the day before the debut and best yet, the front page of the Los Angeles Times. So I was pretty confident when I finally strode into the Hilton and met Mr. Shatner and he said "Please, call me Bill" and after I introduced myself and my firm, he joked, " is that the Edelman Edelman's?" which I took as a joke from his Jewish ancestry about a Jewish family that may have business or entertainment connections.

Alas, what I thought would be forthcoming congratulations turned quickly sour as he reached out with amazingly huge hands, grasped my ID tag with corporate logo as he peered at it and said, "What I want to know is...what does Edelman intend to do about our poor ticket sales? This place is only half full!"


Gulp. Explaining that my job was news publicity not ticket sales was easy enough. Realizing that my joy at meeting my hero had transformed into a trip to the woodshed not so much. I laid low most of the day, deciding it wasn't my place to tell the good Captain that he beamed into a nether world where business executives didn't want to hear him introduce video segments and Star Trek fans could care less about Japanese competition in the 1990's, especially at \$595 per pop.

By the end of day he did graciously invite me up to his suite with other VIP's and introduced me to his wife. I was still too embarrassed to ask for a picture with him.

As I saw he and entourage off at the elevator, I headed down to Trader Vic's at the hotel for dinner and ended up sitting next to Milton Berle telling off-color jokes to his gathering. I think I grabbed his cigar as a souveneir.

A week later I got a black and white publicity still from Shatner signed "My best." I gave you mine, Captain! Thanks for 50 years of Star Trek!

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Keep Calm, and Breathe

As quite a reactive person myself, I understand what it is to simply spout out what's in my head without the slightest bit of reflection. I tend to be one of those people who think while talking, and the downside to such a personality is when I'm taken seriously. Having grown up in a family, all of whom have strong opinions, we were used to all sorts of weird and wonderful philosophies coming to light; none of which were ever thought to be credible under they were thrashed to death by everyone else.

Invariably, those who were most critical were to some degree affected by the opposing side. Now, it would be unfair to present these discussions as mimicking something akin to a Roman Senate meeting, or Socrates with his disciples. For one thing, the clamour of voices, and complete disregard for 'waiting until someone finingly honest. The constant intrusion was never considered bad manners' but enthusiasm. Someone's point of view had struck a chord with another, and suddenly there was a sandwich of half eaten, half digested, ideas.

Nothing was ever truly resolved, no one would ever admit to being wrong, and there was

but whether acknowledged or not, the process enabled a healthy form of debate. We learned something from the chaos, and torrent of ideas. Again, this was something that was never admitted to, but nevertheless it was there.

If you can imagine what it was to live through the Troubles, then it's easier to see how the hotbed of politics, religion, and divided culture was reflected in and through every conversation. My role as the pacifist, and quasi-religious teenager, was to interject, as I saw it, sanity to a society moving towards civil war. Whereas my brothers saw themselves as agents of social change; complete with a developed form of Marxism, while my father parroted the sentimental Nationalist rhetoric of stereotypes. Together we formed a microcosm of what was taking place around us on a grander scale. As a house divided, within a province torn by its history, the effects were tangible.

This was not simply the raving of semi-inebriated minds on a sophomoric quest for the meaning of life. Real people were dying, order (as we understood it) was crumbling, and the uncerhave changed, and this tainty produced by the volatility of the situation produced a real sense of fear. As the old system of disparity began to give way to a more equitable system, the reaction on both sides the religious divide was to dig in their heels. ished', was and still is refresh- Everyone's opinion had some element of truth to it.

However, the truth of the matter was usually sacrificed to some greater political ideology, and inevitably barricades were erected (metaphorically, and physically). However, after 30 years of violence it was decided by the majority that co-existence involves discussion and the

acknowledgement of difference of opinion.

Keeping your head when everyone is losing theirs is not a easy choice. It's easier to get swept up with the ranting and raving of the crowd. But the herd mentality forces the voice of certainly never a clear winner, reason into silence, and suddenly our position is substantiated by a need to belong instead of reason.

I used to think it was an exclusively Irish trait to not admit to being wrong, but since moving to the United States, it seems that I have been misled. Human beings are prone to simplifying the truth, and, when it suits, twisting it to conform to their belief system. We talk ourselves into positions that we find difficult to extract ourselves from, and this is not honourable, nor is it democratic. When we take an absolute stance, politically, or morally, we silence the still, small voice of reason. That part of us that is not convinced by the need to defend a position, and ostracize the alternative, will not be silenced.

When I look back at the heated discussions my family had, I rejoice. They taught me a lot, though I would not have said so at the time, but they did. We were divided on so many things but we were still family. The shared sense of attachment was enough to keep us united, and it allowed us to hear each other, though we may not have said so at the time. I'm not the same person that I was then. My views

is due, in part, to the opposing perspectives of my brothers.

It's so tempting to simply react, whereas it's harder to keep calm and breathe. We each see a different side of the room, but its limited and incomplete, and to quote the bard 'the lady doth protest too much' when we defy reason when we obliterate the right to free speech. It's harder to keep calm,

and listen.

Getting to Know the Irish

Who is Michael D. (Daniel) Higgins? I anticipate we all know this answer. He is the 9th and current president of Ireland. (2011-present) Higgins is also a poet, sociologist, author, and broadcaster. An impressive multifaceted list of qualifications and careers for one to hold. I'm so drawn to his mix of interests, I think it helps to make him a well rounded leader. I'd like to add that he's a globetrotter, quite endearing and unique. He was born in 1941 (75) in Co. Limerick. (Treaty Co.) However, at 5 years old he and his brother were sent by their mother to live in Co. Clare with an unmarried uncle. Higgins father John was a lieutenant in the Irish Republican army. Higgins attended St. Flannan's College in Ennis. As an undergraduate at University College Galway he served as Vice Auditor of the College's Literary and Debating Society. Higgins graduated from Indiana Univer-

sity Bloomington with a masters degree in Sociology. He is a fluent speaker of Irish and also speaks Spanish. President Higgins married Sabina Coyne from Galway. They have 4 children together. Mrs. Higgins was trained as an actress using the Stanislavski's system. (theater acting style) Their daughter Alice was elected into the Seanad this year. Higgins served as a TD for the Galway constituency. He was minister for

Arts, Culture and the Gaeltacht.

(He re established the Irish film

board and set up the Irish language television station. (TG4)

He was President of the Labour

party, he resigned following his election as President of Ireland.

He made the first state visit by

an Irish president to the UK. He

was a member of Dail Eirann for

25 years and a member of Seanad

Eireann for 9 years. (Senate) He was honorary adjunct professor at the Irish Centre for Human

Rights at the National Univer-

sity of Ireland, Galway. Higgins originally joined Fianna Fail but switched to the labour party. He was first elected to Dail Eirann at the 1981 election as a labor party TD. Higgins returned to the Dail at the 1987 general election and held his seat until 2011 general election. He was selected as candidate for the presidency at a special convention beating former senator Kathleen O'Meara. His candidacy was endorsed by his great friend, actor Martin Sheen. (born in Ohio, Ramon Estevez, mom from Co. Tipperary and his dad from Spain)

Higgins is the first president of Ireland to have served in both houses of the Oireachtas, having been a member of the Dail Eirann and Seanad Eirann. He wrote to the Dept. of Public Expenditure to request this his salary be reduced from 325,000 euro to 250,000. I think by this measure he is implying greed has no place in the presidency. Higgins agreed to become the Patron of Clans of Ireland. The Clans (Families) of Ireland was created in 1989, with the purpose to maintain and create a register of Irish Clans. He wrote and presented a television film on Montserrat, (Caribbean island) titled "The other Emerald Isle". He made a documentary on the life of Noel Browne (politician/doctor, Galway) for RTE. He has revitalized Ireland's canal

network resulting in 1,000 kilometers of navigable waterways supporting thousands of jobs and creating wealth in many rural and economically disadvantaged areas in Ireland. One of my favorite things about Higgins is how he campaigns for human rights and has written about the conflicts in many parts of the world such as Nicaragua, Cambodia, Iraq and Somalia. Higgins became the first recipient of the Sean MacBride Peace Prize of the International Peace Bureau in Helsinki in 1992. Higgins has spoken about his modest beginnings and being separated from his family at a young age. He has worked as a factory worker and has showed he truly is a president for the people. I admire him on several accounts and had the good fortune to meet him on a visit to Chicago. My boyfriend Michael made it possible in 2014 at the Irish American Heritage Center. The president and his wife Sabina were very gracious, it's a day I will never forget.

Higgins was often asked if he was too old to become president at the age of 70. His reply, " it's not the years in the life, it's the life in the years". The band, The Saw Doctors wrote a song about Higgins titled, Rockin in the Dail.

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

Brexit & Ireland -A New Relationship

On June 23rd 2016, the United Kingdom (UK) voted to leave the European Union (ERU) in an in-out referendum. The official vote ended with 52% of the UK voting to leave the ERU and 48% voting to remain. There has been much said about the vote. Scotland and Northern Ireland voted overwhelmingly to remain and Wales and England



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voted to leave. Additionally, there was a generational split in the vote, as a large majority or people under 50 years of voted to remain and those over 50 voted to leave. The results of this dramatic decision have sent shock waves across the global political and economic landscape. In the days and weeks following the referendum, the stock

market plummeted, the British pound hit its lowest level in over 30 years, and a new prime minister was named. Most of these effects come and go, economies recover, governments change, and currencies fluctuate. One lasting and most frequently ignored side effect of the Brexit decision is the impact that it will have on the people of the UK and non-citizen residents of the UK. The personal impact of this decision will be realized in the decades to come. A primary reason for voting to leave was based on anti-immigrant rhetoric propagated by the leave campaign. The nature of the rhetoric is similar to what is presently taking place in the United States. The rise of nationalist populism is most certainly on the rise and unfortunately, immigrants are often the scape goat for such campaigns. In the week immediately following the referendum, the National Police Chiefs Council in the UK reported a 57% increase in hate crimes compared to the previous month. There is still uncertainty of the fates of many Brits living in other EU countries and of EU citizens living in Britain. Whatever the final agreement may be, this vote has severely damaged the community fabric of Britain.


After Article 50 (official request to leave the EU) is enacted, there will be two years of intense negotiations between the UK and the EU on how to make this split as smooth as possible. It will still have to be decided what route the UK will take post Brexit. Will they join the European Free Trade Association like Norway, Iceland, and Switzerland? Will they negotiate their own UK specific free trade agreement with the EU similar to the one recently completed with Canada? Will they revert back to World Trade Organization rules, or some other special agreement? Whatever the case may be, it can be expected

that the EU will not make the negotiations easy as they would like to make an example of the UK Once a clear path has been decided upon by the British government, Ireland will have a better understanding on how this decision will affect them. The Irish government has had a contingency plan in place should the UK vote to leave the EU. Already there are very clear impacts that this vote is having on Ireland. Some political parties in Ireland and Northern Ireland have been calling for a border poll to reunite the country. There has been a dramatic spike in Irish citizenship and passport applications from the Northern Ireland and Great Britain as an attempt for British people to maintain their rights as an EU citizen post Brexit. There will also be long term effects for Ireland that are still unknown. It is unclear if there will again be a hard boarder between the Republic and Northern Ireland. It is also unclear what the economic impact will be on Ireland. These are all very important questions that need to be answered and the new Prime Minister, Theresa May. Prime Minister May has a mammoth task ahead of her.

Suffice it to say that there are some difficult times ahead for Great Britain and its citizens. It is unfortunate that the political rhetoric overshadowed the true impacts of a leave vote. The people of Scotland, Northern Ireland, and the younger generation of the UK will pay the price for those who did not vote, those who casted their ballot as a statement never expecting the leave vote to win and those who were apathetic.

Over a period of several months in 2014 and up to the summer of the following year I had a number of experiences that I was then - and still am now – unable to describe as clearly as I would like to be able to do. They were ultimately to lead to a shaking-up of my entire belief system. I tried with limited success to describe one such experience in this column last year, when I wrote:

"A while back I took a walk up to the beautiful Renville area, just three miles outside of my home in Oranmore. As I stood looking out over the water and across the bay to Ardfry House on the far side, I thought the feeling of being linked to everything would overwhelm me. It wasn't some sort of vision or even anything that someone else might have found particularly interesting.

"It just suddenly hit me that some scenes from the film 'The Mackintosh Man', starring Paul Newman, had been filmed at Ardfry in 1973; that it was directed by John Huston, who kept an estate outside Craughwell, the next village up from Oranmore, for many years; that a while back I went to a special screening in Galway of his final film, 'The

Anjelica gave us some wonderful reminiscences of growing up there; that Paul Newman was to later return to Ireland and do some real good through his Barretstown charity foundation... "I felt as if it went on and on;

and that if I just thrust my fingers into the soil of this land I would find connections to all parts of the world and all sorts of disparate personalities. I was left -quite literally – shaken; shaken and filled with this extraordinary feeling of happiness.

"There's an expression from crossed my mind since schooldays: anima mundi, something like 'the soul of the world'. I genuinely feel now that if you leave yourself open to the positive instead of endlessly dwelling on the negative, that feeling which comes is almost its own reward."

I was frustrated then as now by my inability to communicate just what this meant to me. I've discovered since that I'm hardly the only person that this has happened to. There seem to be countless examples.

I was leafing through a book in a second-hand store last week when I came across a piece from a Russian mathematician called Ouspensky (about whom I knew absolutely nothing) when this jumped out at me:

"The unknown is unlike anything that we can suppose about it. The complete unexpectedness of everything that is met with these experiences, from great to small, makes the description of them difficult... First of all, everything is unified, everything is linked together, everything is explained by something else and in turn explains another thing. There is nothing separate, that is, nothing that can be named or described separately..."

I was knocked back by the similarities to what I had felt.

Now, I would have been a person who – if I thought about it all – perceived the universe as neither good nor bad, but as simply indifferent. Utterly unknowable and utterly indifferent, with Dead', at which his daughter nothing at all behind it. Yet it

now seems to me that I've missed you should aspire to. the point completely.

I'm unwilling to talk about 'mystic experiences' since that conjures up for me amusing images of hermits with long beards screaming about someone digging up their juniper bushes. But it almost appears to me now that the very best of people live their entire lives as a kind of mystic experience.

Î'm thinking of my friends Marian and George. They are a completely ordinary couple except that they're not. They are examples – and there are many, of course, but these are two I know - who have led decent, even exemplary lives.

This is a world that rewards totally talentless and odious people, who have done nothing more with their lives than release a sex tape. And it rewards them with not only fortune but by holding them up as people whose lifestyle

Any sane society would have them in a zoo. Yet the media venerate these ghastly creatures whilst the likes of George and Marian go unremarked – genuine heroes who have worked all their lives and instilled values in children who are now following in their footsteps as people that any society would be proud to have.

It takes no skill whatsoever to crash and drink your way through life, hurting all around you – I would have been something of an expert in that - and I am in awe of both George and Marian and the many like them. The ones that no one will ever hear of, but without whom our society would fall apart.

What a blinded fool I've been, my whole life.

The words of poems are powerful things that can captivate the imagination and dreams of men and women.

On a monument to the martyrs of 1916 at Glasnevin Cemetery, is this poem by Dora Sigurson. "They lit a fire within their land that long was ashes cold, With splendid dreams they made it glow...They lit a beacon in their land, built of the souls of men..."

Repressive, tyrannical states, like the Soviet Union or British Empire, can seize guns, arms, and printing presses. But they can't control poetry. President Kennedy might have been thinking of this when he said: "When power corrupts, poetry cleanses."

About that repression by tyrannies, Oscar Wilde, at the end of the 1880's said: "There is, however, one art which no tyranny can kill and no penal laws can stifle the art of poetry...The poetry and music of Ireland have been...the very bulwark of patriotism..."

Poems are usually short—can be easily memorized or copied on a single sheet of paper and have powerful words.

The editor Mairead Ashe Fitzgerald has assembled 51 poems of the period before, during and after the 1916 Rising.

As a result of the Great Famine, emigration, and the carefully planned death of the Irish language by Ireland's colonial masters, Ireland's national culture was slowly dying.

However, people of idealism and vision opposed that and were even willing to fight for Ireland.

The author says; "There was a prevailing atmosphere of renewal...which brought a revitalized energy to the Irish language, the visual arts, literature, the theatre, and the sporting arena." She goes on to say: "...a people was awakening to the possibilities of nationhood, and the transforming events of Easter 1916 were immortalized by the poet W.B. Yeats: "All changed, changed

utterly, a terrible beauty is born."

In Search of the Irish Dreamtime—Archaeology and **Early Irish Literature**

By J.P. Mallory Thames and Hudson Amazon

The aim of this book is to relate archaeological evidence to the stories and legends of Ireland's beginning. Origin stories are especially important because Ireland has "The earliest 'cultural history' in Europe after the Greeks and Romans."

That early period is called the Mythological cycle. The years for that period in Ireland's history are 2958BC to about the first century BC.

The author says "To investigate...we need to compare the evidence of the earliest Irish literary tradition with archaeology. In short, we need to be literary archaeolo-

Another Celtic scholar is the renowned Peter Berresford Ellis. He specializes in the history of early Irish and Celts and has published dozens of books about his findings. In a recent book about the period covered by this book, he cites—three times—the phrase used by the early Irish for this period of stories and legends. They called that period, "the time before time."

Why did the author, J.P. Mallory, use the Australian aborigine term of Dreamtime, when one used by the early Irish was

Some biographical information from the publisher about the author. He "is a world expert on the interconnection of archaeology and linguistics...He is Emeritus Professor of Prehistoric Archaeology at Queen's University Belfast and a member of the Royal Irish Academy."

Mallory has meticulously researched this book, and has included 14 pages of notes and an eight page bibliography! There are also eight pages of beautiful color pictures, and many black and white illustrations.

There are many archaeological finds he relates to the origin stories of Ireland. Some of these finds are: skeletal remains of humans and animals found in bogs, tree rings, various forts with their ring and ditch defenses, swords, and scabbards, spears and javelins, bows and arrows, slings, shields, battle axes, breast plates, chariots and wagons, plant pollen, game boards, etc.

Stories and legends of Ireland's beginning are difficult to understand but as the author says, "...there are...pieces of hard evidence that may disturb our skepticism."

Or as Sean O'Casey said: "The past flies over us, but leaves its shadow behind."

Expecting perfection from yourself, from others or from life usually generates procrastination, clutter and stress. (which, coincidentally, happen to be the 3 topics of my books.)

That's not saying that instead of perfection, you should strive for mediocrity. I don't think anyone who takes time to read this would accept mediocrity. What i'm saying is --

Shoot for excellence. That is achievable. Perfection is hardly every achievable. Julie Cameron said:

Perfectionism is not a quest for the best. It is a pursuit of the worst in ourselves, the part that tells us that nothing we do will ever be good enough -- that we should try again.

Years ago, i was signing books after giving a talk at a conference, and a woman standing in line said, "my house is always a mess.... Because i am a perfectionist." the guy next to her blurted, "that sounds backwards. I'd think if you're a perfectionist, your house would look perfect."

She said, "no!! I was taught the right way to clean the kitchen floor is to move everything to one side, wash it, then move everything

back. If i don't have the time or energy to do something perfectly.... I don't do it at all."

You might not think of yourself as a perfectionist, but have you ever put off anything because you didn't have the time or energy to do it perfectly?? Maybe something like launching a decorating project or starting a financial retirement plan or writing that book or tackling all that paper clutter in your life?

Here's a great quote by Karen Ireland:

Waiting until everything is perfect before making a move is like waiting to start a trip until all the traffic lights are green.

Many times, while

people wait for the right mood, the ideal amount of time, the best conditions or any other "perfect" factors to come together, they put on hold de-

cisions, actions, beginnings, endings, moves, purchases, relationships, careers, or their lives.

Yet haven't you discovered that anyone who has ever been successful has experienced mistakes and failures along the way. It happens to everyone. Here's what Michael Jordan said about that:

I've missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. Twenty-six times i've been trusted to make the gamewinning shot and missed.

I've failed over and over and over again in my life. So that is why I succeed.

Once you accept the fact that only god is perfect and you are not, then you might find your perfectionism melting away.

As some of you know, i used to be the world's greatest procrastinator. One of the first steps that moved me to break that "putting-off" habit was grasping the difference between excellence and perfection. Doing my best but accepting that it probably won't be perfect.

I believe it is truly liberating (and can help preserve your sanity) to culitvate an attitude of

"Shoot for excellence. That is achievable. Instead of perfection which usually isn't."



At the heart of the Jubilee Year of Mercy is the promise of jointly by the Centers for Disease Control hope—hope that through the grace of God, lives and communities can be changed for the better. As we recover from an especially violent summer in our city and nation, Pope Francis' call for us to bring mercy and hope to our brothers and sisters in need is more critical than ever.

One of the important ways Catholic Charities is bringing hope to desperate communities is through our Youth and Family Therapeutic Services Department. Master's-level therapists provide counseling and support to children and their families in schools and office settings in some of the most troubled neighborhoods in the City of Chicago. They specialize in what is known as trauma-informed therapy, which helps children overcome challenging, and often heartbreaking situations, so that negative experiences do not have a detrimental impact on future behavior and health.

Although we have always intuitively known that experiencing trauma early in life can have negative effects, the Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) study, conducted



and Prevention and Kaiser Permanente, has provided important research-backed evidence that childhood trauma can impact physical and emotional well-being into adulthood. The study began tracking 17,000 people in 1997 and is still on-going, with over 50 scientific articles published to date.

The ACEs study measures participant exposure to childhood trauma including things like experiencing recurrent physical, emotional, and or sexual abuse; living with a parent or other household member who abuses drugs or alcohol; having an incarcerated household member; living with someone who is chronically depressed, suicidal, or mentally ill; experiencing the loss of a parent or loved one through death, divorce or separation; and witnessing recurrent domestic or community violence. The study shows that the more adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) participants have, the greater the likelihood of future emotional and

physical problems including alcoholism, drug use, smoking, teen pregnancy, poor school performance, violent behavior, depression, suicide, and numerous health conditions such as lung and liver disease.

Part of the explanation for the negative mental and physical health consequences is that the young brain is especially vulnerable to stress and fear. When prolonged exposure to stress or fear occurs during infancy and childhood, the stress hormone cortisol is continually released, compromising normal brain development and harming the immature immune and nervous systems. If no protective factors are introduced by parents or other caring adults, cortisol

release is not interrupted and can contribute to future health problems. Additionally, without intervention, negative coping mechanisms, such as aggression or substance use, might be adopted to deal with the effects of the traumas.

While the ACEs study confirms our worst fears about childhood trauma, it also provides tremendous hope for the future. For we now know that it is key to intervene with children who have had multiple traumas by providing a safe and supportive environment to process their experiences, and teaching them healthy coping mechanisms to ease stress and build resilience. This is particularly important in troubled neighborhoods where the cycle of violence and social problems repeats itself. Catholic Charities Youth and Family Therapeutic Services Department is present in these communities, walking with children on their healing journey, and teaching them and their family members new and positive strategies for coping with negative experiences.

Trauma-informed therapy is an inspiring example of the mercy Pope Francis hopes will change the world. It is a ray of hope for children shrouded in darkness, and is an important strategy for addressing the root causes of violence, poverty, and social problems that take hold in some of our most beleaguered neighborhoods. It gives us hope that positive change can happen—one child, one family at a time.

The numbers really don't

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
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In price return terms, the S&P 500 has gained an average of 6.1% in election years, going back to 1948, compared to 8.8% in any given vear. The index has posted a yearly gain in 76% of presidential election years starting in 1948, however, as opposed to 71% in other years. Opening a very wide historical window, the Dow has averaged nearly a 6% gain in election years since 1833. Across that same time frame, it has averaged a 10.4% gain in "year three" - years preceding election years. Of course, much of this performance could be chalked up to macroeconomic factors having nothing to do with a presidential race. Many election years have seen solid advances for the small caps. The average price return of the Russell 2000 is 10.9% in election years going back to 1980, with a yearly gain occurring 78% of the time.

Do stocks respond if a particular party has control of Congress? InvesTech studied S&P

500 yearly returns since 1928 and found that the S&P rethe two years after a presidential election when the White House and Congress were controlled by the same party. In the 2-year stretches after a presidential election, when Congress was controlled by the party that didn't occupy the White House, the price return of the S&P averaged 15.6%. When control of Congress was split – regardless of who was President – the S&P only those 2-year periods.

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22 presidential elections since 1928. In those 22 years, the incumbent party won the White turned an average of 16.9% in House 86% of the time when the S&P advanced during the three months preceding Election Day. Of course, other factors may have been considerably more influential in these elections, such as a given president's approval rating and the unemployment rate.

"When I was a boy growing up we had several gardens around our old house. The largest one of all was used just for growing

I can still remember those potato planting days. The whole family helped. After my Dad had tilled the soil, my Mom, brothers, and I went to work. It was my job to drop the little seed potatoes in the rows while my Mom dropped handfuls of fertilizer beside them. My brothers then covered them all with the freshly turned earth.

For months afterward I would glance over at the garden while I played outside and wonder what was going on underneath the ground. When the harvest time came I was amazed at the huge size of the potatoes my Dad pulled out of the soil. Those little seedlings had grown into bushels and bushels of sweet sustenance. They would be turned into meal after meal of baked potatoes, mashed potatoes, fried potatoes, and my personal favorite: potatoes slowed cooked in spaghetti sauce. They would keep the entire family well fed throughout the whole year. It truly was a miracle to behold.

Thinking back on those special times makes me wonder how many other seeds I have planted in this life that have grown unseen in the hearts and minds of others. How many times has God used some little thing that I said or did to grow something beautiful? How many times has Heaven used these little seedlings to provide another's soul with sweet sustenance?

Every single day of our lives we step out into the garden of this world. Every single day we plant seeds that can grow into something wonderful. We may never see the growth that comes from the kind words or loving acts we share but God does. I hope then that you always tend the garden around you with care. I hope that you plant only goodness, peace, and compassion in the lives of everyone you meet. I hope that everyday you help miracles to grow."

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

Elsewhere: Site-Specific Theatre by Terry Boyle

In a city crammed with small theatre groups, it's difficult to find a niche that's not already been taken and yet, it seems that Elsewhere Theatre Collective have found something quite unique. I met with founding director Antonio Rodriguez to ask him about this exciting new kind of

T.B: Who are Elsewhere Theatre Collective?

A. R: Elsewhere is a performance collective with an aim at bringing an alloriginal site-specific performance group to the city of Chicago. Our goal is to bring theatre directly to the community, staging completely original plays on location all across the city. Elsewhere is dedicated to community involvement and diversity, not only in our casting, but in our storytelling and in the neighborhoods and locations we choose for our productions.

T. B: What is site-specific theatre and why is it different to traditional shows?

A.R: Site-specific theatre is theatre that happens anywhere outside a traditional theater space, in the real-world setting of the play. With ETC, we choose the space, then the playwright pens a script based on that space and then we rehearse and

perform the production "on-site."

T. B: Your current show, From the Cookie Jar, takes place in a coffee shop/ record store. What other places are you planning to perform in?

A.R: At this point, we are already

working on our second production, hopefully slated to open May/June of next year. We are working with a guitar studio in the West Loop as the space and have a second playwright with a script already in progress. On-site Theatre, the St. Louis based group that I have drawn heavily from for our model, has staged plays in a Laundromat, a boxing gym, a cupcake shop, an art museum, and even a moving bus. We are open to any space that will have us and provides a compelling backdrop for a good story.

T.B: Chicago has so many small theatre groups, so what is unique about E.T.C?

A.R: I think the most unique aspect of see a show like this? ETC is that our plan is to produce *solely* site-specific theatre, which no other company in Chicago does. Also, our model requires our productions to be original, and written in the months leading up

to the performance. By commissioning original work, we engage artists from the playwright to the performers, experiencing the full range of the life of a play. There are a lot of writers trying to get work produced and we feel that outside of our site-

specific mission, we are also dedicated to giving voice to new playwrights.

T.B: What can people expect when they

A. R: Each show is going to be different and each production will treat the audience differently. We want people to leave our shows questioning their own role, as audience. Are they voyeurs?

Flies on the wall? Are they part of the environment, or are they really present during the action? This kind of performing can be very intimate and sometimes even uncomfortable due to the proximity of the actors to the audience.

But those experiences can be very valuable for someone looking for a fresh theatrical experience. Beyond that, the audience can expect to be immersed in the action.

I went to see From the Cookie Jar by Maggie Stamell and was impressed with the quality of the acting, and writing. Stamell's women characters, particularly Dee-Dee (played by the talented Julie Stevens), are well observed, and provide us with lively interaction. The comedy rests most squarely on Stevens shoulders and she

delivers her lines to great effect. Claire (played by Hannah Williams) embodies the gossip we all love to hate. This short play, only 50 minutes, is a good taster of what can be achieved when theatre breaks out of the stage and into mainstream society. From the Cookie Jar is a good appetizer, and I look forward to seeing more of what this company produces.

Irish Emigrant Perspectives on Emigration

Last July a very interesting report was published titled Irish Emigrant Perspectives on Emigration: Research report on the Welfare Experiences of Irish Emigrants with the GAA. The report was a joint initiative by Crosscare Migrant Project – an Irish based organization that assists Emigrant before they leave and on their return to Ireland – and the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA). The research sought feedback from officers at GAA clubs throughout the world to capture the experiences of the Irish who moved abroad and their perspectives on moving back home to Ireland. The research is based on the responses of 80 officers in GAA

The report's findings were Irish American Heritage Center presented in three sections as discussed below

1)Emigration Challenges This section asked respondents what they considered to be the greatest welfare related challenges facing Irish Emigrants. find ourselves needing a little The data was somewhat unsurprising with Employment, Living Costs, Health, and Housing all respectively topping the list of issues faced by Irish Emigrants. 18% of those that provided feedback felt that a lack of support networks was a **Keeping Yourself and Your** challenge to Irish emigrants and the same percentage felt that the immigration systems of their host countries and obtaining visa was a challenge to emigrants. Only 6 of the 80 respondents indicated that acclimatizing to the culture and lifestyle of their new homes was a challenge.

2)Pre-Departure Advice

This section asked respondents to indicate how they thought emigrants could be better prepared before they left Ireland. The most commonly

offered advice was to identify support networks ahead of time in the places where emigrants were intending to move. Again 'employment' featured prominently with 30% of respondents advising that sourcing work can be very challenging and recommending having savings to ensure financial security, setting up interview prior to departure, and trying to establish a network in the high cost of living in Ireland the destination country before was a deterrent to those hoping leaving Ireland. 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
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IRISH-AMERICA ASKS: What's with Ireland's 1916 COMMEMORATION: Regarding government? 'Ireland's" recently-unveiled Memorial Wall, Roderic Wilson, grandson of the immortal James Connolly, asks the world: "How can any Irish person contemplate, never mind propose, that the names of British army personnel be inscribed at Glasnevin Cemetery alongside those they killed or illegally executed during the Easter Rising? This would not occur in any other country." Yet Ireland's government does it and the following: **BIRMINGHAM SIX**: Britain kept murderers at large by torturing six innocent Irishmen into signing false confessions. Fr. Dennis Faul and Msgr. Ray Murray, flew to DC to seek justice from Congress. Before the priests arrived, "Irish" Ambassador Sean Donlon slandered the priests to key US Senators who then refused to meet them. The two returned to Ireland, defeated. Similarly, Ireland's Consul General here in Chicago warned us about supporting "terrorists." Consequently the B-6 remained in prison for sixteen years. Finally, despite "Ireland's" government, international outrage forced Britain to release and exonerate the B-6. GUILDFORD FOUR and Maguire Family were subjected to British crimes identical to the above. "Ireland's" gov't

also smeared them.

MACBRIDE PRINCIPLES: In 1973, after a bloodily-suppressed six-year campaign the Occupied Irish won the right to vote. Britain responded with a job-denial policy to force Catholics (Irish) into exile and thus off the voter rolls. At that time twenty-five US companies employed 11% of its working population; so Irish-America responded. The MacBride Principles were established, requiring those companies to maintain fair hiring practices. Illinois was the fourth State to enact MacBride. State Rep John McNamara advised us. Speaker Madigan's district encompassed 55th to 79th St. and from Kedzie west into the suburbs. When signatures were collected from all Irish-surnamed households in the eastern 80% of Madigan's district he


sided with us (Irish-Illinois remains grateful) bringing in sixty Democratic reps' votes. Needing Republican support, we collected signatures in "Pate" Phillips' and Lee Daniel's NW suburban districts. Irish-Illinois won by 84 to 14 in the House and 53 to 2 in the Senate despite "Irish" Consul General Peter Gunning who, along with British consuls general, spoke against enactment. Our leader John McNamara called Gunning's deed; "Betrayal from the most unexpected quarter of all." SURRENDER of the disputed Six-Counties to Britain. It was the largest loss of national territory in history absent catastrophic military defeat. Highway lightpoles from Maynooth to Kinnegad flew "Irish" government banners portraying Taoiseach Albert Reynolds and VOTE YES FOR PEACE. (The violence was history: homicides had peaked at 472 in 1972, dropping to 69 by 1984, fourteen years prior to the 1998 "peacemaking" transfer of territory.) But torture and abuse of republican prisoners has resumed. So do frame-ups (the Craigavon Two) and, as experienced by elected Moyle Councilor Padraig McShane and family, public death threats, fire-bombings, and assaults immunized or perpetrated by the RUC/PSNI. SHANNON **AIRPORT** usage is illegally allowed by "Ireland's" government to planes transporting personnel and weapons to sites of our Neo-Cons' Supreme Crimes. Ditto "rendition" planes. By arresting protesters Gardai Siochana facilitate these violations of international law. **IRELAND'S HOLOCAUST** of 1845-1850. Five million innocents were murdered by 67 British army regiments who removed, at gunpoint, Ireland's abundant food crops. Its growers were robbed, lethally, of their output on the false basis that it belonged to the English landlord who usurped all produced on "his" land. "YOU'RE BEHIND THIS" said my Mary to "Irish" Consul General Sheridan as he entered the guard shack at Milwaukee's Irishfest. We were distributing, gratis, my Mass Graves of Ireland pamphlet when an off-duty policeman, without warning, smashed her in the mouth with his transceiver, badly splitting her lip which spouted blood. I called for police who soon arrived. While I pointed out her attacker they handcuffed me and pushed me backwards onto concrete on my handcuffed hands. They took us to what?" replied; "No I'm not." Eventually, the police took us to a hospital for the wounds they had inflicted. After treatment they drove us to the City Jail and incarcerated us until Noon the next day. We have since learned that "Ireland's" gov't opposes the facts of Ireland's Holocaust.

Ireland's true Dáil was established on January 21, 1919 following the islandwide election sweep of 1918. It was duly formed by the winners of that election; but King George V declared it "an illegal assembly" and set about arresting and killing its elected officials. In 1922 King George, despite the voted will of Ireland's people, established his own "Irish" government, the Royal Dáil. Subsequent Dáils to date are de facto Royal Dáils, and govern accordingly. This explains the above wrong-doing. VERIFY for yourself. Ask any "Irish" gov't official; "What date is Ireland's Independence Day?" If he/she fails to reply "January 21," you will know why. You will also know that Ireland will one day soon abolish its Royal Dáil and reestablish its true Dáil of 21Jan1919. Irish sovereignty awaits.

From the Motherland

ISIS

There IS a militant Islamic presence in Ireland. On July 6 a Jordanian living in Ireland since 2000 was deported. What made this gentleman special (300 odd have been deported this year) is that his deportation came after a lengthy legal battle, held in camera, in which the judge was finally convinced by the State that he was the main recruiter for ISIS in Ireland and "the foremost organiser and facilitator of travel" for would-be ISIS fighters. His claim to reside in Ireland was on the basis of an Irish born son. While here he had been living on Irish Social Welfare. Justice Minister Frances Fitzgerald made clear afterwards that the Government would deport as necessary where matters of national security were involved.

The deportation came a week before the mass murder in Nice of eighty five by an ISIS sympathiser. The spate of recent lone wolf terror attacks, including the horrendous Bastille Day massacre, has left much of Europe on edge wondering whether anywhere is safe. The simple answer is "Nowhere" but clearly there are degrees of threat. As elsewhere, threat assessment is being conducted here.

Irish people have had several brushes with Middle Eastern terrorism. Three Irish holiday makers were among those murdered in Tunisia last year and Irish people were among those wounded in the Paris Bataclan massacre last November. The roll call of murders and beheadings in Iraq included a couple of Irish citizens. And, going back a generation, in 1986, a young, totally innocent, Irish woman in London was duped by her Jordanian fiancée into attempting to carry a bomb disguised in a suitcase onto an EL AL 747.

It would be surprising if there weren't some elements of radical Islam here, given the proximity of Britain, Ireland's relatively easy going and open society and the number of immigrants to arrive since the Millenium. The official line is that threat of a direct terror attack here is moderate. This despite a bragging ISIS video last November which identified Ireland as part of the "kuffars" (the n-word favoured by ISIS to describe Christians and others) forming the global "Coalition of Devils" opposed to the Islamic State. This may just mean that we are, like all infidels, fair game and clearly the possibility of a lone wolf attack can never be discounted totally. However, with this caveat, the official

threat assessment looks reasonable for several reasons. Realistically there are easier and more obvious targets. Ireland is not a NATO member; we are a militarily neutral country and not part of the coalition fighting ISIS (a reason cited by ISIS when claiming different terrorist atrocities). It is true that Ireland permits US troops to stopover at Shannon Airport, but, against that, geographically Ireland is remote, an offshore island behind an offshore island, rendering logistics for any attack that more difficult. Moreover, for what it's

worth, Ireland has been seen as pro-Palestinian and Irish troops on UN Peacekeeping operations in the region have a high reputation.

The nature and position of the Muslim community in Ireland are also factors. Mao's aphorism that a "guerrilla must move among the people as a fish swims in the sea" is relevant here. While there are a small number of ISIS

activists known or suspected to be living here – the deportee was reported to be one of a group of about thirteen - the overwhelming majority of the Muslim community in Ireland, as elsewhere, are law abiding and have no truck with ISIS or militant Islam. The community is numerically small, roughly 50,000 or 1% of the population in the 2011 census, and, therefore, hardly constituting a critical mass within which ISIS – or Al Qaida – could move with impunity. Indeed in Western Europe only Finland, Portugal and the Baltics have less Muslims, numerically and proportionately.

Moreover, Islam in Ireland, which is mainly of recent origin, has developed in a different pattern to those other European countries with large Muslim communities. In Germany most are Turks, in France and Belgium most are from North Africa, in Britain most are from the Indian sub-Continent. Muslims here appear more diverse in terms of race and ethnic origin and most came with established skill sets and for specific purposes rather than as refugees or economic migrants. An important consequence is that Ireland has no predominantly Muslim or immigrant ghettoes akin to Molenbeek in Brussels or one of the Parisian banlieues, where extremism flourishes among sections of the alienated young (or indeed to Leeds, where three of the London Tube bombers grew up). There is no sense or feeling that a separate community within the community is evolving here.

Yet a problem, however small, clearly exists and with alarm bells ringing in the aftermath of the July terror attacks, the facts such as they are are being picked over by the media here. Security briefings suggest that up to fifty young Irish Muslims have gone to fight for ISIS. While this could be partly written off as rebellious and impressionable youth, there have also been calls in recent months from some of the Imams here for closer engagement by the authorities with their communities as well as claims by them that extremists are active, lecturing and proselytising. One factor is that the common travel area with Britain makes it easy for radical preachers and recruiters to travel here and hold private sessions. And, as experience elsewhere has shown, grooming over the Internet is virtually impossible to monitor

The adequacy of our surveillance measures to combat any threat, particularly for a police force shredded by cuts since 2008, has been questioned. More resources have been promised to the Gardai to beef up the existing structures but these have yet to come on stream and there has been criticism from some Garda representatives that the force is ill prepared to deal with an atrocity.

tives that the force is ill prepared to deal with an atrocity.

There have been complaints also about the lack of information and transparency on Ireland's anti-terrorist security structures and operations generally, in contrast

to Britain. This, and the sharing of information with

other security services, is clearly a delicate issue. Surveillance of terrorists here has traditionally been directed at republican terrorism, where for various reasons very little was divulged publicly and old habits die hard. Moreover, the threat from dissident republicans remains a real one, with men, weapons and explosives very much here on the island and constituting a real quantifiable threat.

Indeed the proximity of Britain adds another worrying dimension. Up to now attention and resources in the North have concentrated on dissident republicans, who constitute a clear and present danger, both locally and in terms of possible infiltration, into Britain. There is now the additional possibility of Ireland being used as a base by Islamic extremists from which to plan or even mount an attack against Britain. However remote this may appear the British have been worried enough to brief at (anonymous)Ministerial level pointing out that Northern Ireland is not part of the U.K.'s "Prevent" strategy to combat violent extremism. Thrillers have been written around the subject. With increased vigilance let's hope that nightmare scenario remains in the realm of fiction.







The Mistreat of Farmers by the Chicago Tribune is an Irish Issue

Then Mac Da Thó's pig was killed for them. It was fed on three score milch-cows for seven years. However, it was fed on poison so that the slaughter of the men of Ireland might be carried out by means of it.

The pig was afterwards brought to them with forty oxen transversely across it, besides their other food. Mac Dathó himself presided over the feast. 'Welcome to you' he said 'such food as this hardly befits your status; but the Leinstermen have cattle and pigs, and what is lacking from it will be killed for you tomorrow.' 'The pig is good' said Conchobar. 'It is good indeed' said Ailill. 'In what manner will the pig be carved, Conchobar?' said Ailill. 'How indeed?' said Bricne mac Carbaid from above out of the couch, 'here in a place where there are warriors of valour, men of Ireland, but to fight for the privilege of carving it? Each one of you has given a blow across the nose of his companion before.' 'Let it be done!' said Ailill. 'It is good' said Conchobar; 'that there are young men with us who have raided the borderland.' Mac Da Tho's Pig from the 12th Century Book of Leinster

From Neolithic times when the first hunter-gatherers came to Ireland to now, pork has been an integral part of Irish culture.

The first signs of pork consumption by human beings in Ireland can be traced to 9,000 BP (Before Present in archeology; Present means 1950).

Pigs flourished in Ireland eating acorns and mushrooms and the Irish supplemented their diets with them.

A poem of great Old Irish saga Ulster Cycle, Mac Da Tho's Pig touts the value of pork to the warrior clans of Ulster, Leinster and Connchocht. Mac Da Tho has a great dog and every king wants the dog. The dog is great but the real hero of the yarn is the pig hosted for the feast. Mac Da Tho, the archetypical Irish Politician, tells two kings that they can have the dog and he will just let them fight it out. To keep the crowd of warriors happy Mac Do Tho poses a contest for the men of Leinster, Ulster and Connacht. My kinsmen must have been Vegans at the time as they are absent from broils, martial and culinary. The massive pig slaughtered for the feast in Mac Da

Tho's hostel is the length of 40 oxen

The "heroes portion," or curadmir, will be portioned to the hero who boasts the best.

Magach appears to be the winner, until Connal of Ulster pops in and he had bested Cet. Not to be outdone, Cet says, "Oh, yeah well my brother Anluan could 'take you,' Too bad he's not here." With that Conall replies, "Sure he is" and tosses Anluan's head to Cet.

Ulster gets the best pig meat and Connacht men are left with the trotters. Needless to say quite a brawl erupts and MacDa Thos's pup gets beheaded.

That was some pig.

The Irish eat pork. Cabbage, spuds and bacon is the national dish. The Irish Breakfast consists of rashers of bacon, Irish sausage and black and white pudding, as well as eggs, tomatoes, spuds and mushrooms.

During the Great Hunger, the pig survived while its owners starved to death.

In cold weather, the valuable pig which was used for rent was kept nearer to fire than the children. The slur "pig-in-the-parlor" Micks had its origins in that sober fact.

Corned beef is not Irish; it had its origin when Jewish New Yorkers were moved to pity at the sight of the starving Irish that they gifted the arrivals with beef briskets, Bacon went with cabbage and spuds back home. Sad to say, too many Irish today forget the kindness of American Jews and rail about Zionism, aping the BBC's drumbeats.

That said, I wish to object to the series that appeared in the Chicago Tribune during the month of August.

I am no stranger to hogs. As a kid, I remember north-easterly breezes meant summertime aroma therapy from the stockyards just to the north of me. Blood, bone, hide, horn and innards from cows, pigs and sheep created an atmosphere of bad smells like no other - well, maybe Gary, IN. On certain humid days in Chicago when it gets hotter than Honduras and buzzes with more big, black flies than Bombay (Mumbai for NPR doctrinaires), one can still detect that scent thirty years after the Yards closed in Canaryville.

As a young teacher, I taught in French Illinois, South Will, Kankakee and northern Iroquois Counties. It was there that I met my wife to be and her farmer family on her mother's side. They are ten generation French American who lived in St. George, Illinois and later moved to Herscher, where they developed four massive farms growing soy and corn and raising hogs.

Hog farming is one tough business - on pigs and on the folks raising them. One cannot be a farm child and not learn that life is cruel, dirty, smelly and bloody and that is decades before they learn about politicians. Lisa Madigan and Dick Durbin are part

of the Chicago Tribune series. The Attorney General filed suit against one farm three years after an 'environmental disaster' took place and Dick Durbin sails in the direction of media crafted winds.

Life is tough enough without public grifters and their propaganda apparatchiks making misery universal.

Farmers, large and small, are stewards of the land first above all and business people second. Farms pass from one generation to another and respect for the life is the key to any exchange so sacred. I spent quite a bit of time on farms and

with farmers. I observed, tried my hand at, and understood the work and respect it mightily. Animals are treated like what they were

born to be - food. They are handled hygienically and with great care

Farms that are successful become larger. The Duvals, or Messiers, or Fortins, or Marchands pass their lands, expand their lands and develop new means of growth. These are French names common to Kankakee and Iroquois Counties and along with their Dutch farming neighbors along the Illinois Indiana border they have succeeded wildly. Further to the west in Cabery, Buckingham and Dwight, the Hogans, O'Connors and McCue's hold vast pork farms.

The Chicago Tribune series is intended to villainize such names and family success

The articles give the indication that the pork producers are faceless corporations, via the 'compelling narrative' appellation - Factory Farms.

The reader is astounded to learn that the little pigs are abused and slaughtered by farm hands out of a Steinbeck novel to fatten the bank accounts of soulless plutocrats living in global tax-havens and pleasure-palaces.

You can hate Factory Farms, corporations and deny that they a people. They are corporate persons and subject to the law, however, the Law's apparati are handmaiden of Journalism. The Tribune reporters combed through State archives from the Attorney General, the Illinois EPA, as well as Sierra Club and Peta. They ignored such data from the Illinois Pork Producers Association.

Farmers are not going to poison their

Jackson and Marx would have the reader believe that faceless tycoons own Factory Farms and they are raising awareness of ordinary people to the cost of low-priced

The Chicago Tribune's targets are family farmers and not some Archer Daniels Midland mega-corporation. I know farm

I have never witnessed idiotic cruelty, like too many urban youths scalding, burning and torturing cats and dogs, by farmers. I have never heard cruelty to animals approved, much less orchestrated.

Farming is a business and a lifestyle.

The culture of farming is respectful of all living things - plants and animals.

The Chicago Tribune series on Pork Production seemed to me a cutesy, one-sided, pimp-slap by investigators who have concluded their thesis long before the ink hit the paper, reminiscent of Michael Moore's modus operandi of making the facts fit not matter where they might pop-up. The thesis is simple; cheap pork comes about because of massive agri-corporations and disregard for the torments afflicted upon pools of pigs and rivers of blood and guts and chemicals pumped into our water tables and this is horrible. Or, \$ 3.15 per pound for clean, dressed and safe to eat pork loin is only possible because pork producers are 1% er nasty creeps. Cue Andy Thayer's bullhorn! Hey, Hey, Ho, Ho! Low / Low Prices Have Gotta Go!

State EPA and Sierra Club findings with charts and graphs and interviews with alleged pollutants and animal abusers handcuffed by the bludgeon of the law appear to be "gottcha-ed" into declining comment or offering vague assent to inquiries like, " The Attorney General has filed suit against

The fact of the matter is that the farms being villainized are where the farmers actually live.

To the charges of polluting the waterways, Chicago Tribune is saying pork farmers pollute their own drinking, bathing and cooking water.

The accused farmers are hand-cuffed by law as their cases are "pending." Talk about limiting free speech. Police officers accused of every barbarity in the media are likewise abused by this breed of journalist.

Things sure seemed that way to me from reading the articles over the last three days, so I decided to call Jennifer Tirey, Executive Director of Illinois Pork Producers in Springfield and get her take on the articles and opinion hits from reporters David Jackson, Gary Marx and editor-in-chief

Bruce Dold.

Ms. Tirey told me that she had been contacted by Jackson and Marx and that she had offered a great deal of information to them in answer to their questions and very little of that information found its way into print.

Ms. Tirey and I spoke together over the phone on Thursday and Friday of this week. She was as baffled by the series as I had been and noted that much of the farm tours conducted for the two reporters were ignored, as well as data concerning farm safety, livestock care and meeting State and Federal standards for water, soil and air safety.

My theory is journalism piggy

Piggy move-up was a form of softball played in Chicago, when space or players were limited. After tossing the bat and two fingering to the "bottle cap," a batter was chosen. He needed to make a hit. The pitcher, the catcher (if needed) the basemen and fielders took up the bat in an agreed upon order.

Modern Journalism (from John Dewey on) begins with an assumption and ends when that assumption is satisfied with phrases, narratives, graphs, polls, and charts. That assumption moves along the great chain of being from Thinks Tank, to Political Action Committee, to newspapers,

and to legislation, until whatever is believed with same level of reverence as if it came from a Burning Bush- e.g. Public schools only need more money; homicides are down in Chicago; gender is neutral; Lisa Madigan really, really cares.

Theorists and social engineers come up with an idea to handcuff the planet. Global Veganism is the agenda soon to replace Climate Change, formerly called Global Warming. The United Nations came out with a decree in June calling for Universal Veganism, The Guardian (Glenn Greenwald) wrote a compelling series on Vegan or Death, Chicago Tribune

Their musicianship is nothing to sneer at as well, strong guitar and wicked whistle compliment unique fiddle, bass and accordion. Love the blend and spent the first couple of listens with the extensive liner notes in my hand for quick reference. Superb recording quality to top it all off, thanks to Compass' expert crew, makes this one memorable recording

Some of the finest recordings just come out of the blue, like summer lightening and hit just as hard. Recently I was contacted by Mary MacNamara (www.marymacnamara.net), from Tulla in East Clare, who asked if I'd be interested in reviewing an album called "The Lady's Cup of Tea" that she and her daughter Sorcha Costello had recorded. Mary is one of the finest concertina players I have ever heard, drawing depth and dimension from that wee box that few could even imagine. Joined by Sorcha, mother and daughter blend their respective talents to create as lovely and complex a musical tapestry as you could want. A Troubled See

When the news broke on August 8th that Bishop Edward Daly died I was (and still am) away on holidays. So his two memoirs are not at my elbow as I write this—more's the pity because they are very quotable. Here goes anyway.

The man who was to become the Catholic Bishop of Derry during most of the Troubles was born in 1933 in Beleek, in County Fermanagh, right on the border which had hardly been instituted a decade by then. A bi-national and a bi-cultural awareness was codified with the drawing of the border and it was in this atmosphere that Eddie Daly grew up, reared by kindly and modern-minded parents.

When he was sent to boarding

school in St. Columb's College, Derry, World War II rationing was still a fact of life. It was a gruelling regime, which he wrote in his first memoir, Mister are you a Priest?, in which boarders were in practice imprisoned in the college for three months at a stretch, entering in September and re-emerging, considerably emaciated, for Christmas. When I asked Daly, in an interview for a documentary film I wrote a number of years ago, if he and his school-mates were ever hungry, he quipped: "we were never any other way".

Daly trained for the priesthood in Rome, finding the atmosphere and life in Italy wholly embracing. Yet the North of Ireland, with its cauldron of sectarian tension which was about to

bubble up, drew him back in the mid-1960s to live and serve as a priest, and he remained there for the rest of his days. His first posting was to Castle-

derg, a then deeply divided small town in Tyrone. He developed an amateur theatre group there to produce plays as a means of entertainment, but also as a device to enable a divided people to communicate, to appreciate each other's perspectives. Daly brought his theatre producing skills to his next billet, Derry, where at first he was a parish priest in the Bogside. In Derry City he also saw for the first time quite how starkly the unionist system in the North of Ireland was rigged against Catholics, and he later expressed how embarrassed he was that he did not lead an initiative to "stand up to it". It took the Civil Rights Movement to light up the way.

If you have only seen one image of Daly, it is likely to be the shot of his emerging around a Derry corner on Bloody Sunday, holding aloft a bloody handkerchief to gain safe passage for Jackie Duddy to receive medical attention (his heroic efforts were in vain, the boy died). Daly's presence on the 30th January 1972 march was notable since it had been declared an illegal march by the Northern Irish State, and also since the de facto leader of Northern nationalism, John Hume, to whom Daly was very close all his life, publicly declared his non-identification with the march and urged people not to participate. Still, Daly and

Ireland spiralled into communal conflict that prevailed for the following decades, until the IRA Ceasefire.

Bloody Sunday haunted Daly all his life. He administered the last rites to several of the victims shot, and in an emotional interview given that day he averred "it was murder"; he readily gave evidence to the Saville Tribunal to the same effect, condemning the so-called professional army.

Yet he was—and in this he was allied with Hume—always clear that murder did not justify more murder. The homilies he delivered as bishop at St. Eugene's Cathedral in Derry, many of which form the source material of his second memoir, A Troubled See, vigorously condemn paramilitary activity and those who supported it at election time.

As bishop, Daly cut a political and even an occasionally outspoken figure. He understood how to wield episcopal power, and he was adept at influencing the media. The expanded civic role he occupied railed his opponents, who targeted him with bully-boy tactics especially over his decisions prohibiting military funerals for IRA volunteers; however, it also rallied his supporters, raising their morale against the backdrop of continuous IRA violence.

A fundamental moment in the evolution of Daly's public role in Derry was the murder of Pat Gillespie by the IRA in 1990. The IRA wished to target a checkpoint army base outside

others marched, and Northern Derry and used Pat Gillespie (an innocent and devout man who worked as a cook) as a "human bomb" by forcing him to drive a van into the checkpoint where it was exploded. Something in Daly snapped when he had to respond to the callousness of this act: the homily he delivered, in which he stated that the IRA architects of the explosion were followers of Satan, is well worth

If Daly's period as bishop delimited the Troubles, his time as Bishop of Derry also marked the decline and fall of the primacy of Catholic leaders in Irish life. By turns a modernising force and a traditionalist, Daly was both deeply committed to upholding the Catholic faith and to communicating it to an increasingly disaffected community.

His mind seemed to have evolved—his critics would say he contradicted himself—as time passed. How, for example, to reconcile Daly's criticism of priests who laicised because they wished to marry in his first memoir with an exhortation, in his second memoir, to the Catholic church that celibacy should be optional?

But doctrinal issues and political controversies cannot overshadow a life so well lived in the service of a community which very badly needed it. The phrase "cometh the hour, cometh the man" seems to have been coined to describe the role Eddie Daly played in the 1970s and 1980s in Derry. Ar dheis dé go raibh a anam dílis.

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
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
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
