Ireland and the European Union After Brexit

It would be a brave person indeed who could forecast how the Brexit saga will end. Currently, following the overwhelming Commons' defeat of the draft agreement Teresa May's team had negotiated over 18 months with the EU, May has just told Parliament how she intends to proceed. We shall see.

Most media and public attention has focussed on what will happen to Britain after Brexit, with virtual unanimity among commentators that the prognosis is bad, and that Britain faces a tough period after a self-inflicted wound. In Ireland the concern is that in trading and economic terms the country will be hit as hard if not harder than Britain and this quite apart from the issues generated and revived over the Border. Geographically Ireland will be isolated, no longer linked physically to another member state, and uniquely reliant on transit via a third country to access its markets (with trade twice that with Britain) within the Union.

Relatively little attention has been paid to what the EU will look like after Britain leaves. Yet the EU will be a much altered animal after Brexit, politically as well as financially, and not necessarily in ways that will favour Ireland. Take finances first. An immediate direct effect when Britain leaves will be the shake up in the EU's finances, whether the exit is hard or soft. A major plank in the Brexit Leave campaign in 2016 was Britain's position as the second largest economy (15% of total GDP) and the third biggest net contributor to the EU budget, with the dubious assertion that the savings made by not paying Brussels could be used to fund domestic improvements, including Britain's cash-strapped National

The EU's income is comprised of various levies on each member state, based on the size of the country's economy. The EU's expenditure consists in the main of grants back in the form of direct payments to farmers together with various programmes in and grants to the Member States. Even including the special budget rebate secured by Margaret Thatcher, Britain still pays a net €9 billion or so annually, or roughly 13% of the EU budget, behind Germany,

with 21%, and France with 16%. When she leaves, that money will have to be made up by the other nine current net contributors, including Ireland (the other eighteen, chiefly those countries who joined

from 2004 onwards, receive more in grants and payments than they contribute).

Ireland became a net contributor in 2014 after forty years of receiving more than she paid in, the cumulative total received of €50 billion plus being of inestimable value in building up the Irish economy and utterly transforming the country. This infusion, and the obvious benefits derived from it, accounts in part at least for the continued popularity of the EU in Ireland. However, the net amounts paid by Ireland since 2014 have been rising steadily – payments in in 2018 were €2.7 billion and the adjustment when Britain leaves will add at least €400 million annually to this. With Ireland facing penalties from the EU after 2020 for not meeting its environmental commitments under the Paris Agreement to counter climate change, it will be interesting to see whether and how the popularity of the EU here will fare.

Moreover, after Brexit the dynamic within the Union will alter. Britain was one of its four major heavy hitters and colouring Britain gone creates a new situation. The "Solemn Declaration" signed at the 1983 Strasbourg Summit committed the then ten Member States "to progress towards an ever closer union between the peoples and countries of the European Community." The catalyst for the growth in Euroscepticism in Britain can probably be traced to this Declaration, which developed and grew at a political level in parallel with the actual moves towards "ever closer union" including the European Single Market and the Customs Union in the 1990s.

In retrospect Britain's decision not to abandon Sterling and join the Euro at the turn of the Millennium was a watershed, a public demonstration that there was a limit to British participation in "ever closer union." Thereafter Britain acted as an effective brake on moves towards greater integration, securing opt –outs from a number of signature EU policies. These included not signing up to Economic and Monetary Union, opting out of the border-free Schengen area, and opt-outs from the Lisbon Treaty in justice and home affairs legislation.

Equally significant, and most important



from Ireland's point of view, was Britain's blocking of attempts by the Commission to "harmonise" tax policy in Member States, i.e. to remove from member states their national powers over taxation. Ireland's Company Tax Rate, currently 12.5%, has long been a target of the Commission; it has also been one of the bedrocks of Ireland's economic development and prosperity and was certainly vital in attracting inward direct investment, much of it from the USA, over the past half century. The favourable rate has not sat well with the Commission or with some other member states who have accused Ireland of poaching investment and jobs. Recent revelations that multinationals such as Apple were paying far less than 12.5% have not helped.

Having Britain in the same corner over national control of taxation was an undoubted plus for Ireland and, with Britain removed from the scene, pressure on this front will undoubtedly intensify, with Germany and France, very much the major funders of the EU after Britain leaves, both favouring some type of uniform taxation. Ireland is not alone in wanting to preserve the status quo. Several other smaller member states, particularly from the 2004 Enlargement, are like minded in this regard (I recall the Estonian Prime Minister asking me rhetorically just before accession what else had a small country on

the fringe of Europe to offer). One card in

our favour could be our very peripherality, which will be more pronounced after Brexit, and could merit special treatment in addition to special sympathy. But with those paying the piper in favour of change, expect some interesting negotiations on this in the future.

Finally, there has already been a rejigging of the seats in the European Parliament to deal with the loss of Britain's 73 seats. The size of the Parliament will be reduced from 751 to 705, with 46 of Britain's seats being reserved for future new member states, and the remaining 27 divided up among some of the existing members (Ireland will gain two seats, to thirteen). Consider. Unless Norway or Switzerland apply to join the EU (unlikely) or Britain reverses Brexit (!) the only potential new member states are in the Balkans or Eastern Europe (Serbia, Montenegro, Bosnia, FYROM, Ukraine, Moldova, Albania).

Further enlargement like this could take decades, and may never happen in several cases. But it represents a further shifting of the balance within the EU away from the countries located to the West. Britain's departure will leave a big hole in this regard and accentuate the growing hegemony of Germany. In a column some years back I wrote of the gradual emergence of a European super state, built around Germany. Thanks to Brexit this may happen sooner rather than later.

Political Meltdown

The World Economic Forum Annual Meeting at Davos, Switzerland, scheduled this year from January 22nd to January 25th, assembles national leaders and industry moguls who swap notes about the real state of the world. One of the huddles that is surely most worth being privy to is the one when the microphones have been turned off at Davos. This year's discussion is bound to focus on growing instability and political resistance in the USA, Germany, Russia, Turkey, Italy and Brazil. We are living through a moment of great tension between interest groups advancing the globalization project on the one hand, and the increasingly fervid demands of those left behind by it on the other. The elites who convene on Davos' snowy peaks will discuss, above all, the uncertainty of Brexit and the potential of contagion from the gilets jaunes (yellow vests)

First up, France. The yellow vests have mustered the most vociferous protests seen in the country for half a century. Ostensibly sparked by a hike in fuel prices, the yellow vests have paralyszed town and city centers every weekend since in November 17th to demand a better standard of living. They have exhibited great determination against water canon and riot police, while the violent wing of the operation has been just as implacable—threats against French politicians are mounting. President Macron is seriously undermined by the movement while his chief rival, Marine Le Pen and her hard-right party, National Rally, continue to make gains—currently Le Pen's party has the edge on Marcon's party in the polls.

movement in France.

If Macron lasts his full term, he will be in office until 2022.

By then, Le Pen (whom Macron beat in the 2017 presidential runoff by two votes to one) may be more palatable to the majority of French voters. Le Pen's agenda is to remove France both from the eurozone and from the EU, which would cause the collapse of both. This is exactly the sort of radical economic change that the yellow vests may ultimately be inclined to embrace. Things are no steadier across the English Channel in the UK where British parliament just overwhelmingly voted down the government's Withdrawal Agreement from the EU. Brexit was always ill-conceived and now there is a stalemate despite the need for urgent action.

The UK and France are the fifth and sixth biggest economies in the world and their political structures have not been so rattled since 1945. So far, the economic and political upheavals that our near neighbors are experiencing have not in any significant way washed up on our shores. Yet it is inevitable that Ireland will soon be profoundly affected.

If extreme politics were to emerge in Ireland, what issues would animate them? The first obvious iceberg on the horizon is the prospect of Britain leaving the EU without a deal, and the hardening of the Irish border, which would almost certainly provoke violent incidents and mass resistance.

Alloyed with these new political realities, the drastic housing shortage in Dublin and other cities could engender radical political action. Consider, for example, the surge in support for Peter Casey last October towards the end of his lackluster presidential campaign, after comments he made about Travelers. What was less remarked upon was that he made his comments about Traveler housing. It is the housing crisis, combined with the threat of eviction of mortgage-payers in arrears throughout

the country, that is kindling the awaiting a match in Ireland. Any existing party-or one not yet formed—that wishes to make housing reform its sole agenda will start with a solid support base. Today Irish political parties in-

stinctively gravitate to the political center-right with the exception of Sinn Féin whose dubious left-wing identity is a barrier to its progress into government in Dublin. For that reason, Sinn Féin seems increasingly unsure of its position to the left of the political spectrum. For instance, in an amateurish bid to brandish its left-wing credentials, Sinn Féin sent strong representation to mark Nicolás Maduro's inauguration in Venezuela in January. This is the same Maduro who inherited 'Chavismo', a socialist banana republic established by his predecessor, Hugo Chavez, in 2013. Maduro has held power in spite of multiple coups against him, spiraling corruption, his imposition of marital law to counter specious threats and the widespread impoverishment of his people—a tenth of Venezuelans have fled since Chavez took power in 1999, and this year inflation is on course to hit 10 million percent. The Venezuelan president is not recognized by any near neighbor in South America, nor by dozens of western countries, while the US has imposed economic sanctions and threatened military action against Maduro's regime. Sinn Féin leader Mary Lou McDonald, justifying the decision to endorse Maduro, said: 'The important thing is that countries freely select their political leaderships and freely elect their governments and their government officials'. Well, if that is 'the important thing', Sinn Féin's presence in Caracas was all the more egregious because Maduro unblushingly rigged the election. If Sinn Féin wishes to score points by positioning itself on the left, support for Maduro's regime is not the place to start. Something that might pay dividends for Sinn Féin would be to seize upon the nascent Irish version of the yellow vest movement which, bolstered by Sinn Féin's impressive organizational machine, could gain

Surely, though, the global problem of wealth mis-distribution requires a global response. As labor has migrated from assembly lines into systems and logarithms so too has revenue. The beneficiaries of this new economic system must make some acknowledgment of its impact on the dis-employed working and lower middle classes, and accede to redistribute money accordingly. For as long as they do not, expect many more scenes along the lines of London, Venezuela and Paris. We live in a precipitously changing world, and it is high time for political leaders confront that reality—and lead.

beings and I often wonder how the hell they sleep at night, even though I know that they do so without a sliver of conscience.

And, as I have said so often, we're the ones who let them get away with this.

Shame on us, also.

Bipolar Disorder

Bipolar is a chronic mental illness characterized by dramatic changes in a person's mood, energy levels, and ability to think clearly. Those with Bipolar Disorder experience 'high' moods or 'manic' episodes, and 'low' moods or 'depressive' episodes. Bipolar is also know as manic -depression.

Symptoms

Manic Episodes

- Talking rapidly
- Racing thoughts
- Increased energy, activity or agitation
- Trouble sleeping
- Feelings of power or invincibility
- Reckless, impulsive, or risky behavior
- Poor decision making
- Psychotic symptoms such as hallucinations and delusions

Depressive Episodes

- · Feeling sad and 'down'
- Sleeping too much or too little
- Difficulty with concentration or memory
- Feeling worried or unfulfilled
- A loss of interest or enjoyment in life
- Thoughts about death or suicide

Bipolar Disorder usually appears when a person is in their late teens or early adult years. To be diagnosed with Bipolar, a person must have had at least one manic episode. There are four categories of Bipolar each differing in how exactly the affected person experiences manic and depressive episodes. There is no known cause of Bipolar Disorder and it cannot currently be cured. Experts believe a variety of factors play a role in the development of the illness including genetics, brain structure, and stress.

As a chronic mental illness, Bipolar Disorder requires ongoing treatment. Beginning treatment as early as possible is important as the symptoms of Bipolar can worsen over time if unaddressed. 

This is the next of a series of columns on how the law can impact your life. The articles will focus on various aspects of the law relating to personal injuries, those that happen both on-the-job and otherwise, including mishaps which occur in driving vehicles, using products, and receiving medical care. The column will also respond to legal questions relating to personal injury that are sent to us.

Readers are encouraged to call or write with questions concerning personal injury law. Decades ago we wrote, and have since updated, a chapter in a book to educate Illinois attorneys on how to represent individuals involved in vehicle accidents. While our chapter "Intersectional Collisions" is written to educate attorneys through the Illinois Institute for Continuing Legal Education (IICLE), the overall subject matter should also be of interest to the general public.

This is the fourth in a series of articles in which we will be addressing some of the general topics in both our chapter and the book, Proving Fault in Auto Accident Cases.

Three months ago, we discussed concerns that arise when vehicles approach an uncontrolled intersection; that is an intersection that does not have stop signs or stop lights for any direction of traffic. Two months ago, we discussed controlled intersections; that is, an intersection that has a light or traffic signs to control the flow of traffic. Last month, we discussed emergency vehicles and defendants other than motorists who may be responsible for traffic injuries.

This month, we will discuss pedestrians in and outside of crosswalks, as well as bicyclists and bike lanes.

Pedestrians

The Illinois motor vehicle code provides: Unless otherwise directed by a pedestrian-control signal ... pedestrians facing any green signal, except when the sole green signal is a turn arrow, may proceed across the roadway within any marked or unmarked crosswalk.

Additionally, the code provides that pedestrians at controlled intersections facing a "Walk" signal or walking person symbol may proceed across the roadway and must be given the right of way by vehicles on the road. The code further states that when a pedestrian faces a "Don't Walk" or upraised palm signal, whether steady or flashing, the pedestrian may not start to cross the roadway in the direction of the signal. However, in such a situation, any pedestrian who has partly completed crossing on the walk signal shall proceed to a sidewalk or safety island

when the prohibitory signal is illuminated.

When pedestrians are within a mid-block crosswalk or a crosswalk at an intersection not controlled by traffic-control devices, a police officer or traffic control aide, the Illinois motor vehicle code provides that the operator of an approaching vehicle must stop and yield the right of way to the pedestrian. However, pedestrians crossing outside of a crosswalk or within an unmarked crosswalk must yield the right of way to vehicles on the road.

While pedestrians have the right of way in many instances, Illinois courts have held that the right of way does not relieve pedestrians of the duty to exercise due care and caution when entering an intersection. Illinois courts have further explained that pedestrians crossing the street must use their senses to observe impending danger.

In light of this requirement and the frequent use of handheld devices, laws have begun to adapt the meaning of due care to address rising concerns. Some cities, like Honolulu, Hawaii and Montclair, California, have enacted distracted walking laws, which allow police to ticket pedestrians for looking at their cell phones or other electronic devices while crossing the street. Such ordinances may become more popular in the future. In fact, in November 2017 one such ordinance was unsuccessfully proposed to the Chicago City Council.

Bicyclists As cities become more crowded, bicycles and infrastructure supporting their use, most notably bicycle lanes, have become more and more popular. In response, the State of Illinois and the City of Chicago have enacted a number of laws to regulate

the safe use of bicycles on increasingly

crowded streets.

The codes set out a number of duties for bicyclists on the roadway. First, the Illinois motor vehicle code prohibits bicyclists from riding upon the sidewalk, subject to certain municipal exceptions, such as bike routes. The City of Chicago requires, where bicyclists may ride on the sidewalk, that they give an audible warning upon approaching and before overtaking pedestrians. The Illinois motor vehicle code also provides that bicyclists riding on the roadway have all of the rights and are subject to all of the same duties as drivers of vehicles on the roadway.

The City of Chicago requires bicyclists to follow additional duties. Most notably, the City of Chicago requires bicyclists emerging from a driveway, alley, or building, to yield the right of way to pedestrians on the sidewalk, and to yield the right of way to vehicles approaching on the roadway. Chicago further requires that bicyclists ride as close to the right curb as practicable and safe. There are exceptions to this rule for right and left turns, passing, and avoiding collisions.

The City of Chicago additionally sets out requirements for operators of vehicles who encounter bicyclists on the road. The code first provides:

The operator of a motor vehicle overtaking a bicycle or individual proceeding in the same direction on a highway shall leave a safe distance, but not less than 3 feet, when passing the bicycle or individual and shall maintain that distance until safely past the overtaken bicycle or individual.

Additionally, the City of Chicago prohibits drivers of vehicles from impeding bicycle lanes by parking in or driving through such lanes except to enter or exit a legally valid parking space or stand.

are also certain cautions drivers should take when they are parked to avoid injuring bicyclists. A phenomenon called "dooring," presents a real danger to bicyclists. "Dooring" happens when a driver in a parked vehicle opens the door to exit the vehicle, obstructing the path of an oncoming bicyclist and commonly leading to serious injury.

Fortunately, there is a simple habit which can prevent such accidents; it is called the Dutch Reach. The Dutch Reach is simply the practice of using your inside hand (right for the driver, and left for the passenger) to open the car door. This practice forces the occupant of the vehicle to look behind them as they open the door, creating the ability to see oncoming bicyclists and therefore avoid potential collisions. Notably, the Dutch Reach strategy was recently added to the Illinois Rules of the Road manual and bicycle safety questions were added to the driver's license test.

In sum, in many situations drivers must give pedestrians the right of way and should proceed with caution. However, pedestrians still maintain a duty to look out for their own safety and well-being. Similarly, both bicyclists and drivers must maintain a safe distance and follow the rules of the road. Over the years, we have represented many pedestrians and bicyclists clients. Unfortunately, a number of them had incurred very serious injuries. Many accidents could be

avoided if drivers, pedestrians and bicyclists consistently kept their eyes and ears engaged and tried to anticipate the actions of others.



Chief O'Neill's is Music to Customer's Ears

Now, 20 years into business, most Chicago residents have heard of or have dined and been entertained at the famed Chief O'Neill's Pub & Restaurant.

Touted as one of the best restaurant/pubs in the city, Chief's has received glowing reviews from both food professionals and customers alike. Owners Brendan and Siobhan McKinney have withstood the test of time, almost defiantly, by constantly changing to keep up with what's modern and in high demand in the food and spirit industry.

Siobhan, an Irish native, met Brendan while the two were at Milwaukee Irish Fest in 1989. Siobhan played the flute and Brendan the pipes, and they were introduced by a mutual musician friend. They were married in Kerry, Ireland, in December of 1993, and opened an insurance agency together, continuing to play music as a hobby. They did this for about ten years, until they decided that they wanted to add a little more fun to their life. And what's more fun than a bar?

"We never intended to get out of the insurance business, because we loved it, and we were successful. So we were just opening Avondale neighborhood, that the (the bar) as a hobby, on the week-

bar called Oinker's, which they purchased in mid 1999. The first event was a baby shower organized by Siobhan for musician Pauline Conneely, when the place was still called Oinkers. "Little did everyone know that we had already purchased the building."



Siobhan says they never imagined, in their wildest dreams, that the restaurant would grow to be so successful. "We never intended to have a kitchen or anything. The original kitchen) was very small. At first we didn't have a menu, and when people started coming in, they demanded some type of food, because there was nothing around here. A few months later, we put a menu together and then we put a cooler on the roof, and we expanded the kitchen a little bit. Basically it took on a life of its own, and this place was just going in that direction and there was no stopping it! Then people wanted to have parties (here) and get married, and we're like 'what's

going on? This is crazy!'" Two years in, running two businesses became too much, and they decided to give up the insurance business and be full time restaurateurs.

By now, they've had whole families who have chronicled their lives with Chief O'Neill's, from first dates to engagements, to engagement parties to rehearsal

dinners, weddings, receptions, baby showers, baptisms, first communions, confirmations, etc, because for a lot of families, the restaurant became 'their 'place.' Chief's events calendar gets packed through the summer for the usual warm-weather parties, although this winter they did a few cold-weather ones as well. "Siobhan does such a great job with the Christmas decor, and, you know, it's cold outside, but it's warm inside. There's a lot of atmosphere to enjoy," Brendan says.


The first event they ever did in the space was back when it was technically still Oinker's, although Siobhan and Brendan had already started the process of buying the building. Siobhan threw a surprise baby shower for musician Pauline Conneely. "Nobody knew that we'd put a deposit down (to buy the place)... That was our first ever event here. People thought it was strange we were having the party here. We hadn't changed the name yet!"

The evolution of their menu and kitchen is part of what keeps Chief

O'Neills fresh and stable through the years. When they first decided to add a menu, just a few months after opening, they went to their friend Jim August, who owns The Irish Shop in Oak Park. "He's an outstanding chef as well, and we called him and he put together a menu... We got off to a good start, but it was too big a menu for the size of our original kitchen. So

The largest struggle, the tipping point at which they knew it was time to make some changes, came as the result of an August 2000 Chicago Tribune food critic review by Phil Vettel, in which their menu received the coveted Four Forks rating. Siobhan and Brendan humorously refer to the resulting massive up-tick in their nightly customer base as the "blood bath".

After the review came out, they had three hundred guests show up, on a single Wednesday night. Although their menu was solid



and their kitchen staff were capable, they were wholly unprepared for that many customers in one go.

"The forks are a rating system, and he hadn't given out four forks in forever... The article came out and we didn't even see it... people kept congratulating us, and we didn't know what for... (Then at one point) I went into the kitchen and all the cooks were standing around looking at each other, because orders weren't coming in. I walked to the printer in the back, and found about an eighteen foot long paper receipt, because the kitchen printer had run out of

paper, and we were still so new at this, I didn't know that it would re-route," Brendan recalls.

Siobhan adds, "So people were waiting for their food. No food is coming out as the kitchen hadn't gotten any tickets. Oh, it was

Luckily, very few people were truly upset. Siobhan and Brendan offered free drinks and the food eventually showed up and most of the customers were very understanding of the situation. It was after that night, however, that they made the executive decision to expand their kitchen.

And while a few of the staple Irish foods and meals have remained, as Brendan puts it, in their "don't tread on me" section over the years, they have changed a lot of their menu items to keep up with the farm-to-table craze. Adding dishes like the beluga

lentil salad, and fresh seafood like salmon and cod, they're trying to keep up with what people are looking for in a meal.

"You just listen to what your guests are saying," says Siobhan.

Another draw of Chief O'Neill's is the music experience: musicians

play and people come to listen. like 'Honey, I have it, I have it!... It's a real destination for a lot of big names, both local and international.

Siobhan explains that a lot of new bands have been coming out of Ireland recently, and the pub loves having the new talent. "Usually, they're on a budget, so we don't charge them any money for the room, we don't take any of their ticket sales..." she begins.

Brendan finishes her sentence, "Or CD sales. We just give them the room. You know who's been really, really good to us, too, is John Haliburton." He's speaking of the Chicago sound engineer. "He's so good, and he's got such a great ear for the music, and it's such a nice, intimate setting. It may not be a big, big venue for them, but it's like one of those coffee houses with booze, that the Irish feel very comfortable to do an intimate performance in."

Continuing with their initial plan for the place, music has become a huge part of the restaurant.

In the spirit of all things music, Brendan explains the pub's name. "When we were in the conceptual stages, we were just thinking we didn't want to call it McKinney's or, you know... So one night, I was Chief O'Neill's!" Virtually unknown today out-

side of the Irish community, Francis O'Neill was an Irish immigrant, author, musician, and scholar who became Chicago's Police Superintendent from 1901-05. He served as a heroic police officer and reforming chief of police, and made an enduring contribution to his native Ireland and Irish culture through the gathering and publication of the largest collection of Irish music ever assembled. For this he is revered in Ireland.

Over the years, their business has been affected both positively

Siobhan and Brendan are also parents to three children. Son Kieran is 21, Son Anluan is 20, and daughter Etain is 19. All three are currently in college and being encouraged to pursue their own interests and careers, although the hope for the McKinneys is that one of them will eventually want to take over the business.

Information on Chief O'Neills, including their delicious menu and drinks lists, upcoming entertainment and events, and the history of Francis O'Neill, can be



and not-so-positively by the economic, social, and social media changes. The recession in 2008 brought fewer daily customers, but created a boom in the events side of the business.

Uber and Lyft have changed their business for the better now that people can call a ride share that will arrive within just a few minutes, rather than waiting for the cabs that frequent the heart of the city and take much longer to get out to their location.

There's been a large drop-off in Irish people coming to America in the the last few years, and especially to Chicago, so having the J-1 students work there during the summer has been a nice treat for all. "The guests love the Irish students, and (the students) love it here, they're enthusiastic."

The next big event coming up at Chief O'Neill's will be the first ever Irish Spirits Festival, on March 1st. "There's a big craft spirits craze going on in Ireland right now," says Brendan. "They're making gin and vodka and whiskey and everything."

Have You **Learned These Lessons?**

A dear friend of mine, Dr. Thomas E. Murray, served as the Executive Director of the highly regarded Career Transitions Center of Chicago, for five years. In his many years of experience, he developed some beliefs about the job search process. I believe that his eight lessons, stated below, are as pertinent today as they were when he originally developed

1. Everybody can get a job. Even if you are "old", disabled, have a chronic health problem, etc. you can still find employment. Having a positive attitude is imperative in your job search. You must present yourself as a vibrant and energetic person who is capable of doing something of value for a potential employer. It is vital that you are persuasive that your competence is appropriate to the level of the position you are seeking. Develop your presentation so that It highlights your abilities to the interviewer. No one said it would be easy.

You need to convince the interviewer that you are seriously interested in the position by following up with him/her: write, call and send appropriate correspondence. If the company interviews six quality candidates, how can they determine who best fits the requirements of the job? Sincere and enthusiastic follow-up by the interviewee will be viewed as a positive factor in the decision -making process. Interviewers want to hire people who really want the job, not just a person who has the skills to do the job.

2. Project a sense of direction. The job seeker should manifest definite goals; failure to do so could easily be a deal breaker. There is no upside to suggesting that you are a confused person who lacks any direction. Help the interviewer see that you have clear goals that could be helpful

to the organization.

Let the interviewer know that you have values, beliefs and interests. You are an exciting, vibrant human being. If you speak effectively with enthusiasm, you might convince the interviewer that you have some intellectual firepower and are willing to learn.

3. Give the impression of competence. Recognize the need to inspire confidence in the interviewer as to your ability to perform the job's tasks. You don't need to convince them that you could do ANY job, just that you have the requisite experience to do THIS particular job. You must be prepared to discuss and explain your significant accomplishments, whether in your youth, from a stint in the military or prior em-

4. Everyone can look good. Executive presentation and proper grooming are essential. Make sure that your clothes fit well and are appropriate for the level of the job. Lay out your apparel the night before the interview. It is essential that you present yourself with proper bearing and carriage. Never slouch. Keep your hands out of your pockets. Keep your head up. Look at the interviewer not the ceiling. Speak clearly, do not mumble. If you have practiced your presentation you are less likely to stumble your way through the interview.

Show that you have energy; interviews with lethargic candidates tend to be cut short. People who are lively in how they present themselves are simply far more likely to get hired. An essential element of your appearance is your smile. Don't forget it. Many people are uncomfortable with others who don't smile. Show the interviewer that you have a sense of humor or a softer side.

5.The person who is hired is not necessarily the most qualified person, but more likely has presented herself the most effectively.

We commonly expect the most qualified person to "win" the job; however that's not how the world works. So it is imperative that you demonstrate to the interviewer your best side. Treat everyone in the organization with respect. Tact, courtesy and respect go a long way towards making a good impression. Develop answers to the questions that will obviously be asked. Rehearse the questions and answers before the interview. Be prepared to tell the interviewee why you should be selected. The outstanding quality of any written materials, including your resume and follow up correspondence complete the "package" you are

6. Finding a job is a full time job. You need to network with people who will introduce you to others. Many people think that virtually everybody finds a new job through the internet, but that is not so. The majority of job seekers still find jobs through personal contacts. The name of the game is personal contacts; everything else is simply preparation.

7. Action is absolutely essential to success in the process. Dr. Murray says that many job seekers confuse "getting ready" activities with real achievement. They spend "months" polishing their resume rather than sharing it with others who could connect with them with additional contacts. They live in a world of "gonna", but it never seems to get completed. Consider the practice of celebrating small milestones as a way of keeping the momentum

8. The only way we know if we have the ideal job is by trial and error. You can facilitate the process by doing your homework on prospective employers before you start interviewing. What type and size organizations interest you? You might want to prepare a job description for your ideal job. What's the culture of the companies that you are going to interview? Ask the interviewers what do they like about the company. Do they feel valued and

appreciated? We need to accept responsibil-

ity for our lives. The world does

"It feels like I'm going home when I go back to Ireland. When you walk around you get that feeling, my ancestors walked here, my ancestors saw this view."

I don't know who wrote this but it's absolutely true - for visitors but for those of us who grew up in Ireland. I posted the quote on a Facebook photo recently and was surprised at how many people responded with their personal observations as to how they felt when they visited Ireland. I have people who have visited Ireland with me, and no matter if it's their first or fourth time they feel the emotions of coming home, of returning to a place that makes them feel good and welcome.

It's hard to put a finger on what it is that makes us feel this way, certainly not just the scenery as there are many other beautiful sights to see all over the world, and undoubtedly it's not the weather. Even though I have said many times it's the people, I now must say that it must be more than that. I would agree with many friends who have traveled with me that it's a spiritual thing, but that is difficult to define.

People with no connection to Ireland whatsoever feel this pull and return when they can. Many ask about retiring to Ireland and indeed some do, but it's even hard for them to put into words exactly what the attraction is. Whether it is a romantic notion of visiting the land of one's forefathers or a wish to visit our island packed with breathtaking scenery and full of friendly people, Ireland has created a huge reputation for hospitality that we absolutely love to live up to.

Balmoral Restaurant Campton Hills

Five years ago Scotsman Colin Smith visited Balmoral Castle, The Queen's residence in Aberdeenshire, Scotland. Her Royal Highness was in residence and the dining hall had been set for a dinner party later that evening, it's tables covered with fine linen and set with Royal Albert China, golden cutlery and cut crystal glasses. Colin, a restauranteur himself, loved what he saw and decided,"everyone should dine like this and if it's good enough for H.R.H., then it's good enough for us all".

Combining his passion for Scottish cuisine, Celtic hospitality and tradition, Colin has faithfully re-created Balmoral in Campton Hills, Illinois. with great attention to detail, right down to the place settings and ambience.

Colin Smith is the consummate host and has come up in the business from dish-washer, to chef, to restauranteur. He has owned and operated many restaurants mainly in in the U.K. and his credo "good food can't be served in 25 minutes" makes Balmoral a more relaxing experience evoking the hospitality of a more genteel era, (more Downton Abbey than Downtown,) and he has surely hit the spot.

The food is fabulous and features much of the fare one would expect from a bountiful larder well supplied by the games-keeper at Balmoral Castle itself. There are salads and sandwiches, salmon and venison, steaks and chicken, rabbit, pheasant, duck and trout.

There's scotch egg, shepherd's pie, fish'n chips and bangers and mash, all of them given the Balmoral treatment..... "not fancy food but wholesome food " as Colin says.

"Hat's off to the granny's who took out the good silver and crockery for lunch on Sunday", a reference to the traditional Sunday lunch in Scottish, English and Irish homes which was the highlight of the week. Lunch was usually a joint of beef, lamb or pork, sometimes ham or chicken and it was served with the traditional accompaniments of roast potatoes

, seasonal vegetables homemade chutneys and other regional dressings. Rustic and hearty and very much kept alive at Balmoral's Traditional Sunday Roasts.

Most restaurants are quiet places in the mid afternoon, not so at Balmoral as afternoon tea has become a big hit from 2 'till 5. 

Technology is Not Transforming Liquor World

There is a common saying that "technology transformed the world!" And we see it before our own very eyes. When I first entered the liquor world, I heard the same refrain, "technology will transform the liquor world and will change how alcohol is sold and regulated."

However, the liquor world has been shaken to the core, not by technology but by a brick and mortar store.

WHO IS THIS TRANSFORMER?

Total Wine and More (Total Wine) is a chain liquor store with 176 stores in 20 states, none in Illinois. Its business model relies on a vast selection of wines at lower prices than their competitors. This practice scares small retailers and has caused some to go out of business.

But what really sets Total Wine apart from anyone else in the liquor industry, is its role as disruptor to the liquor legal landscape across the country.

Total Wine's aggressive stances have led to the downfall of the states' iron grip on their liquor regulatory scheme.

I will outline where Total Wine has challenged states and won, and how their efforts to challenge the states could drastically change the legal landscape.

PRICING ISSUES

Total Wine took on Massachusetts over pricing issues and beat the state in its own court system.

Massachusetts issued suspensions to two Total Wine stores, because they sold product below invoice cost which is prohibited by

Total Wine sued Massachusetts claiming that the price to consumers was not below cost, because the price Total Wine paid for the product would be reduced by quantity discounts the company would receive from wholesalers. Small retailers could not receive these same quantity discounts to

lower their prices.

The Court sided with Total Wine and stated that there was "only a salutary effort by a retailer to pass along savings derived from volume purchasing at the wholesale level to its customers. This is something

the law should promote rather than punish."

Massachusetts utilized its power to sanction Total Wine into conformity with the state's view of how the market should run. In the end, Total Wine won and they and not the state ended up dictating how the market should run. The minimum

pricing law, which is utilized to keep a large preme Court Docket Number 18-96. retailer from dominating because of its size, was weakened by Total Wine.

Before going onto the next issue, I need to mention a roadblock in Total Wine's legal challenges. It lost a case in Federal Court which challenged Connecticut's minimum pricing laws. However, the case is on appeal to the 2nd Circuit of Appeals.

STORE LIMITS

Total Wine set its sights on South Carolina and wanted to expand. Problematically, the state limited a retailer to three licensed locations, Total Wine already had three locations and wanted more. So, it sued South Carolina to overturn this law as unconstitutional. It lost in the district court, but eventually prevailed at the South Carolina Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court ruled that the law was protectionist and stated that "the licensing limits do not promote the health, safety, or morals of the state, but merely provide economic protectionism for existing retail liquor store owners."

South Carolina which enacted this law to protect small retailers from facing competition from big box or chain retailers was

defeated in its agenda.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS

Total Wine wanted to open locations in Tennessee, but couldn't because of a durational residency requirement, which requires a license holder to be a resident for 2 years before holding the license and

10 years after.

Total Wine forced the issue and sued and won in the 6th Circuit which ruled the durational residency requirement unconstitutional. The case is currently on appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. Tennessee Wine and Spirits Retailers Association v. Blair, U.S. Su-

If the Supreme Court affirms the appeal, Total Wine will decimate another state law.

THE HOLY GRAIL

Total Wine may cause the crumbling of the state regulatory edifice. If it wins at the U.S. Supreme Court, the Court may rule that an out-of-state retailer can ship into

a state, which could create a national retail market. In this scenario players like Total Wine and Amazon could dominate the market at the expense of the small retailers.

If this is the case, Total Wine will have done more to change the alcohol market than any other player or any other technological development.

WHAT CAN THE STATES DO TO **COMBAT THEM?**

With Total Wine's track record of challenging the states and winning, the states may be helpless in the

end. The challenged state laws seem setup to protect local businesses. Problematically for the states, the Courts frown upon laws protecting local economic interest.

The states know that every law with protectionist leanings is prime for a Total Wine challenge.

TOTAL WINES HAS THEM IN A HORNET'S NEST

If you talk to state regulators, they will tell you that Total Wine is a major concern.

Total Wine will go after state laws aggressively and especially those they deem weak.

Total Wine could transform the liquor world and shape it for years to come. It could be Total Wine that shapes the regulatory liquor scheme and not the states themselves.

I Know My Own Heart

This would be a familiar tale if the protagonist was male. We are more than acquainted with the playboy sowing his wild oats but what about an early 19th Century woman? Considering the mores of the times, the idea of a woman's insatiable desire for sexual pleasure seems foreign, if not dangerous. Irish writer, Emma Donoghue, inspired by the diaries of a gentlewoman, Anne Lister, puts flesh and blood to the words of a woman before her time; a woman who will not be straitjacketed by society's prudery. Lister is revealed by Donoghue as a woman willing to risk reputation and the scorn of her contemporaries in order to sate her heart's desires.

The story, while somewhat salacious, is a refreshing depiction of women of the period. While we conceive the ladies of a certain class to be obsessed with decorum and etiquette, Donoghue breaks the mould and rips the stereotype to shreds in this honest portrayal of need for sexual connection. Lister's character, played by Vashishta Vafadari, is no ingenue. She shows great skill in navigating the expectations of her benefactors while also carving out her own independence. Mentor and friend, Tib, played by Eleanor Katz, enables and contributes to Lister's developing sexual







prowess, until she finds herself surpassed drama, humor, strong character developby her pupil.

Donoghue's drama gives life to a story that needs to be told. In an age, when women were encouraged to share their time with other women, whether it be purdah or some other custom devised to protect the female sex from men, they are free to explore their own sexuality. Hidden from scrutiny of men, women are seen to challenge each other to know their heart's desire.

I loved this play with its exciting social styles of speech and clothing to develop

ment and great acting.

Fuente Ovejuna discusses women's rights, the inalienable rights of citizens, and government accountability. And though it was published in 1619, it could be written tomorrow! Fuente Ovejuna was written by Lope de Vega, who wrote many plays during the Golden Age of Spanish Literature. That was during the 1500's and 1600's, when Spain's empire spanned the world. Spain was a global superpower.

De Vega often wrote about the preten-By: Lope de Vega *Review by Frank West* sions of the petty nobility. He used their character types. He took this to radically new heights by including psychological insight in his characters. This is skillfully developed by the 16 member cast.

We laugh at the things and people de Vega wrote about, but I think he too had fun writing this play.

Fuente Ovejuna is a "harrowing and suspenseful but exhilarating and inspirational drama based on a historical incident that occurred in the village of Fuente Ovejuna in Castile in 1476."

Laurencia, a young woman there "inspires and leads a rebellion against their military governor's sexual exploitation of the local women. She refuses to be a victim when she is attacked..." She leads a rebellion of the town to end "the repression that has gone on too long."

Film, No Stone Unturned to be Shown at Irish American Heritage Center February 23

Two journalists facing charges in the North of Ireland over their involvement in telling the tale of what happened after a massacre during the 1994 World Cup are coming to Chicago for a screening of the film about the murders and the aftermath.

Trevor Birney, the producer of No Stone Unturned, and Barry McCaffrey, the journalist who played a key role in breaking the story, are accused under the British Official Secrets Act of handling stolen documents.

They were arrested last August during early morning raids involving approximately 100 police officers in an operation managed by Durham Police of the North of England. Birney was arrested in front of his wife, Sheila, and three daughters, while documents and computers were seized from both men. Some of the material seized contains sensitive information about other investigations entirely unrelated to No Stone Unturned. They were questioned for multiple hours following the arrests, and again in November.

The pair face further questioning Mar. 1. Both will be in attendance for a screening of No Stone Unturned at the Irish American Heritage Center on Saturday, Feb. 23. The long time attorney for the families of

the victims, Niall Murphy, will also be in Chicago for the screening. but also tells the wider story of collusion between the security forces and paramili-

Six people were killed and five injured when a gunman and an accomplice, later identified as members of the loyalist UVF, entered the Heights Bar in Loughinisland, a small village in Co. Down. The massacre happened during the Ireland-Italy World Cup game, which was being played in New York.


The gunman shouted "Fenian bastards," then fired approximately sixty rounds from an automatic weapon at the bar customers and staff. Most of the rounds hit the victims in the back.

The families have been fighting for years to learn the truth about the killings and why no-one was ever charged.

No Stone Unturned, directed by Academy Award winner, Alex Gibney, who is also wanted for questioning, digs deep into the aftermath of the murders, investigating how and why the killer and his accomplices were able to escape justice and punishment.

The film names those police believe carried out the attack, and reveals evidence that they were protected by police through incompetence and by deliberate decision,

but also tells the wider story of collusion between the security forces and paramilitaries during the decades-long conflict in the North of Ireland.



No-one has ever been charged with the murders. The only people facing any charges in connection with the massacre are Birney and McCaffrey, who received documents from an unknown source that allowed the team to unearth much of the troubling tale.

Birney said, "Barry and I are humbled by the support we've received from around the world but particularly from America.

"Our arrests are still a shock for us, our families and colleagues. Twenty years after the Good Friday Agreement, it was a draconian police operation designed to send a chill factor to any journalist investigating Northern Ireland's past.

"Barry and I look forward to taking our film to Chicago and to meeting old and new friends. We are very thankful to Meg Buchanan and everyone at the Irish American Heritage Center for making this screening happen."



Terry From Derry by Terry Boyle

Lost Boy

2018 has been a strange year. For instance, my once a year trip to Derry multiplied by three. The first was in May, when I flew to Ireland and onto Spain with my mother, sister and brother-in-law. My mother's health had deteriorated a lot since I last saw her. For an eighty-three-year old woman, her spirit was indomitable but

it was now at odds with her body. Stooped over, forced to use a walker, her bones creaked with a sound that reminded me of a wooden mast pummeled by the wind on a rough sea. The wheelchair was becoming less of an option and more of a necessity.

This woman, the master of malapropisms, was still as sharp as ever. Her keen mind was still as sharp as a knife. She could reduce you to your true greatness with little or no effort. Despite butchering the language with all sorts of

added syllables and errant pronunciations, my mother made it perfectly clear what she meant. Her repertoire of sayings; turning Turk (Judas), feeding strawberries to an elephant (gluttonous), Throwing money around like a man with no arms (strange and somewhat insensitive analogy), live horse, and you'll eat oats (whatever) etc., continue in my head like a magical litany that evokes a host of memories.

The trip to Spain was followed up by a less exotic but more poignant trip to Donegal. Burtonport, a small fishing village in Ireland's least populated county was my late father's birthplace. For months, she had wanted to go there and visit with a friend but no one was free to take her. When I suggested that I drive her, there was a moment when we knew this trip would be our last together. When there is such a sense of finality, every part of the journey becomes more significant and more profound than it normally would do if things were different.

found than it normally would do if things were different. We talked, laughed, and shared the family gossip; stopping occasionally to look at the beauty of the wild gorse, natural lakes, and bogs. We savoured each moment believing in its importance. When, finally, we arrived at the 'Port', I assumed my mother knew where we were going; a big mistake. With no idea of where to start, and no phone to call anyone, I started knocking on doors. It was a Sunday morning and most people were out. However, there was one house with a door open. I walked up to the house and called out my 'hello'. Eventually, a very old man appeared. He looked in complete harmony with the rugged, unkempt, countryside around him. When I asked if he knew where my mother's friend lived, he pointed somewhere behind me and said 'Oh, they live down in the depths'.

For some reason, I knew better than to ask him to clarify what he meant. I knew that any further communication would only end in yet more obscurity.

We finally did manage to find her friend, and they had a great time catching up. As we drove back, my mother struggled to stay

awake. She wanted to treasure the experience, since I was leaving the next day. My mother, over the years of my traveling back and forth to Chicago, always completed the visit with tears accompanied with the haunting statement; 'I may never see you again.' And, each time I would leave my sister to cajole her back to buoyancy by taking her to favourite pastime, bingo. 2018 proved to be different. In October, she was admitted into hospital and

I was faced with that awful decision as to whether I go back or wait until it became absolutely necessary. No one can ever fully know when it the time is right, and I am not sure I could explain how I knew. I just knew. When I returned, she was in a lot of pain. For the last week of her life, we talked, when she was able, and when she was not able, I sat in vigil with my family. She died while I was at the airport awaiting my flight back to the U.S. I was not able to make her wake or funeral but we had said what we needed to

For the next hour and half, I wandered among the graves, working myself up to a great emotional climax, only have the moment robbed by another Boyle grave that was not hers. My mother's peace, I'm sure, was made happy watching me lost among the graves. There was no unruly farmer to tell me she was in the depths. No, she was in the heights,

laughing no doubt, but lost to me.

It Starts With A Song

Hello Everyone I was chatting to Margo recently

and she was saying this year is her 55th year in the music business. The year of her 50th was a sad year for her. It was the year Julia, her Mother passed away. So, I figured it would be nice to write about this amazing Lady. She is still doing shows and for the last while she's been performing on some of Mike Denver's and Trudi Lawlor's shows. Plus her own shows in Killarney etc. Although so many people know Margo and a lot of folks grew up with her music, there are a lot of things about her career that maybe, not

everyone knows. This young girl from Donegal, whose father passed away when she was a teenager, became the breadwinner for the O'Donnell family. Her dreams of becoming a nurse and to be with the man she loved in New York, USA. Who worked in the tunnels and came from Arranmore, Donegal. Margo realized her plans and dreams would all drift away and her life would change. Margaret Catherine O'Donnell became 'Margo and the Keynotes' and went on to become a household name worldwide, among the Irish and lovers of Irish music. A part of Margo's career you don't often hear about is in 1968 while touring with major American recording star Hank Locklin. They were performing one night in Birmingham, England, when someone from EMI Records noticed Margo and soon after she was interviewed and signed up with the label. She recorded four albums in the Abbey Road Studios, London. She said - "One day I went for lunch to a Bistro down the street with my producer, Bob Barrett. The Beatles were there and Bob introduced me to them". She said "it's a shame there were no mobile phones back then for a selfie, and I didn't have

a camera. But they were really nice

fellows who were down to earth musicians and there were no egos among them. They were massive at the time and it didn't seem to change them at all, they made me feel so welcome". At that time the Beatles were recording in one room and Margo recording in a room close by them. The backing vocalists on Margo's recordings were called the Laura Lee singers, comprising of two men and two women. She told me the producer was asking if she could put on an American twang on her country songs and she said no. They recorded both country and Irish songs. One album called 'From Margo With Love' had the song, 'Boys From The County Mayo' on it. Margo says - "when I sang the part - 'From historic Killala from Swinford to Balla' etc, the backing singers said - "It's the first time we've ever sung in Gaelic", and Margo said - "I started to laugh, explaining that they were the names of towns in County Mayo". Margo actually sold more records in Ireland at that time than the Beatles. Also, it's pretty well known that Margo along with Foster and Allen had the most Vinyl records and cassettes in Australian households. Unfortunately, Margo's weekly income was raised from just £100 (which was great money at the time in most jobs) to £200. She thought this was fantastic. Trouble is, the record company was making a fortune, and £200 was a total rip off. They would

tell her expenses were enormous,

so she and her band were content

to travel around playing shows

and dances. Margo was able to

pay the £5 for her rent where she

was based at the time in Galway

and keep £1 for her spends. The

rest would be sent through the

post office to her Mother in Kin-

casslagh. Margo went on to play

in Carnegie Hall, New York, The

She also packed out dance halls all over Ireland and UK to as many as 2,000 people at the larger halls. She held the record of 3,000 people at the Pontoon Dance Hall, Pontoon, Ballina, Co Mayo. There is so much to write about

the career of Margo, and you can read a lot of it in her book 'The Promise And The Dream'. Another part of her story is about her manager John McNally who decided to sell all her recordings, unknowns to Margo for £37,500. They were sold to Outlet Records run by a man called Billy McBurney. This was all done from the boot (trunk) of a car. Later, Margo decided to take action and went to court. So in December 2002, the judge ruled that all the recordings, masters etc, belong to Margo. But, the hundreds of thousands of recordings that were sold in stores were history. The judge was apologetic and said do you know this man McBurney and she said - "Only by the name". She had never actually met him and told the judge she wouldn't know him if she tripped over him. It's estimated that she was done out of approximately £17 million over the years. Margo has a new recording coming out any day. It's titled 'Margo Old And New' We wish you great success with it Margo and I want to wish you a very Happy Birthday on February 6th - Below are the sleeve

notes of the new album. The songs on this CD are all favorites of mine recorded over the years and I really would like to share them with you all. The tributes to Liz Anderson and Jean Sheppard are songs written by my friend Joe McShane and myself about ladies I admired in Country Music all my life and alas have both passed on. (R.I.P.) 



fans since this region of California was and is populated by scores of stage and screen respect celebrities.

Married four times, she bore a son by her second husband Alex Carson. His name, the combination of two surnames, Channing Carson. In time he changed to Chan Lowe, taking the surname of his mother's third husband Charles Lowe. He became a political cartoonist, a Pulitzer Prize runner-up as an editorial cartoonist for the Sun-Sentinel in Fort Lauderdale. In October 1996, Columbia College Chicago awarded him the coveted Political Cartoonist Award named for the Pulitzer Political Cartoonist John Frischetti, who worked for the Chicago Sun, Chicago Daily News and the New York Herald Tribune.

The night prior to the award ceremony held at a downtown hotel on Michigan, a gala dinner for the cartoonist honoree, family, Columbia College Trustees and other citywide notables, was hosted at the residence of Columbia's President Dr. John B. Duff and his journalist spouse. Carol Channing was invited but unable to attend.

Several years later she published an autobiography entitled: Just Lucky I Guess, and launched an ambitious book tour. I was fortunate to attend one of her literary presentations. Introducing myself afterwards, to her delight we chatted about her son and the Chicago award. But I was on another mission. At the time, The Chicago Bridget Award Committee planned to auction off celebrity handbags, so grabbing the moment, I asked if she'd donate a purse, explaining the Chicago event honored Irish women of distinction, the fundraiser proceeds targeted for Ireland's Concern Worldwide, an organization dispatching teams of Irish men and women bringing aid to famine outbreaks and other disasters anywhere in the world.

The famed actress was charmed. Recently married to her fourth and last husband,



Harry Kulijian, high school sweethearts reuniting after 71 years, he managed his wife's schedule and finances. He requested tax information and other appropriate data from the Bridget Award Committee. Once delivered at their home in Rancho Mirage, where Ms. Channing died on January 15, he produced a large brown envelope contain-



ing the bag which he valued at several thousand dollars. It was the historic bag Dolly carried on stage filled with fake diamonds, throwing them to the audience when she belted out the song: "Diamonds Are A Girl's Best Friend." Meanwhile, Chicago women's focus on celebrity bags or purses, were not new purses but rather one a celebrity had used and well loved. Hence, as committee member Marian Brady commented: "Carol Channing purse, was a historic donation guaranteed to spiral enormous public interest in our event. We were thrilled."

On the pick-up purse day as Channing readied to leave for New Zealand for a one woman show, I look the envelope, drove a distance and pulled over to examine the innards. The evening bag extracted with careful handling almost fell apart. Beads, half on, half off, clung to the worn fabric, the interior stained, ripped, unfit for anything but the rubbish heap. Hello Dolly was performed over 5,000 times and this evening purse illustrated enormous wear and tear. Inside the bag was a note written by Channing: "This bag held diamonds for every performance of Hello Dolly." The Bridget team dispelled my belief it was unfit for auctioning and they exuded praise for "the note added personality and cachet to the item."

Oprah Winfrey caught wind of the Dolly purse and talked about it in her after show taping. That also hyped the fundraising luncheon where Channing's purse was well exhibited. Research, at press time failed to determine the amount of money it garnered, but Marian Brady emphases "the hype it created rendered our first Bridget Award Auction a smashing success."





Borders and resistance are driving narratives in the current cinselected for the 20th Chicago Irish Film Festival, February 28 – March 3, 2019, are extraordinary examples.

Opening the festival is the legendary director/producer, **Jim** Sheridan, presenting his film Shelter Me featuring music from Glen Hansard and Hozier. The F Bomb

We journalists make our living sometimes by the skin of our teeth, off location, meeting deadlines in foreign time zones, forever keeping an eye on current time but more importantly on the time zone at the home base News Room. We produce opinion pieces for the Op-Ed page, feature stories for the Lifestyle Section, by-lined columns for the editorial page commenting

on the latest political uproar, or emerging societal trends.

We are forever on deadlines.

It's all about words, punctuation, research, interviews,

fact checking, accuracy and readability. In this gifted space, I take liberty to write a column in defense of words, particularly those that raise eyebrows, judge the user, contaminate the air and rarely if ever appear in mainstream newspapers. So, let's indulge in the F bomb with aplomb and respectability.

It's a word entrenched in Irish culture, has multiple meanings that include affection, sarcastic, sexual, distain, ridicule, laughter and provides dramatic emphasis orally and on the page. Back in the day when the Celtic Tiger was raining Euros on the Republic of Ireland I sat in a Dublin restaurant enjoying a pot of tea, reading the Irish Times. I overhead a conversation at the bar among two local middle aged men. Like me they were scanning news in the Times. A third friend joined them. He was greeted with, "have you read the F-in Irish Times?". He hadn't, and inquired "what the F are they going on about?" He sat down, ordered a half pint of Guinness and listened to the appeal made by the Times for the Irish population to clean up their language due to the booming economy and the country's prosperity. He took a long sip of his drink, the first of the day, and muttered "no f in" way!"

Fast forward, as the new year dawned In Washington, forty-plus congressional women were sworn into office, a first in the history of the United States. Celebrating in a DC pub following the ceremony, a Michigan congresswoman Rashida Tlaib was cheered by her colleagues when she used the F word criticizing President Donald Trump. Her comments, greeted by a standing ovation, drew the ire of many throughout the land.

The media freaked, Republicans expressed outrage, clergymen had their say. Those of us reared in Ireland



rolled our eyes, accustomed to the vocabulary of our native land, a word that never required mention in the confessional. Michelle Goldberg, a columnist for the New York Times reported Congressman Tlaib did nothing wrong. After all, she placed "mother" before Tlaib uttered the F word. It's a multipurpose expression providing pleasure and displeasure all at the same time. It's even handy used proficiently for emphasis between syllables as in the declaration "it's a great after F-in noon." Or as a female cousin responded when I inquired about an attractive man in her family pub, "Be careful, he'd F... a cracked plate!" Now, that's what I call pure poetry!

During a recent summer in Dublin, at the posh Shell-bourne Hotel, I enjoyed a late breakfast the solo diner in the high end Saddle Room. An American couple sauntered in and ordered a traditional Irish breakfast. I heard the man order a glass of milk for the lady. Some time passed, and the man, clearly irate, signaled the Maitre'd who slid gracefully across the carpeted hallowed hall. Clad in an impeccable tuxedo, a white starched Irish linen tea towel folded over his arm, a suitable photo op for the cover of Gentleman's Quarterly. He learned the milk was not served. He apologized, stepped back a few steps, stood erect, the very essence of sophistication and shouted across the dining room: "Seamus, are you bringing the F- in milk or what?" The crystal chandler shivered!

The question arises, is this language profane? The four letter word features a bunch of inclusions and descriptions in the American Heritage Dictionary, flanked by fuchsia and fucold. Ironically fuchsia, a tropical shrub grows wild in the ditches of Ireland, exhibiting in summer a glorious droopy assortment of purple and red blossoms. Fucold, on the other hand, is named for rock week and gulfweed. But, I digress. The scope of usage of the four letter word, considered obscene In the US, is a useful all purpose tool of language in Ireland. Its rendition in the dictionary demonstrates its vastness

in usage. Sexual intercourse is listed, but it can also mean to muck and fool around, to banish an individual as in F... off, to be disordered, as in "you're F ed, ditto for mismanaged or confused. When it slips easily off the lips of an Irishman or woman, there is no disrespect, although in fairness is can be cruel.

One hilarious story my family revisits to gales of laughter, involves a visit to Boston, from our Irish family. A celebratory dinner scheduled at our home was meant to impress and radiate our hospitality. Philip the six year old Irish cousin sat at the table, addressed his father in a loud voice: "Da, will you pass down the f....Ing bucket of spuds"? Let the word slip off the lips of a newly elected Michigan Congresswoman, and all hell breaks loose. The labels hurdled included vulgarity, profanity, obscenity, ignorance, regrettable, contemptuous, ugly, demeaning and on and on, the litany of offenses expanding on the behavior of women.

And yet, as we muddle through words that offend, our oblivion to real profanity becomes more acceptable as the US sails into the New Year. Profanity exists at the border, the Oval Office, the families of government workers whose larders are bare and no paycheck in sight. It exists also as young children cope in warehouses separated from parents whose hearts break from fear and apprehension. Profanity is having no hope of a future. Profanity is a state of being, not a word.

All words have meaning, and sometimes only the F word suffices!

Hit By An Uninsured Driver In a Car Accident – What Can age of another's property

According to a 2015 survey, by the Insurance Information Institute, approximately 13 percent of all U.S. drivers are uninsured. In Illinois, that percentage is slightly higher, at 13.7. Illinois has the 18th highest number of uninsured motorists in the nation. If you've been hit by an uninsured driver in a car accident, it's important to know what to do.

Insurance Requirements

Illinois insurance requirements are some of the strictest in the nation. In addition to having to meet specific coverage requirements, the state's Mandatory Insurance Law, (625 ILCS 5/7-601) requires the Office of the Secretary of State to select license plate registrations at random and run a verification process. The state recognizes this as the most effective way to identify uninsured vehicles. Vehicle owners also have the right to run a verification process of their own to ensure that they are in compliance of the law.

A car driver will be in compliance with the law if they have the following insurance coverage:

- \$25,000 coverage for the injury or death of one person in
- \$50,000 coverage for the injury or death of more than one person in an accident

• \$20,000 coverage for the dam-

Drivers are required to carry their insurance cards in their vehicles at all times and show it to the police upon request. Unfortunately, despite some of the strictest requirements in the country, some drivers ignore the law and continue to drive around uninsured putting others at grave

Carry Underinsured Motorist Coverage

Per Illinois law, generally having a motorist policy will cover injuries to you if you are hit by an uninsured driver but it may not cover injuries to you if you are hit by someone who only has minimum insurance coverage.

While insurers are required to provide insured individuals with underinsured motorist coverage, drivers do not have to have to purchase this additional coverage and it is entirely a personal choice.

Underinsured motorist coverage will come into play, when a person has an insufficient amount of coverage to cover the cost of damages he or she caused in an accident. Because Illinois only requires a person to carry only \$25,000 of coverage for the injury or death of one person in an accident, many times in my practice, I see situations where the insurance coverage of an offending driver is woefully inadequate.

In many instances, the available coverage will not even put the slightest dent in paying back medical and hospital expenses, not to mention compensating a person adequately for their lost wages or thee pain and suffering caused by their injuries. It is very unfortunate that here in Illinois, the minimum insurance requirements are set at such a low amount. It is even more unfortunate that the law does not yet make it mandatory for people to carry underinsurance coverage.

So how can you protect your-

When taking out your own auto insurance coverage, it is my advice that you should absolutely ensure that your own insurance policy covers for both of these unfortunate situations. Your policy may not automatically include this coverage and you will therefore have to specifically request the additional coverage. This additional coverage may also mean that you will likely pay a little more in your premium every month, but it is absolutely worth it and the best guarantee you can give yourself, if you are involved in an accident with an uninsured or underinsured driver.

I urge you all, check your auto policies today to ensure you have this coverage and if you do not, call your agent to have it added on today. Tomorrow may be too late!

If you are involved in a situation whereby you have to go through your own insurance company to seek compensation for damages, you must appreciate that the rules regarding same are complicated and different that going through the offending drivers insurance. Although the company is your own provider, and though you pay it to protect your financial interests, they will not simply pay you what you believe your claim is worth. My experience has taught me that despite them being your own insurer, you may still face many challenges in getting them to accept and pay out on your claim.


A Word With Monsignor Boland

It is often difficult for us to fully comprehend that when someone is homeless and on the street, each day is truly about surviving to the next day. There's no time for thinking about or planning for life goals because you are too busy figuring out how to stay warm, where to go for a hot meal, or where to sleep at night—and then getting yourself there, most likely on foot.

At Catholic Charities, we are known for our comprehensive homeless and housing programs that provide affordable apartments and social services to veterans, seniors, families, and those facing the challenge of domestic violence or disability. In total, we provide affordable housing to more than 4,000 people per year throughout Cook and Lake Counties. Especially with the severe shortage of affordable housing in our high-rent metropolitan area, Catholic Charities is truly grateful to provide stable housing and crucial supportive services for so many people.

However, there are thousands of people who remain unhoused and homeless. And what you might not know about is the extensive network of emergency services that Catholic Charities provides for the homeless—services fulfilling the most basic of human needs for food, clothing, and refuge from the elements; services designed to help people survive.

Catholic Charities Mobile Outreach Program, reached when people dial "311," dispatches teams to respond to non-life threatening requests for assistance throughout the city of Chicago 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days per year. This includes bringing people



to shelters, providing emergency food, doing well-being checks, and giving transportation assistance. Our teams are especially busy during the winter months when we try to move people out of frigid temperatures and into warming centers and shelters throughout the city.

On behalf of and in collaboration with local agencies and local government, Catholic Charities operates the Homeless Prevention Call Center, which screens callers and provides emergency, one-time financial assistance to persons who are at risk of being evicted or at risk of having their heat or lights turned off due to a recent crisis. Unfortunately, there is never enough funding to meet the need, and not all people qualify, but preventing homelessness is always the most cost-effective and compassionate use of limited resources.

Catholic Charities Evening Supper Programs are located in the city and suburbs and provide a hot evening meal to anyone in need. Meals are generously donated by restaurants and served to guests by volunteers. Guests get a nutritious meal that may be their only meal of the day, and can be connected with other needed services such as housing programs, job training, or legal assistance.

At our 721 N. LaSalle Street location, we recently added private shower and laundry facilities. Named in honor of the showers and launderette placed near the Vatican, our Pope Francis Ministries gives people the simple dignity of a warm shower and clean clothing. Guests are provided with a fresh towel and toiletries, can have their clothes laundered, and can "shop" for a clean set of clothes in our newly remodeled clothing room. Depending upon the season and donated inventory, warm clothing is available and can provide some protection from the elements.

During these cold winter months, please keep the homeless in your prayers each night. Pray for their safety, and for a permanent solution to homelessness and its threats to human life and human dignity. If you are looking for a way to provide concrete help, Catholic Charities is always in need of warm winter gear to distribute to those in need.
